Reform-Movement of the New Orleans Germans.

Our New Orleans exchanges are full with reflections on the reform-movement just started among the Germans of that city.

It is well known that the German citizens of New Orleans have so far invariably voted the Democratic ticket, and as the German vote in this city alone is estimated at 6000, its withdrawal from the Democratic party would reduce the latter to a hopeless minority.

More than 15 years have passed since the Germans of the North cut loose en-masse from the Democratic party and gave that strength to the Republicans which finally led to the victory of 1860.

It matters little to us, whether the Germans in Louisiana have inaugurated this movement in favor of the Republicans or not; we are glad that they have taken the lead in breaking up a political body, which has proven the greatest enemy of human progress in this country.

Our readers are cognizant of the recent vain efforts of the Democratic leaders to revive their organization and inaugurate the days of 1868 again.

These gentlemen are considered representative Germans, and are numbered among the best of our citizens. Under such leaders the movement which, at first, found little support, may be successful and productive of good.

At the last election in our State we witnessed a similar movement of the Germans in Houston and Galveston, the only two places in Texas,

where the Democracy could boast of having absolute control of the German vote. But this movement was artfully directed into a wrong channel and consequently died out without any momentous result.

THE news from France indicate that the political horizon has cleared up, and immediate danger of a general outbreak has passed. We have no trust in this quietude which has been forced upon the people by bayonets.

THAT SAME OLD SONG.—The San Antonio Herald of Sunday in speaking of our present State Legislature says: If they represent anything, it is that putrid sore on the Government, the present radical Congress.

THE Herald of the 22nd brings several grave charges against Hon. Schlickum, mainly composed of audits; we leave it to Mr. Schlickum, whether he sees fit to refute these charges; we know nothing about them.

THE Rockport Transcript copies largely from the Houston Times and Austin Republican. This is not very promising for the next future of the new place.

FROM a dispatch from Austin to the San Antonio Express, published in another column; it will be seen that the nomination of M. C. Hamilton and Lieut. Gov. Planagan, has been determined upon in a Republican caucus, which nomination amounts to an election.

The Galveston Civilian, speaks thus of Austin: The lobbyists are in dismay at Austin, as will be seen by our letter from which we print in another column to-day, because the constitution prohibits the plundering of the State for the benefit of private corporations.

Local Intelligence.

SOMETIME ago, we read a report on a resolution of the city council favoring the fencing in of the center part of Main Plaza, and the planting of trees and ornamental shrubs within the fencing. Since then we have heard nothing of it, and saw less than nothing. The time for planting trees is passing by fast. If it is the intention of the city fathers to ornament Main Plaza, an improvement that will meet the hearty approval of all citizens, it ought to be done at once.

THE front of the new Cathedral on Main Plaza is now developing all its architectural beauty. This Cathedral will be an ornament to the city, and a great improvement to Main Plaza. We venture to predict that those old ugly Mexican buildings that stretch along on the south side of the Main Plaza, will disappear in less than two years, and make room for elegant buildings, more suitable to the refined taste of the present generation.

THE CELEBRATION OF WASHINGTON'S BIRTH DAY.—The 22d of February is a sacred day to all Americans. It gave birth to the most honest Republican of this Continent, and will ever be remembered by those who enjoy the blessings of this free Government, the existence of which, as an independent Republic, is mainly due to Washington.

As far as the weather was concerned, yesterday, (Tuesday) did not commence very cheerfully. A heavy mist hung over town, and from all appearances rain seemed to be the next thing in order. But man supposes, etc. A few minutes before 9 o'clock the rays of the Sun had worked their way through the clouds, and the airy veil fell down as by magic. One of the fairest and sunniest days of the season, was greeted by all who intended to enjoy the festival of the day.

According to programme, the different associations met at their respective Halls and marched to the Military Plaza, where the procession was formed. The Marshal, Capt. Karber, took the lead on his fine, stately horse, and was immediately followed by the German brass band, who struck up one of their sweetest tunes. The two fire companies followed next, with Engines and Hook and Ladder Wagons, tastefully decorated with garlands and flags, and after them the Turner's Association, fairly represented, bearing the United States and German flag, made their appearance. The next in order was the Mexican club, with the Mexican flag, led by the Mexican brass band.

The schools were poorly represented. Only one private school took part in the procession. Why was this?

From the Military Plaza, the procession moved to the tunes of the music through Main street, to the Alamo Plaza, where Col. Newton read Washington's Farewell Address, and from thence back to the Military Plaza, where it dispersed. A grand ball at the Menger Hotel concluded the celebration.

At the general meeting of the Casino Association on Monday evening the Hall was rented to the Alpine singers for two nights during the week. The first concert will take place to-morrow.

A case of intemperance who evidently indulged too early in strong beverages to fairly enjoy Washington's birthday, was yesterday morning by force and violence transported down Main street to the jail, where he found some lodgement for some time. From his bloody face we judge that he had some unpleasant rencontre before the policemen took hold of him.

An Ordinance,

Re-enacting and amending an ordinance concerning payments made in Confederate money, or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio to diverse persons, &c., passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1865. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1865, and hereafter published, in reference to payments made in so-called Confederate currency, &c., be re-enacted with the following modifications and amendments thereof, to-wit:

Sec. 2. That all persons interested, their agents or assignees, are hereby required to settle with Messrs. Davis & Murphy within ninety days, from and after the publication of this Ordinance, the entire amount due to the City of San Antonio, on principal and interest on lands purchased from said city on fifty years credit, the payment of which having been made in so-called Confederate currency, since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1871, with whom, said Davis & Murphy, the claims as above stated are placed for settlement, and upon the presentation of their receipts for the payment of said principal and interest, in U. S. currency, the city will execute the same title to said parties.

Sec. 3. That all persons who own interest for lands purchased from the city of San Antonio, on fifty years credit, and have failed to pay, the same, are hereby notified that the aforesaid firm has been employed by the city of San Antonio to institute legal proceedings against all delinquents on said interest, from and after the 1st day of May, A. D. 1876, in case such interest have not been paid in U. S. currency, to said city, up to said date.

Sec. 4. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed, January 31st, A. D. 1876. Published February 2, A. D. 1876. WM. C. A. THELEPAPE, Mayor of the City of San Antonio.

The ordinance above referred to and passed on January 16th, 1865, reads as follows:

AN ORDINANCE,

Concerning payments made in Confederate money or other worthless paper, on account of the principal and interest due upon lands sold by the city of San Antonio to diverse persons, &c., passed on the 16th day of January, A. D. 1865. Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of San Antonio:

SECTION 1. That the city of San Antonio does not recognize the act or acts of any person or persons, claiming to act as officers of said city, from the 1st day of October, 1865, in receiving in the name of said city, the Bonds, Treasury Notes or currency of the late Confederate Government, worthless paper, purporting to be city scrip of said city, issued during that time in payment of the principal and interest on lands sold by said city, or in signing or executing instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from said city for such lands, or receipts for such pretended payments, and that all such pretended releases, conveyances and receipts, are hereby declared to be null and void.

Sec. 2. That to avoid any seeming injustice to those persons who have acted innocently and in good faith in making any such payments since the 1st day of April, A. D. 1861, all such persons as have paid to any person or persons acting as officers of said city, any such bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip on account of the principal and interest, or either, due upon the lands heretofore sold by this city, shall, upon presentation and delivery to the Mayor of his, or their receipts for such payments, together with such instruments of writing purporting to be releases or conveyances from this city, within three months after the passage of this ordinance and shall at the same time surrender such instruments of writing for cancellation, shall receive from the Mayor of this city a receipt on account of the actual market value of the bonds, treasury notes, currency or scrip so paid by such person or persons at the time of the payment thereof, provided, that any person or persons shall at the same time execute and deliver to the Mayor, an instrument of writing, whereby cancelling and annulling the writings heretofore executed and delivered to such person or persons by persons acting in the name of this city, as aforesaid, and putting this city in the same position, with the same price and charge upon such lands as before such payments.

Sec. 3. That in case any person or persons having delivered his, or their, receipts and instruments of writing as mentioned in the 2d section of this ordinance shall be dissatisfied with the amount of credit allowed him on them by the Mayor thereof, and shall refuse to receive from the Mayor a receipt for such amount, and to cancel such instruments of writing; then in that case the Mayor shall deliver back to such person, or persons, the original receipts, and instruments of writing so delivered by him, or them, as aforesaid, and that thenceforth such receipts and instruments of writing shall be null and void.

Sec. 4. That the term of the validity of the City Attorney, after the expiration of three months from the passage hereof to commence all necessary suits in the proper courts, for the cancellation of such instruments of writing as have not been surrendered up and cancelled according to the provisions hereof, and for the recovery of the principal and interest, due to this city upon such bonds.

Sec. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage. Passed Jan. 16th 1866. Mayor's Office San Antonio Jan. 16th 1866. (Signed) D. CLEVELAND, Mayor.

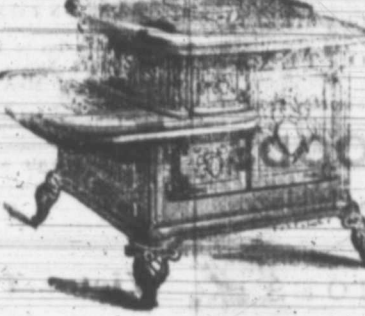

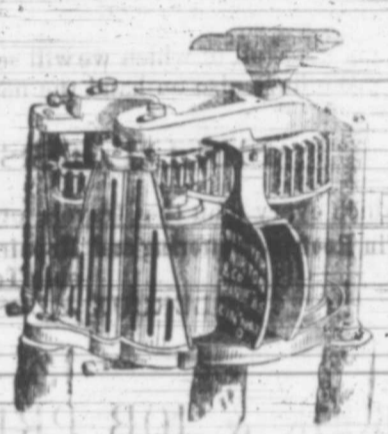
