Daylight Ahead!

A future bright with prosperity, equal to our aspirations, and widening with the horizon of our fate, awaits Texas, if she will but study and accept the grand Providential lessons of the past decade of years, and war not with that which the Homeric Greeks held to be stronger than combined Olympus-namely Destiny.

Hitherto we have been sectional and provincial, controlled by the spirit and spell of an institution, which had naught in common with the century and the age. The rebellion could only have arisen among a people dreaming impossible dreams of chinese exclusion and isolation, and planning an ideal nation with a revival of obsolete and ghostly modes of civilization, fitted only for the "middle ages."

If the rebellion had been a military success, its civil failure would have been but the more apparent, and the collapse was as sure as though a geologic Saurian, with lungs fitted for the gross atmosphere of the carboniferous period, should attempt to inhale the freer ether of to-day.

The new Texas, which is fast rising up to sway and control, if it wishes to move along the great line of progress, of wealth, of material prosperity and power, if it would be the seat of population and the fountain of political influence, must be Republican.

The old men and the old war cries are dead. The bright minds, the clear business intellects see this, and they turn with impatience from those would be leaders, who can only drone over the utterances of a past which has no resurrection.

That Texas should be Republican is more than simply desirable; it is a moral and political necessity. She is drawn to the cause of nationality, freedom, and progress, by all the tidal movements of the age, and by all the vital pulse beats of the hour.

In its broadest, largest sense, let us welcome the situation. Let not a merely formal Reconstruction from the lips outward, content us, while fixed at five per cent. "Our Folks."

The Nation thus philosophizes and suggests about the recalicitrant Southern Democrat who still gloomily contemplates the inevitable ratification of the 15th amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Moreover, the agitation against slavery has reached an appropriate and triumphant conclusion, and the negro, from being the subject of the strangest struggle in the history of civilization, sinks into the rank of an ordinary and somewhat heavilyweighted wayfarer on the dusty and rugged highway of competition. We can understand a thought ful Southernor feeling awe stricken as he looks at what has come to pass. The very feelings which he most carefully lostered, and made his boast and glory, have been con-verted into instruments of torture, under which he daily writhes. His pride of race, for instance, makes black equality ten-fold the humilia tion it would be to any other men. His contempt for the North' which he taught his children in the cradle, has made his subjugation bitter beyond the bitterness of any other recorded conquest. Every reproach he he has ever heaped up on the Yankee has given the Yankee sword a keener point, and the Yankee order book a deadlier sting. Even his hostilsty to "isms" has given the people who love "isms" and live by them an influence and weight in politics and society which but for his hatred, they would never have had. He has the consolation of knowing that free love, communism, rationalism, woman's rights, "agrarianism," free schools, and everything else of the kind he most hated, owe a great deal of whatever success they have achieved to his dislike of tuem. We class them together, simply because this was a way he had himself. Now that is all over, and he sees the ne gro on the bench (and the South Carolina bonch, too,) and in the Senate Chamber, he may set down with the comfortable reflection that, considered from his own point of view, he has shown himself the greatest blunderer of the modern world. He ought to have the fifteenth amendment engraved on his tomb. No other epitaph would do him justice.

Only Texas Cattle Raisers Injured.

The Shoe and Leather Reporter is striving to have the ten per cent, duty on hides repealed, as "the cuttle raisers of Texas are the only persons who would be injured even in a slight degree by the removal of the duty, and it is even doubtful whether their interest would be affected." We suggest that if the simple revenue duty on hides is to be taken off that they make the thing square to us by repealing also the duty on tanned leather.

Our Texas hides have had very little protection. In 1845 the first duties was levied on hides; it was ing year this duty was abolished, but in 1847 a duty of five per cent was again levied, at which the tariff. remained until 1858, when it was

In 1861 the duty on hides and skins was made 10 per cent ad va. negra could not be permitted by the lorem, at which figure it has since remained. With a duty of 35 per cent. on sole leather, patent leather, and all manufactures of leather; 30 per cent on calf skins, and 25 per cent on upper leather, including morocco, we should think the tau ners might be satisfied. PARTS of Hungary have been terribly afflicted with the devestations caused by mice in large bodies, such as not unfrequently have rayaged portions of Europe to so great an extent, indeed, that in a single district the entire crop of sixty thousand acres of grain was completely consumed. In another district ten thousand acres were destroyed in two weeks, not a grain, nor blade of straw, nor root being left. Every attempt made to reduce the hordes of these animals failed. Ditches were dug and filled with water; but they soon became choked up by the dead bodies, the number destroyed being counted by hundreds of thousands, and yet without any appreciable impression being made upon the supply. The country was filled with immense numbers of hawks, eagles, owls, and other predaceous birds, together with foxes, weasels, wild cats, &c., but the devastation still continues, and there is no telling where it will end.






