CUBA. BY EDMUND C. STEDMAN. Is it naught? Is it naught? That the South wind brings her wail to our shore, That the spoilers compass our desolate sister? Is it naught? Must we say to her, "Strive in vain." With the lips wherewith we loved her and kissed her— With the mocking lips wherewith we said, "Thou art the dearest and fairest to us Of all the daughters the sea hath bred, Of all the green-girdled isles that woo us!" Is it naught? Must ye wait? Must ye wait, Till they ravage her gardens of orange and palm, Till her heart is dust, till her strength is water? Must ye see them trample her, and be calm As priests when a virgin is led to slaughter? Shall they snuff the marvel of all lands, The nation's longing, the Earth's completeness— On her red mouth dropping myrrh, her hands— Filled with fruitage and spice and sweetness? Must ye wait? In the day, in the night, In the burning day, in the dolorous night, Her sun-brown cheeks are stained with weeping. Her watch-fires leaven the misty night— Why are her friends and lovers sleeping? Ye, who witness her the slatterer bonds— Who were my kindred before— all others— Hath he set your hearts afar, my friends? Hath he made ye alien, my brothers, Day and night? Hear ye not? Hear ye not? From the hollow— see the sound of her voice! The passionate, far-off tone, which saith: "Alas, my brothers! alas, what choice— The lust that shameth, the sword that slayeth? They bind me! they rend my delicate locks— They shed the beautiful robes I won me! My round limbs bleed on the mountain rocks— Save me ere they have quite undone me!" Hear ye not? Speak at last! Speak at last! In the right of your strength, in the strength of your right, Speak out at last to the treacherous spoiler! Say, "Will you harry her in our sight? Ye shall not trample her down, nor sell her!" Loose her bonds! let her rise in her loveliness— Our virginal sister; or, if ye shame her, Dark Amnon shall rue for her sore distress, And her sure revenge shall be that of Tamara! Speak at last! Australia. There is nothing indigenous in Australia fit for the sustenance of the white man—no animals, no fruits, no vegetables, and no country within thousands of miles from which they could be procured. Yet what do we see to-day, as the result of yesterday's settlement? A greater number (49,500,000) of sheep and horned cattle than are to be found in either the United Kingdom, or in France, or in Austria, or even in the United States of America, where there are only 45,500,000. Cereals of every kind; European, subtropical, and tropical, fruits and vegetables of the choicest varieties abundant and cheap; flowers and plants from every clime, and forest trees and shrubs, from the oak to the Cape gooseberry. All the necessaries of life, and even the luxuries, so far as the products of the soil are concerned, within easy reach of every member of the community. It may fairly be stated that settlement and acclimation in Australia have been carried out with a rapidity and a magnitude that approach the marvellous, and of which there is no parallel elsewhere. As to the energy with which all kinds of public works have been prosecuted, and of the capacity of the country for sustained progress in that direction, in 1867 the combined gross revenue (10,050,000) of the six Australasian colonies was in excess of the united gross revenue of the whole of British North America, from the Pacific to the Atlantic Ocean; of the whole of the British Possessions in the West, in Africa, in the East, in the Channel, and the Mediterranean; in fact, exceeded the united gross revenue (about 8,000,000) of all England's colonial possessions. The climatic influence of forests has also been felt in Australia. In the district of Ballarat it became striking that since deforesting was commenced on a large scale, from the years 1863 to 1868, a regular decrease of the amount of rain fall—from 37.27 inches to 14.23 inches—had taken place. The government, in view of this fact, has now created the office of an inspector of the State forests. The business of this official will be to prevent the clearing out of the forests, and to see after the caring for and planting of forests in various parts of the colony. ## E Pluribus Unum.

Nations are first class aggregations of human power, as continents result from the agglomeration of a myriad islands. Our own is a nation of extremes and opposites. The population ranges from white to black with every intermediate shade, defying classification. Europe and Africa have long been represented here. Here, too, is the Indian, too weak to resist, and too fixed to affiliate. Asia is beginning to be largely represented. The Mongol will soon be counted by millions. His desire for the comforts of life is stronger than his superstitious attachment to his native country, and in Australia he has already learned that the country good enough to live in, is good enough to die in.

The route to America from the other quarters of the globe is no longer a secret. Means of migration are improved and steam and the telegraph have made our continent the centre of the world. The toilers on every over-crowded continent know the gain to be derived from coming here.

The forces that have swept to us the surplus population of Europe, will do the same with those of China and Japan. Many in the South having lost the negro, who was made to work for nothing, are now willing to take the Chinaman, who they hope will work for next to nothing.

This is a bubble. Yellow slavery will not succeed to black slavery, nor the old snake flourish under a new skin. The Chinaman has not been tamed by two hundred years of the whip and the chain, nor is all his religious instruction confined to making him obedient, and teaching him the pious lesson of "cursed be Canaan." The Mongol belongs to a civilization older than our own; he has ideas of mine and thine, and will not placidly step into Pompey's old shoes.

Of course there is danger from this inflowing of inferior races. Social fermentation will ensue, and our institutions receive a shock and a strain. Still a generous policy is probably the best. We are able to mould all new comers, and Americanize them even against their will. Neither Mongol nor negro can get the better of the Saxon race, reinforced, too, as it is constantly from European fountains.

The Asiatics come poor, and we meet them rich; they come singly, and we meet them in column. We run the machine and have the control. Our mission is to show the brotherhood of man, to illustrate the dignity of our common humanity, and to prove that differences the widest and deepest, can be fused into unity under our form of government.

Each race has its qualities, evil as well as good, but in each the latter predominates, and all are needed to make an enduring and harmonious whole.

In the new and broad career, which opens before us, destiny forbids monotony, and points to a composite nationality, builded up of every race, containing the combined strength of the whole, and thus neutralizing the weaknesses of each.

## Governor Ujhazi.

Yesterday we chronicled the death of our honored and venerable citizen, Governor Ladislaus Ujhazi. Truly a great and good man has fallen. His name is enrolled among the patriots and reformers of the world.

The love of liberty was a passion with him. Although born to fortune and privilege, he espoused the cause of freedom in Hungary against the despotism of Austria, and gave the best energies of his life to its support.

He was the intimate friend and compatriot of Kossuth, Klapka, and the other leaders of the Hungarian revolution.

The great hope of Gov. Ujhazi's life, was to see his native land freed from Austrian tyranny. But his sympathies were by no means confined to his own oppressed country. He was the friend of freedom throughout the earth.

At the close of the Hungarian revolution Governor Ujhazi fled to the United States. For a time he lived in Iowa. He then moved to Texas, and settled near San Antonio in 1853 and here he resided until his death. He was universally respected and beloved by the whole community.

## Danger of Monopolies.

In an article in the last North American Review, Chas. F. Adams, Jr., of Boston, expresses his opinion of the dangers threatening the government from railroads and other monopolies as follows:

Our political system cannot much longer sustain the conflict with corporations. Modern civilization has created a class of powers which are too strong for the government. The machinery of combination and perpetuity is too perfect. The future in this matter is in some degree fore-shadowed by the past. Once already has a great corporate interest grasped at the control of our government, and it could only be thrown off by the convulsion of a civil war. On one other occasion the government became involved in a conflict with a private corporation, wielding the power of only \$35,000,000 of capital, and for years the country was distracted. Both of these were the episodes of earlier and simpler days. What is the aspect of the present?

The States of New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Maryland are respectively owned by corporations within their limits. New York is governed by two corporations, acting in concert with one corrupt political ring. The United States is struggling painfully with half a dozen great combinations of private corporate interests, and no well informed man doubts that to-day it is in the power of any one of them alone to dictate to the national government, any policy it may desire, and to compel its adoption. The simple fact is that on the people who with us are the source of all power, these combinations, through their material influence and their power, to create or allay disturbance, exercise more control than officials and reformers combined. How, indeed, could it be otherwise? Compare the things of to-day with those of yesterday. The United States Bank in the days of its greatest pride, boasted a capital of \$35,000,000.

The slave power was welded together by nine hundred millions of property, but controlled only one section of the country and could be combatted in another. The Bank was overthrown through its own folly after a nine years' struggle; the destruction of slavery was accomplished after twenty-five years of agitation and four years of civil war.

The present banking system consists of one compact organization, sensitive to the common interest, subject to a common control, which now enjoys \$426,000,000 of wealth, and \$50,000,000 of income, and is distributed all over the country.

The railroad system dwarfs even this. Single members of it control two hundred millions of capital and employ tens of thousands of men. As a united influence it shoots out its ramifications into every State and county and town of the whole Union, and represents and wields all the power contained in \$2,000,000,000 of wealth.

These are the disturbing forces, now called upon to take part in a social system which grew up under a government created in 1789. What will be the limits of their action? May not the oak tree already be shattering the porcelain vase? These powers and influences, be it remembered, do not violently overthrow, but rather quietly antiquate, any system of government that thwarts their development.

At a divorce trial before Judge Sample, in Muncie, Ind., last week, the principals in the suit, in relating how lovingly they used to live together when first married, became so affected over the recollection of their lost happiness, that they commenced crying, the Judge followed suit, the audience joined in, and handkerchiefs were in general demand. Judge Sample, when they had all got through crying, suggested to the husband and wife the propriety of trying to live happily together once more. After consultation they concluded to try it again, and the case was thus ended.

Track laying on the line of the Central Railroad has commenced between Calvert and Bremond.

A New York correspondent laughs at the way people use the "hook of the play" when they go to see Booth's Hamlet. "As soon as they are seated," he says, "they straightway find the place and bury their noses in the book, and follow every word of the piece, delightedly exclaiming, one to another, 'there, he left that word out,' or, as I heard one intelligent creature say, after Hamlet passed from the scene, 'He didn't say "exit" did he? and it's down here for him to say it the last word.'"

It is said that the cause of the Archduchess Elizabeth, of Austria, coming to this country is to be found in domestic troubles, and from being forbidden to appear at court, she having fallen in disgrace for some reason as yet unknown.

A careful analysis by the chemist of the Board of Health of New York, of thirty samples of cosmetics used by the women for "beautifying" their complexions, revealed the fact that their principal ingredients were lead and bismuth. Five specimens of "pale white" turned out to be nothing but marble dust.

FINANCIAL.

GOLD.—Gold in New York yesterday 101 Exchange.—Currency on New York and New Orleans 1 per cent premium. Gold one half per cent.

RETURNED.—We hear of the return of Colonel Quesada, who has been an actor in the Cuban struggle. The Colonel's family are residents of this city.

EN ROUTE.—On the 3d inst our two U S Senators elect, and Congressmen, DeGener and Clark with several State Senators and Representatives, passed through New Orleans on their way to Washington.

DISTRICT COURT.—The Grand Jury were organized this morning, and received the charge from Judge Van Antwerp.

DEAR SIR:—The members of the Bar of this city have held a meeting, at which the undersigned were appointed a committee to request, that at the opening of the District Court of Bexar county, on the 7th of March, 1870, the entire civil docket may be continued to the next succeeding term by a general order to that effect.

This course is suggested for the reason, among others, that the time intervening between the adjournment of the term just closed and the beginning of the next, is too short to enable Attorneys to make the necessary preparations for the trial of causes; and that, under the circumstances, the business that could be transacted would not be commensurate to the expense—both to the county and to litigants—of holding another term so soon after the last.

It may also be mentioned that jury duty would fall heavily upon citizens at this, the most busy season of the year, when taken in connection with the same duty already performed in the several Courts sitting in this city during the last two months. In behalf of the members of the Bar, we therefore express the hope that their above mentioned request may receive your sanction.



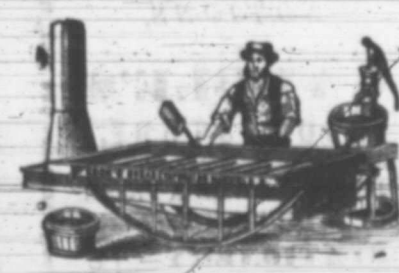

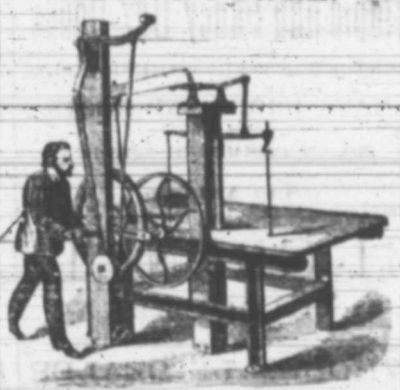
