Forests.

The planting or destruction of forests, affects climate and temperature so obviously, that all can no. tice the changes that ensue.

A belt of close growing trees to the northward of a farm, often gives to that place a climate essentially different from that prevailing near by. The forest not only breaks the harsh violence of the northern blast, but seems to filter out the nipping frost from the air, and allows only a temperate breeze to pass through.

We have seen in Canada and bleak New England, animals basking in the sun, on the sheltered side of a grove in the early spring time, while the snow lay heaped and drifted in the shade beyond.

In the early days of the French revolution, the immemorial torests, which had sheltered the mountain slopes of Southern France, and which had long been the object of tier. care and protection by the government, were cut down and sold by the Jacobins. The effect was disastrous. The climate became more rough, the storms of snow and hail more violent, the hurricanes more were heavier than when the district was wooded, landslides occurred more often and the culture of the grape diminished one-half.

The Government, at last, under Napoleon, replanted the forests, and re-enacted the old forest-laws. As the trees grew, the climate softened, matures as of old. In the valleys of the mountainous district of Bugame in Italy, the forests fifty years



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
