WASHINGTON, March 16. Senate.—It is stated that the Judiciary Committee will report adversely to seating General Ames as a Mississippi Senator. Senator Morton, opening his Georgia speech, said, alluding to Mr. Revels, in the exchange which had been made by which that gentleman occupied the place of Jefferson Davis, the Senate had lost nothing in intelligence, while it had gained much in patriotism and loyalty. Mr. Kellogg's resolution requiring the committee on Postal Affairs to report a bill establishing a daily mail between New Orleans and Cairo, on the Mississippi river steamboats, passed.
WASHINGTON, March 17. Senate.—Discussion is progressing on a resolution looking to the distribution of appointments, pro rata, among the States. Mr. Sawyer made a speech, asserting that the South had not one-tenth of her share. A single Congressional district, in the North, had more such appointments than any one Southern State. Mr. Platt asked leave to offer a resolution directing the Reconstruction Committee to inquire into the constitutionality of the enabling act in Virginia. Mr. Brooks objected, saying Virginia had been reconstructed several times already. The private Secretary of Governor Sawyer arrived here, this morning, with a requisition from the Governor to the President for troops.
Senate.—The House bill abolishing the franking privilege was made special order for Tuesday next.
Resolutions favoring the open discussion of treaties for foreign annexations was referred to committee on Foreign Relations. There was considerable discussion upon a resolution looking to the equal distribution of Government patronage in Washington. Several Senators decried the appointment of young men to office here as having a tendency to ruin them for future usefulness. A bill was reported amending consular and diplomatic acts. It authorizes eleven Consuls General, one hundred and forty-six Consuls, and four Commercial Agents. Bill introduced to consolidate Indian tribes under territorial government. The Georgia discussion was resumed without vote. The House rejected the resolution to expel Mr. Butler, of Tennessee, for alleged cadet corruption, the vote being 102 to 63, a two-thirds vote being required. A resolution of censure was adopted unanimously. The House then considered the tariff bill. It is officially estimated by the Internal Revenue Supervisor, Frisbury, that the collections from the tobacco tax in Virginia, for the present fiscal year, will reach four and a quarter millions. He reports the prospects of trade for the coming season as flattering. The Senate confirmed Luther Lee, Collector of Customs at Norfolk; David Turner, at Alexandria, and F. J. Bremberg, postmaster at Mobile.
New York, March 17. The schooner James Hoyt is ashore opposite the Highlands. All hands are lost.
CORINTH, March 17. The stage-coach upset two hundred miles above this station. Six passengers were frozen to death.
SAN FRANCISCO, March 17. The richness of the San Diego mines is confirmed.
NEW ORLEANS, March 17. The Legislature adjourned last night sine die. Among the last acts was the passage of a bill giving \$400,000 in State bonds, to a company, for the improvement of Bayou Rapides. Appropriations made by the regular and

extra session, amounts to about \$13,000,000.

Foreign.
HAVANA, March 17. Louis Arendano, leader of the Guiness HUNGUOS, his adjutant and six of his band were captured last night and executed this morning; but three of the band now remain.
LONDON, March 10. 5 o'clock, p. m.—Reports are still current in London of the arrival of the City of Boston. The Globe this evening publishes a dispatch from Dublin, announcing her safe arrival at Queenstown, but the agent of the Associated Press at that port telegraphs that she has not been seen or heard of there. The Globe dispatch is undoubtedly false.

OFFICIAL.

LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES,
Passed at the Second Session of the Forty-first Congress.
[PUBLIC—No. 15.]
AN ACT to admit the State of Mississippi to representation in the Congress of the United States.
Whereas the people of Mississippi have framed and adopted a constitution of State government which is republican; and whereas the legislature of Mississippi elected under said constitution has ratified the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the Constitution of the United States; and whereas the performance of these several acts in good faith is a condition precedent to the representation of the State in Congress: Therefore,
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the said State of Mississippi is entitled to representation in the Congress of the United States: *Provided,* That before any member of the legislature of said State shall take or resume his seat, or any officer of said State shall enter upon the duties of his office, he shall take and subscribe, and file in the office of the secretary of State of Mississippi, for permanent preservation, an oath or affirmation in the following words: "I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm) I have never taken an oath as a member of Congress, or as an officer or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, and afterward engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof; or help me God," or under the pains and penalties of perjury, (as the case may be); or such person shall in like manner take, subscribe, and file the following oath or affirmation: "I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I have, by act of Congress of the United States, been relieved from the disabilities imposed upon me by the fourteenth amendment of the Constitution of the United States, so help me God; or under the pains and penalties of perjury, (as the case may be); which oath, or affirmations, shall be taken before and certified by an officer lawfully authorized to administer oaths. And any person who shall knowingly swear or affirm falsely in taking either of such oaths or affirmations shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and shall be punished therefor by imprisonment not less than one year, and not more than ten years, and shall be fined not more than ten thousand dollars, and not more than ten thousand dollars, and in all trials for any violation of this act, the certificate of the taking of either of said oaths or affirmations, with proof of the signature of the party concerned shall be taken and held as conclusive evidence that such oath or affirmation was regularly and lawfully administered by competent authority: *And provided further,* That every such person who shall neglect for the period of thirty days next after the passage of this act to take, subscribe, and file such oath or affirmation as aforesaid, and purposely to have vacated his office, *As provided further,* That the State of Mississippi is admitted to representation in Congress as one of the States of the Union, upon the following fundamental conditions: First, That the constitution of Mississippi shall never be so amended or changed as to deprive any citizen or class of citizens of the United States of the right to vote by the constitution herein recognized, except as a punishment for such crimes as may now felonies at common law, whereof they shall have been duly convicted under laws equally applicable to all the inhabitants of said State; *Provided,* That any alteration of said constitution, prospective in its effects, may be made in regard to the time and place of residence of voters. Second, That it shall never be lawful for the said State to deprive any citizen of the United States, on account of his race, color, or previous condition of servitude, of the right to hold office under the constitution and laws of said State, or upon any ground to require of him any other qualifications for office than such as are required of all other citizens. Third, That the constitution of Mississippi shall never be so amended or changed as to deprive any citizen or class of citizens of the United States of the school rights and privileges secured by the constitution of said State.
Approved, February 23, 1870.

A Specie Basis.

The premium on gold fluctuates in the neighborhood of 12, and the average price of the five-twenties in the market is about the same. They are therefore at par, representing a capital of over one thousand millions of dollars.

This discrepancy will, doubtless lessen from week to week, until the difference ceases, and greenbacks pass at their face value.

The greenbacks are secured by the credit of the United States, and their credit commands par in the markets of the world.

The National bank currency is secured by ninety per cent of the National securities, which sell for their face in gold.

So that probably no paper currency has ever yet been issued better secured by actual deposit.

The bank of England notes pass at par all over Europe, yet she never has in her vaults a sum of gold equal to one third of her circulation. A currency, then, backed by the equivalent of specie to the amount of ninety per cent, will not much longer be at a discount in our markets.

Unless a crisis should come, some great foreign or commercial disturbance, and even at that time, the remaining premium on gold will soon be swept away like dust before the breeze. Kooisighted business men clearly perceive this, and are adjusting their monetary transactions accordingly. In the large cities, retail stores and restaurants are furnishing silver change to their customers. We have in fact arrived at a specie basis in all but the name, and no proper and legitimate course should exist for years, to again swell the premium on the precious metals.

Sickness.

With the exception of severe colds and Pneumonias, consequent upon the great fluctuations of the temperature this month, our city is enjoying a fair share of health.

We learn that measles, of a somewhat severe type, are prevalent at Austin, and that in the vicinity of Waco, there have been a number of cases of smallpox. The Asiatic cholera which began last year its march from the far east, has reached Russia, and is now raging in Moscow in its worst form. People have been suddenly seized while walking, and in some instances death has been instantaneous.

At the usual rate of travel of this terrible disease, it will not reach our shores before next spring, if at all. Still all sanitary precautions should be enforced, and cleanliness be everywhere practiced as a virtue next to Godliness.

GERMANS AS CITIZENS.—Under this caption, the Rural Southerner pays the following compliment to the German class of our population:

For industry there is no people on the globe that will compare with the German. In our country there is no class of our population that are so devoted to business; that would avoid politics and disturbances so fully. Almost without exception, too, they are successful in what they undertake. They do not despise the way of small beginnings, but are content to start in an humble way, and to observe rules of economy in their manner of living, until their circumstances justify more liberal allowances. They are not aspirants—rare content to enjoy life in a quiet way. They are sociable with each other, and while their religion differs materially from our own, yet are they unobtrusive in its pursuit, and altogether void of the puritanical sectarianism that denounces other than its own creed. There is no bombast or pretentiousness in their mingling or dealing with their fellowmen. They are

earnest in what they undertake, and use none of the American bravado in carrying it out.

Such are the general characteristics of a race that is rapidly filling up many sections of America, and there is not any one section that can be named, where Germans have populated freely, that has not become prosperous.

UNIVERSAL AMNESTY.—On this subject the New York Tribune of the 5th inst. says:

Significant and most cheering are the signs in the Senate of the fast-coming revolution. At the opening yesterday, the Committee on Disabilities reported favorably Mr. Ferry's bill repealing the test acts. Immediately afterward Mr. Reynolds presented the resolutions of his Legislature asking the speedy removal of the political disabilities of all the citizens of Mississippi, and later in the day Mr. Sumner withdrew his objections to the bill lately passed, relieving the liabilities of a large number of persons therein named. At this rate, and in this humor, we need not be long in reaching universal amnesty.

COURTING A FAY GIRL.—Don Platt says:

She was once in love with a fat girl; she was very fleshy; she was enormous, but the course of my true love came to grief. I was sitting one evening, as usual, in the twilight, and she came in and sat down beside me; I said, 'many soft words; I embraced part of her; she seemed distant; she frequently turned her lovely head from me; at last I thought I heard the faintest of voices on the other side; I arose and walked around, and then I found another fellow courting her on the left hand; I was indignant, and upbraided her for her treachery in thus concealing from me another love; she laughed at my conceit, as if she were not big enough to have two lovers at once.'

esoteric and Jacobus.

In Wyoming Territory, a Grand Jury has been formed partly of women. The charge of the Judge has come to hand. He said, 'the eyes of the world are to-day fixed upon this jury of Albany county. What a tremendous gaze for women to act under! He informed the female part of the jury that there was not the slightest impropriety in their occupying the position, and he assured them the fullest protection of the Court. And then he gave some notion of the need and scope of this protection by this:

It would be the most shameful scandal that in our temples of justice, and in our Courts of law, anything should be permitted which the most sensitive lady might not hear with propriety and decency.

This brings a painful sighing. Unfortunately many of the crimes against society, are of such a nature that a thorough inquiry into them would be embarrassing to women in the presence of men. Are all such offenses to go clear, because the inquiry might shock the nerves of the most sensitive lady before men? Or shall there be a separate grand jury organized for such cases. It was stated in a recent controversy that when female medical students attended the clinics with the males, the cases had to be sorted, and only those brought out that would not shock the most sensitive female nerves in the presence of men; and that once when a shocking subject was brought out, the females stampeded, and at the door turned and made mouths at the males; and went about charging that the males had insulted them.

We rather think that when women do jury business, they will have to leave their peculiar feminine manners at home, and face whatever comes in the list of crimes. Justice can not stop to consult female sensitiveness, nor limit itself to such acts as the most sensitive lady might hear with propriety and decency.

Col. John S. Ford in the Brownsville Sentinel, speaks of our United States Senators in very complimentary terms. We have been very much gratified at the tone of the press towards Messrs. Hamilton and Planagan. Nearly every leading paper in the State, so far as we have observed, has spoken in commendation of our Senators. The Sentinel says:

Morgan C. Hamilton is a gentleman of very liberal attainments. He has been a long time connected with public affairs in Texas. In the winter of 1844 and 1845 he was Acting Secretary of War of the Republic of Texas. He was then recognized as a gentleman of talents, of extended views, and of great firmness of character.

He has acquired wealth, yet he is free from the charge of having gained it by indirect, wrong, or oppressive means. His integrity and honor have never been questioned.

He will advocate what he considers right, faithfully and fearlessly, and will never shrink from assuming the full responsibility of what he has said and done. He is a gentleman of positive qualities—there is nothing negative about him. The people will always know where to find him. They will trust him, notwithstanding a large majority of them differ from him in politics.

Mr. Planagan has been connected with political affairs for a long while in this State. He is a gentleman of considerable ability and great tact. He manages a question in a deliberative assembly with adroitness, and compels opponents to feel that they are coping with a man of strength.

He is a fluent speaker and a rather able debater. He sustains the reputation of having represented his constituents with fidelity. It is hoped he will continue to merit this commendation by standing squarely and fairly for the State of Texas in the Senate, and not suffering himself to be led off by party issues.

The winter in Europe has been very rich in the presentation of extraordinary atmospheric phenomena. In the Northern Alps the month of October was very cold. In Galicia, Russia and Poland the severe frosts did not begin till the middle of January. Sweden and Norway have had (February 16) hardly any winter, while Spain and Italy were suffering from cold. On the 5th of February the thermometer stood at 19 degs. at Cracow, 21 degs. at Lemberg, 20 degs. at Warsaw, 19 degs. at Posen 10 degs. at Danzig, 13 degs. at Breslau, 6 degs. at Vienna 17 degs. at Kronberg, 22 degs. at St. Petersburg, 25 degs. at Moscow, 2 degs. at Stockholm, and 2 degs. at Trieste. Within a few days the cold increased to 24 degs. at Cracow, so that the schools had to be closed.
