Proceedings City Council.
 Regular meeting, March 23, 1870.
 Present—His Honor, Mayor Thielpape,
 Aldermen—Messrs. Gross, Norton, Gam-
 ble, Bell, Fentzenrieder.
 The minutes of the meeting of March 7,
 1870, was read and adopted.
 The petition of numerous citizens re-
 questing the immediate removal of the
 dam in the river known as Conception Dam
 as a public nuisance, also, threatening
 damages from the corporation, if the same
 is not removed. Read and acted upon by
 resolution below.

The legal opinion of T. S. Harrison, Esq.,
 in regard to the Conception Dam in the
 river, that not only has the city authori-
 ties the power to remove said dam, but it
 is their duty to do so, in as much as the
 Supreme Court of the State of Texas has
 declared the same to be a public nuisance.
 Opinion read and ordered filed.

The following resolution was offered and
 unanimously adopted:
 Be it resolved by the City Council of the
 City of San Antonio, that, whereas, many
 citizens have repeatedly petitioned the
 City authorities to remove the dam, rebuilt
 in accordance with Article 97 of the City
 Digest, across the San Antonio River with-
 in the city limits, for the purpose of rais-
 ing the water of the river into the ditch
 known as Conception Ditch, and

Whereas, The City Council after mature
 deliberation, have declared such dam a
 nuisance; therefore, it is ordered that it
 be removed, by taking out from the bed of
 the river all the material used in the erec-
 tion of said dam, and the Mayor is hereby
 authorized and required to have the same
 done at once, in the best, practical and
 cheapest manner.

The petition of Peter Schiemer, com-
 plaining that a known road in the Labors
 de Abajo had been fenced up, and that the
 same be removed. Referred to committee
 on Petitions and Ordinances.

The letter of C. Hartnett, city Surveyor
 and Engineer, in regard to a missing por-
 tion of a city map. Laid over.

The petition of W. Schuake to be paid
 \$200 on account his salary as city As-
 sessor. Granted.

The petition of C. Upson, Esq., to be
 allowed to cut a branch ditch in his prem-
 ises. Referred to committee on Ditches
 and Irrigation.

The Finance Committee submitted their
 report upon the various matters referred
 to said committee. Reported as correct the
 city officers reports for the month of Feb-
 ruary 1870, they recommended the pay-
 ment of the several bills; they also recom-
 mended the payment of the sum of \$1,500 to G.
 Frieleben for services as former city Sur-
 veyor and Engineer—said amount to be a
 final settlement between Mr. F. and the
 city. Committee report adopted.

The report of the Public Improvement
 Committee in regard to widening Salinas
 street, and compensating Mr. Estefina for
 land taken. The committee recommend
 widening said street on the East side of
 San Pedro creek, but do not allow any
 compensation for land taken. The Mayor
 was authorized to proceed in such cases as
 the city charter directs.
 Board adjourned.

A Vast Immigration Scheme.

The St. Paul Press announces
 that ex-Secretary McCulloch, Sena-
 tor Carl Schurz, and ex-Governor
 Marshall, of Minnesota, have been
 selected, and will be invited by the
 Northern Pacific Railway Company,
 to go to Europe on a mission to
 organize and stimulate emigration to
 the line of the road and the settle-
 ment of its lands, on a plan more
 comprehensive and extended than
 any heretofore devised. The com-
 pany own every alternate section
 in a belt forty miles wide, from the
 head of Lake Superior to the Pacific
 Ocean, equivalent to a strip of twenty
 miles wide, in all between thirty
 and forty million acres of land, a
 territory greater in extent than all
 New England, and capable of sus-
 taining five or six millions of people.
 They have already arranged with
 German capitalists for all means
 necessary to the construction of the
 road with the largest force they can
 employ. They propose to offer to
 every immigrant in Europe abun-
 dant employment in building the
 road for the first year or two after
 his arrival. Whether they assist
 him in his passage here is not stated.
 When he has finished his work for
 the company, he is to have a farm
 of 40, 80, or 100 acres, with a neat
 frame dwelling house ready erected
 thereon, and a lot of reasonable

size fenced in, all at the expense of
 the company. The terms of pay-
 ment are so long, and on so long,
 and on so low interest, that they
 cannot prove a burden to the poor-
 est. It is expected that the surplus
 wages received for constructing the
 road, will stock the farm and provide
 the tools, so that every person em-
 ployed in the construction of the
 road may, as soon as it is finished,
 go to raising the crops, which it will
 bring to market. The company will
 manufacture the houses, by the
 thousand, exactly alike, like the
 parts of a Springfield rifle or Elgin
 watch, so that each piece of any one
 structure will fit into the correspond-
 ing piece of any other. They ex-
 pect, in this manner, to secure
 an abundant and immediate
 supply of cheap labor, and to im-
 mediately enhance the value of their
 lands by the rapid setting up of the
 line of their road. The present is a
 peculiarly favorable time for in-
 augurating such an enterprise, in
 view of the distressed condition of
 the laboring class in England and
 other parts of Northern Europe,
 and the universal desire of the
 European working classes to get
 to America by all means within
 their reach. The unassisted immigra-
 tion of the past year is about 50,
 000 in excess of the year before, as
 indicated by the arrivals at New
 York. Everything promises an
 immigration during the present
 year exceeding anything ever before
 known in our history. This will be
 exceedingly desirable, in view of
 the high prices of labor prevailing
 among farmers in our agricultural
 districts.

Indians.

We have been favored with the perusal of a letter written by W. H. Pulliam of Uvalde, to Judge G. H. Noonan of Castroville, and dated the 18th inst.

Mr. Pulliam who is a well-known and reliable citizen, states that the Indians, just a week before, had killed Mr. Hinton at Wadkin's ranch on Rio Frio. The Wednesday following this murder, at a Mexican ranch on the Nueces, they attacked the sons of Mr. Pulliam, who were with a party of cowboys; killed a Mexican, and chased the sons, who escaped being well-mounted. On the next day they captured and stripped Ocas Shane near Adams ranch, and then shot him leaving him for dead.

The same day a party of the settlers led by Barchfield, had a fight with a strong force of Indians on Turkey creek, the result of which has not been received.

When troops are sent after these marauding savages, the latter can avoid them with the greatest ease, for their knowledge of the country is perfect, and the hills and thickets furnish ample concealment.

The Federal troops, officers and men, are doing all that they can to protect the frontier. But the system is wrong. To remain on the defensive when dealing with savages practically invites attack, for in any given raid the chances are ten or twenty to one, that the Indians will escape with their plunder, and avoid all chastisement.

The only successful method is the one adopted by General Sheridan in Montana. Assume the offensive constantly: Carry war into the heart of the Indian country; and attack the villages to extermination. Then the harassed frontier will have peace.

Important Decree.

THE McMULLEN GRANT.

United States Circuit Court sitting in chancery for the Western District of Texas at Austin.

March, 18th, 1870.

Maverick vs. In chancery No. 10. Howard's heirs and others.

On petition for leave to file a bill of service or bill of that nature.

The novelty and importance of the questions involved in this application, and the ability displayed by counsel in their examination and discussion, would render it proper for me to present at length the reasons for the conclusion to which my mind has been brought. But I have not time to do so.

In my opinion, the evidence entirely fails to establish any fraud, or professional misconduct, on the part of complainant's solicitor in obtaining the decree: nor do I see that there was any fraud upon the jurisdiction of the Court, or that there is any error of law, apparent upon the record. If the Court can look outside of the record of this case, with a view to open up the decree (which I very greatly doubt) and determine that the complainant's title is the same one that was before the Supreme Court in the case of McMullen vs. Hodge, still I would be reluctant to open the decree on that ground, for the authority of that case is rendered, at least to some extent, doubtful by the subsequent decision in the case of Trevino vs. Fernandez.

From all the facts apparent of record, and the evidence now presented on this application, it seems clear to me, that the failure of the defendant Maverick, to make a defence, or to take steps for his relief, within a reasonable time after the decree was rendered, by appeal or otherwise, resulted much more from his own laches and negligence, than from any accident, mistake or misfortune.

After the most careful considera-

tion of the whole subject, and of the authorities to which I have been referred, my opinion is that this application ought to be refused and costs thereof taxed to the defendant, and it is so ordered.

It is further ordered that the defendant do on or before the 1st day in April next, obey and conform to the decree of the Court or be subject to such further process as may be awarded against him.

Dr. Leigh Burton gave in Washington, the other day, some experiments showing that electricity may be practically employed as a heating agent.

Several French hospitals are now heated in this way, at a merely nominal cost.

An electric current is passed through a chain made up of alternate obstructions and free conductors, and the evolution of heat is the result. The success of the experiment has been admitted by practical men, and we may look soon to see electricity performing a new function as the servitor of man.

Cavalry Scout.

HEAD QUARTERS POST OF SAN ANTONIO, SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 5th, 1870. To 1st Lieutenant William C. Hemphill, U. S. 4th Cavalry, commanding company "G," U. S. 4th Cavalry, San Antonio, Texas.

SIR:—I enclose for your immediate attention and action, General Orders No. 26, current series, from these Headquarters. You have already received a certified copy of a telegram from General Reynolds, received this afternoon. That dispatch is all that I know of any Indian rumors, and I have telegraphed to the general to know which way he wants your company to move. Should no reply be received, you will start at reveille to-morrow, and scout in through by the head of the Medina, and thence to such point as from your judgment and from information which you may receive, you may believe may give you luck in finding Indians. All is left to your judgment, about dividing up your command. Should you come up with Indian signs, I do not hamper you with details, believing that your judgment in the field is better than mine here, as to what you are to do from hour to hour. I hope that you will have good luck. Look out well for your stock.

HEADQUARTERS COMPANY G, 4th U. S. Cav., San Antonio, Tex., March 24th, 1870.

CAPT. CHARLES P. SMITH, Post Adjutant, Captain.—I have the honor to report that in compliance with General Orders No. 26, dated San Antonio, Texas, March 5th, 1870, and letters of instruction same date, from Bvt Major General Carleton, I left San Antonio at day-light on the morning of the 6th of March, 1870, with one officer and 21 enlisted men of company G, 4th U. S. Cavalry, and proceeded on a scout after Indians.

March 6th.—Left San Antonio at day-light and proceeded to the San Geronimo river, and went into camp at 2 P. M., distance 25 miles. Wood and water plenty, grass middling.

March 7th.—Broke camp at day-break and proceeded to Bandera, on the Medina river, distance 25 miles, went into camp at 1 P. M., wood and water plenty, grass very good.

March 8th.—Broke camp at day-break and marched 15 miles up the Medina river, went into camp at 11 A. M. Wood, water and grass plenty.

March 9th.—Broke camp at 6 A. M. and travelled up the valley of the river, over the worst road ever traveled by wagons, for a distance of 20 miles. Went into camp at 3 A. M. Wood, water and grass in abundance. No fresh Indian sign.

March 10.—Remained in camp all day to rest the animals, and baking bread for the command. Weather rainy and disagreeable.

March 11th.—Broke camp at day-light, traveled north-west over an old trail for a distance of 21 miles, country very rough, and no Indian signs. Struck the Rio water hole, and went into camp at 2 P. M. Examined the surrounding country thoroughly, and found no signs of Indians.

March 12.—Broke camp at day-light and marched 12 miles down the stream, examining all folds and surrounding country carefully, and on the 13th marched back to the head of river, and on the 14th returned to the head of the Medina river, by a different route, finding no indications of Indians.

March 15th.—Remained in camp at the head of the Medina river, resting the animals and preparing for a trip to the Guadalupe river.

March 16th.—Broke camp at day-light and traveled due north for 20 miles, and struck the Guadalupe river near its head. Have examined the country carefully, and finding no signs of Indians, whatever. Went into camp at 1 P. M.

March 17th and 18th.—Traveled down the river, found several settlements and inquired about Indians, but none had been seen for some time past.

March 19th.—Crossed over to the Verde creek and camped near "old Camp Verde."

March 20th.—Left the Verde and examined the country between that and Bandera. Went into camp on the Medina and procured forage for the animals. Distance from the head of the Guadalupe 75 miles.

March 21st.—Left the Medina river and marched towards Antonio, which place I reached on the morning of the 23rd inst, having travelled 50 miles and finding no signs of Indians.

Whole distance traveled 274 miles. All persons encountered throughout the march were questioned in regard to Indian signs, but could give us definite information of any kind.

CHARLES MORGAN AND RAILROADS.—Mr. J. G. Tracy gives, through the Houston Union, a report of a recent interview with Mr. Charles Morgan, in New Orleans. We quote:

"He seems ambitious to build a railroad on the way to Texas, to connect with our Texas and New Orleans road at the State line, and says it is a popular error to suppose that because he has large sums invested in steamships, he is necessarily opposed to railroads. On the contrary, he argues that a railroad connection with Texas will largely increase his steamship business, especially in the line of freights. The Louisiana Legislature, however, has refused to grant him the right way to the Texas line, which, although it will not defeat his enterprise in the end, will delay immediate action."

The article in the Union strongly condemns the action of the Radical Legislature of Louisiana in subsidizing the Chattanooga Company's Texas railroad project to the amount of \$3,000,000, while refusing Mr. Morgan even the right way, without any subsidy whatever.

Among the other insurrections on foot in Mexico,—unless Mexican insurrections are all got up on horse-back,—is one recently announced in a meeting held at Tepic, which resolved that Chihuahua, Durango, Lower California, and portions of Jalisco and other States, confederate and declare their independence. The region has 135,325 square miles of territory, so-tipped-up as to increase its superficial area by 20 per cent, and 264,028 people, who spend most of their time in a nearly a horizontal position as the mountainous character of their country will permit. They have no government but that of the robbers, and no law but the pistol. Why such a people should need to declare so irate a fact as their independence, is one of the curiosities of Mexican politics.

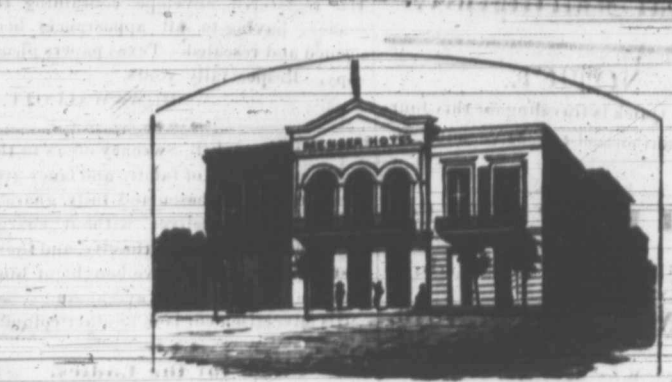


