**OUR CONGRESSMAN'S POSITION ON**  
**THE AMNESTY QUESTION.**—Many  
queries having been directed to us in  
regard to the views of our Represent-  
ative on the amnesty question, we  
give the following extract taken from  
the Washington Chronicle, which  
will place before the public his  
position as to amnesty. Comments,  
we make none leaving time to  
reveal the action of the acknowl-  
edged heads and leaders of our re-  
publican party. We know Mr. De-  
gener is a party man, and will follow  
the principles laid down in party  
caucus.

Immediately after the adjourn-  
ment of the House of Representa-  
tives yesterday afternoon the Clerk  
read a notice for a Republican cau-  
cus in the Hall of the House last  
night. It was understood that the  
object was to consider the pending  
**AMNESTY BILL.**

In pursuance of this notice about  
one hundred Radical members as-  
sembled, and immediately proceed-  
ed to business by calling upon Gen-  
eral Banks to preside, and appointing  
Mr. Platt, of Virginia secretary.  
The chairman stated the object of  
the meeting, and invited those present  
to submit their propositions and  
suggestions.

Mr. Degener, of Texas, was the  
first to accept the invitation, and  
opened the ball by advocating gen-  
eral amnesty for all political offen-  
ces. He alluded to the clause in the  
**CHICAGO PLATFORM.**

in relation to the disabilities im-  
posed by the fourteenth amendment to  
the Constitution, and argued that  
under it each State ought to deter-  
mine for itself at what period dis-  
qualification should cease. It was  
the best plan, he thought, to leave  
it to the States. He referred ap-  
provingly to the

**SCHURZ MOVEMENT IN MISSOURI,**  
and fully endorsed all that was done  
by those who were known as Schurz  
Republicans. He gave a number of  
reasons for general amnesty, and, in  
conclusion, offered a resolution de-  
claring that the Republicans in Con-  
gress would support a bill for the  
removal of all political disabilities,  
and requesting the Committee on  
Reconstruction to report such a bill.

We make the following extract  
from a Washington paper thinking  
it may prove interesting to some of  
our wine growers, as well as to the  
Internal Revenue Officers of our dis-  
trict. The protection and encour-  
agement thus afforded to the pro-  
duction of native wines, is commenda-  
ble indeed.

In portions of the Southern coun-  
try where wild grapes grow abund-  
antly the people have been, to a  
certain extent, and now to a large  
extent, in the habit of manufactur-  
ing a very excellent article of native  
wine from them. It was reported to  
the Internal Revenue Office on  
Saturday that certain of the revenue  
officers in those districts were assess-  
ing taxes on these parties for  
the manufacture of this wine, and  
the Acting Commissioner immedi-  
ately wrote a letter deciding that  
parties are not subject to any tax  
for such manufacture of native  
wine, nor to a tax as liquor dealers  
for selling the same at the place of  
manufacture.

This will be a good news to the  
representatives of what has grown to  
become a considerable interest  
in many sections of the South, and  
will also be an incentive to a much  
extended development of the wine-  
growing portions of the country.

The following is the last thing  
written by the late "Artemus Ward":  
"Ouf! quite recent I've bin a healthy  
individual. I'm nearly sixty, and  
yif I've got a musk in my ears  
which don't make my face resemble  
the tread of a canary bird when they  
fly out and hit a man. Only a few

from the shoulders and teaches the  
manny art of self-defence. And be-  
cause and said he was goin' in free,

and b'ldin', with a large yeller dog.  
I sed, "To be sure, sir, but not with  
that yeller dog." He sed, "Oh, yes!  
I sed, "Oh, no." He sed, "Do you

me a disgustin' blow in my left eye,  
which caused that concern to close  
for repairs; but he didn't hurt me  
any more. I went for him. I went  
for him energetically. His parents

state that fifteen minutes after I'd  
gone for him his mother, seein' the  
prostrate form of her son approach-  
ing the house, ran out docters, keefully  
looked him over, and sed, "My son,  
you've been foolin' round a trushin'  
mashen. You went in at the end  
where they put the grain in, and  
come out with the straw, and then  
got up in the thimgumagin' and let  
the hosses tread on you, didn't you  
my son?" You can imagine by this  
what a disagreeable person I am  
when I'm angry."

The Austin delegation to the Se-  
guin Convention was chosen, so

of publication, by a clique of wire-  
pullers; the whole affair was stock-  
ed, the nominee has not yet accept-  
ed, and the highest sincere Democ-  
racy won't touch him if he does, any  
more than will the Germans and  
colored voters who received such  
left handed compliments from him  
in 1866.

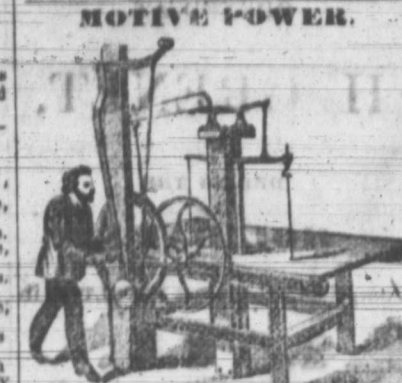
