A communication from the Board of Education, tendering for a reasonable sum the lands desired for said object, was read. The following resolutions were then read and adopted:

Be it resolved by the City Conneil of the

That ten acres, more or less, of the city lands situated on the west side the San Autonio river, near the head nd the river, immediately below the point here the ditch leaves the river, be tenered by the city of San Antonio to the State of Texas, for the purpose of erecting thereon a State Positentiary.

Resolved 2. That in ease the same should be accepted by the State, all water powers and privileges for running of any and all kinds of machinery, as well as for irrigation and all other purposes, be granted in connection with this donation, and tendered berewith.

Resolved 3. That in case of acceptance the State shall have free use of the adjacent city stone quarries for all purposes of building and improvement of the property so donated:

Resolved 4. That in case of acceptance the Mayor is hereby anthorized to make full and complete title to said property. together with all the powers and privileger above indicated.

Resolved 5. That the Mayor be request ed to communicate this proposition to the Legislature of the State of Texas, and to transmit therewith a copy of these reso Intions.

(Continued.) ARTICLE SECOND.

And when any bonds are issued by the city, a fund shall be provided to pay the interest and two per cent. per annum on the principal, as a sinking fund, to redeem the bonds, which fund shall not be diverted or drawn for any other purpose; and the or drawn for any other purpose; and the sity treasurer shall honor no draft drawn on said fund, except to pay interest or to redeem the bonds for which it was providredeem the bonds for which it was provided. And for the payment of such loan, to levy a special tax, over and above the general tax allowed by this act; provided, the rate of tax shall not exceed one-half of one per cent, and the rate of interest paid shall not exceed ten per cent; provided, also, no loan shall be made for any other payment or purposes ather than provided, also, no loan shart be made to any other purposes of purposes other than those connected with the corporation of said city; and no loan shall be made to aid any private enterprise, railroad or undertaking, not under the management and control of the city council. 
