city; to require that railroad tracks,  
turnouts and switches shall be constructed  
so as to interfere as little as possible with  
the ordinary travel and use of the streets,  
avenues and alleys, and that sufficient  
space shall be left on either side of said  
tracks for the safe and convenient passage  
of teams, carriages, and other vehicles and  
persons; to require railroad companies to  
keep in repair the streets, avenues or al-  
leys through which their track may run,  
if ordered by the city council, to light  
the same, and to construct and keep in re-  
pair suitable crossings at the intersections of  
streets, avenues and alleys, and ditches,  
sewers and culverts, when the city coun-  
cil shall deem necessary; to direct the use  
and regulate the speed of locomotive en-  
gines within said city, or prevent and pro-  
hibit the use or running of the same within  
the city.  
Sec. 100. Exclusively to prevent, con-  
trol and regulate everything connected  
with city railroads, and to make such  
rules and regulations for the same as the  
city council may deem necessary.

and adverbs, and is particularly

had never felt so solemn," this edit-  
ress makes it "so very solemn," and  
so on. Who is there that has not  
felt disgusted on picking up a book  
and finding passage after passage  
defaced by these amateur proof-  
readers? If a person who had never  
touched a pencil were to go into  
an artist's studio, and improve his  
picture by a dab of yellow ochre  
here, a slash of vermilion there and  
touches of his own everywhere, it  
would ruin the picture, and they  
would know it, and these unlearned  
literatures mar and disfigure books  
just the same way, and never dream  
that they are not improving them.

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**An Ordinance.**  
Enforcing the collecting of fines and costs  
imposed in the Recorder's court, not  
otherwise provided for.  
Be it ordained by the City Council of the  
City of San Antonio,  
Section 1. That in all cases where a fine  
or fine and imprisonment only, are pro-  
vided for by any Ordinance of the city, as  
a punishment for offenses committed in  
violation of any of the city Ordinances, the  
Recorder may order that in default of im-  
mediate payment of the fine and costs, the  
defendant be committed to the city prison  
or put to hard labor on the public works  
of the city, under the direction of the  
Police, until the fine and costs are paid,  
allowing one dollar per day until the sum  
amounts to that of the fine and costs.  
Sec. 2. Should a prisoner refuse to labor  
as directed, by virtue of any order or  
judgment of the Recorder's Court, and not  
be exonerated by reason of the city Physi-  
cians certificate of disability, then the  
officer having him or her in charge, shall  
place the person so refusing in solitary  
confinement, and feed him or her on bread  
and water only, until he or she may con-  
sent to work as required, or until the fine  
and costs are satisfied at the rates pro-  
vided for in the first section of this Ordinance.  
Sec. 3. Any prisoner wishing to be ex-  
onerated from labor under this Ordinance,  
shall apply to the city physician for an  
examination, and he shall certify as to the  
fact, and if he officially certifies that the  
prisoner is unable to work, that he shall  
be exonerated; provided the city physicians  
certificate shall not release the prisoner  
from confinement in the city prison, the  
time required to make the sum of the fine  
and costs, unless the city physician shall  
further officially certify that the impris-  
onment would cause great bodily injury to  
or endanger the life of the prisoner.  
Sec. 4. This Ordinance shall take effect  
and be in full force and effect from and  
after the date hereof.

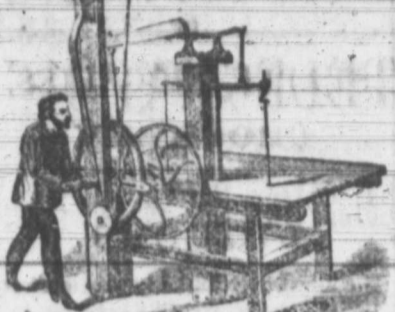

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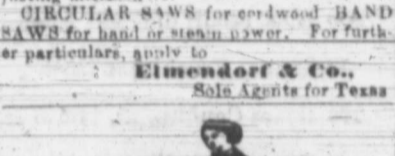
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
