#### New City Charter.

AN ACT to incorporate the city of San Antonio, and grant a new charter to said city, and to sepeal an act entitled." an act to incorporate the city of San Antonio," approved July 17, 1856, and an act cutified "an act to amend the act to incorporate the city of San Antonio," approved February 11, 1860.

ARTICLE SECOND. Powers of the mayor and council.

See. 85. To regulate the rate and quality of bread to be sold and used in the city, and, generally, everything relating to bakers, butchers, tavern-keepers, restaurants, truit venders, eating-bonses, and bar-rooms, except the price of the articles vended.

Sec. S6. To establish and regulate public pounds, and fo regulate the running at large of horses, mules, cattle, and sheep; to regulate, restrain, and prohibit the running at large of swine or other animals, and to authorize the distraining, impounding, and sale of the same for the costs of proceeding and the penalty incurred, and to impose penalties on the owners thereof for a vecistion of any ordinars in relation thereto.

Sec. 87. To tax, regulate, restrain, and prohibit the running at large of dogs, and to authorize the distraining, impounding, and destruction of the same, and to impose penalties on the owners and keepers there-

To prohibit and restrain the rolling of hoops, flying of kites firing of fire crackers, or firing of fire-arms or firefire crackers, or firing of fire-arms or fire-works, use of velocipedes, or use of any pyrotechnic or any other amusement or practice tending to annoy persons passing in the streets or sidewalks, or to frighten horses or teams; to restrain and prohibit the ringing of bells, blowing of horns or bugles, playing of street organs or other street music, crying of goods, and all other noises, practices, or performances tend-ing to the collection of persons on the streets and sidewalks, by auctioneers and others, for the purpose of business, amuse-ment; or otherwise.

comfort, in any manner they may deem

expedient, Sec. 90. To do all acts and make all regulations which may be necessary or expedient for the promotion of health or the suppression of disease,

#### A Change in the Indian Policy.

Our people, especially those upon our routier, will rejoice to learn that active measures have been taken to remove one of our "evil genusses" the Indians from their fastnesses in Mexico to the boundaries of a reservation in the United States. General Reynolds has already issued the necessary nstructions to an officer and the matter will receive immediate attention.

For years the Kickapoos, in conjunction with the Lepans and Comanches, have raided at will into our State, stolen and carried off an immense amount of our people's proty, and committed many high handed outes and murders. Persuit failing toovertake them this side of the Rio Grande, they have been perfectly safe upon the Mexican side, for Internal law protected them. Now the Kickapoos are to be removed to a reservation, and it is highly probable that the other tribes who refuse to go within reservation boundaries, will in event of giving further trouble be summarily dealt with or in case of escape to Mexico, that country will be held strictly accountable for the agressions that proceed from its soil.

Some time ago, this change for the better, in the Indian policy of the government was talked of, but we have waited so long. without any relief being afforded, that we were doutful of there being any weight in the report, until now we have the pleasing knowledge from Headquarters, that this initiating step to giving us some relief is to be taken. 
