The German Siege Guns,

DESCRIPTION OF THE ARTILLERY FOR THE BOMBARDMENT OF PARIS.

A correspondent of the London Times, of Dec. 17, furnishes the fol-lowing interesting description of the artillery with which the Germans are prepared to bombard Paris, and with which they are now reducing

The task of bringing up heavy guns from the interior of Germany to the neighborhood of Paris has been a very severe one; and I don't think it is generally known that it was not begun until the 9th of Oct. The Eastern Railway of France was not available until after the surren der of Toul, and when that well-defended little fortress had at length capitulated, it was necessary in various places to open the line before it could be used throughout, from Weisenburg to Nanteuil, where, until only a few days ago, an insuportable object in the way of further rogress toward Paris existed in

The first transport of siege guns from Weissenburg (conveyed thither from the interior of Germany) to Nanteuil was made ou the 9th of Qc tober, a formight or so after the capitulation of Toul. A provisional siege park, of siege park of recep-tion, was formed at Nuntenil; and from Nunteuil the guns were sent on under cavalry escort, and (to avoid the torts) by a very roundabout road to Villacoublay, where the park is established for supplying the siege batteries opposite Paris. On the 9th or 10th of October the first supply of siege guns, fourteen in number, were delivered at Nan-teuil, and the next day drawn up same those claims of its individual in the park, which by the way, covers, or did cover (for nearly all that constituted it a park has now been forwarded to Paris), a space of 25 notes. During the next nine days siege gans, chiefly of modern, and indeed quite recent manufacture, were delivered at Nanteuil in the following numbers: 14, 8, 14, 14, 15, 23, 14, 45, 13. Of the fast 13 guns six were rifled mortars of the Strasbourg "breach battery" patterns, carrying 2 cwt. shells - the only thoroughly new gun that the Prussians have introduced since the

1866 war. Up to the 20th of October, then, 160 siege guns had arrived at Nanteuil, en route for Villacoublay. But before the end of the mounth seventy more had arrived, so that by the 1st of November 230 siege guns, for the most part of the newest and lightest make and of the most penetrating quality, were either at Villacoublay, or on their way to that place. It was interesting at that time to see the various kinds of ar tillery collected at Nanteuil, and not less so the beautifully prepared ammunition, especially the elongat ed and almost elegant shells for the 200% weight rifled mortars, each packed earefully in its own peculiar case, surrounded and protected by hay, like bottles of valuable old

The artillery journey from Nantenil to Villacoublay, as I made is a short time since, extended over something like a hundred miles, and occupied us four days, which was one day less than usual.

On the subject of horses a curious dispute has arisen in Paris. Forage is so searce that a great many valnable animals are now being fed upon bread, and this, when made known, was pronounced scandalous. But if they slay their horses at once they destroy their chances for fresh meat for the future. A horse on the other hand, eats about as much bread in a day as would support ten citizens, and therefore it is asked whether it is worth while to keep him a month in order to enjoy, a few hundred kilos of fresh meat at the end of that period. There has been a good deal of arithmatic done on this question, and citizens, horses and bread have been multiplied, divided, subtracted, and added up till the Ministry are quite perplexed, and we believe no decision has yet been taken.

Wherefore she prays for citation by publication, for a decree of the said Hon. District Court, anniling and desolving the bonds of matrimony existing between the said Louis and Catharins, for costs, etc.

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
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
