A geological survey of the State will furnish valuable information to persons contemplating immigrawithin it. In regard to the Lunatic and other asylums and the Penitentiary I must again call your attention to the recommendations of my last message. An Ordinance.

Enforcing the collecting of snee and costs imposed in the Recorder's court, not otherwise provided fos.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of San Antonio.

Section 1. There is all onces where a fine or fine and imprisonment only, me provided for by any Ordinance of the city, as a punishment for offences committed in violation of any of the city Ordinances, the Recorder may order that in default of immediate payment of the fine and costs, the defendant be committed to the city prison or put to hard labor on the public works of the city, under the direction of the Police, until the fine and costs are paid, allowing one dollar per day until the sum amounts to that of the fine and costs.

Sec. 2 Should a prisoner refuse to labor when directed, by virtue of any order or judgment of the Recorder's Court, and not be excused by reason of the city Physicians certificate of disability, then the officer having him or her in charge, shall place the person so refusing in solitary confinement, and feed him or her on bread and water only, until the er she may consent to work as required, or until the fine sent to work as required, or until the fine

and water only, until he er she may con-sent to work as required, or until the fine and costs are satisfied at the rates provid-ed for in the first section of this Ordin-

ed for in the first section of this Ordinance.

See 3. Any prisoner wishing to be excessed from labor under this Ordinance, shall apply to the city physician for an examination, and he shall certify as to the fact, and if he officially certify that the prisoner is unable to work, then he shall be excused; previded the city physicians certificate shall not release the prisoner from confinement in the city prison, the time required to make the sum of the fine and costs, unless the city physician shall further officially certify that the imprisonment would cause great badily injury to, or endanger the life of the prisoner.

See 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication. Approved, San Antonio, Jan 12, 1, 1971.

New City Charter.

AN ACT to incorporate the city of San Antonio, and grant a new charter to said city, and to repeal an act entitled "an act to incorporate the city of San Au-tonio," approved July 17, 1856, and an act entitled "an act to amend the act to incorporate the city of San Autonio," approved February II, 1860.

(Continued.)

ARTICLE SEVENTH.

e Collection of taxes. Fourth. That the sale was conducted in the manner prescribed by law; and in all controversies and suits involving the title to land claimed and held under and by virtue of such deed, shall be required to prove, in order to defeat the said title, either that the land was not subject to taxation at the date of the sale; that the taxes or assessments had been paid; that the land had never been listed and assessed for taxation or assessment, as required by this act or some ordinance of the city, or that the same had been redeated. by this act or some ordinance of the city, or that the same had been redeemed according to the previsions of this act, and that such redemption was made for the use and hemafit of the persons having the right of redemption under the law; but no person shall be permitted to question the title acquired by the said deed without first showing that he, she, or they, or the person under whom he, she, or they claim title, had title to the land at the time of the sale, or that the title was obtained after the sale, and that all taxes due upon the land have been paid by such person, or the persons under whom he claims title as aforesaid; provided, however, that the owner of such property shall have the right to redeem the same at any time within two years of the day and date of sale thereof, upon paying to the purchaser double the amount of altaxes for which the same was sold, together with the cost of such sale, and double the amount of all taxes paid by the purchaser since such sale. The collector shall be entitled to charge the following fees: For each levy, one deliar; advertising, two since such sale. The collector shall be entitled to charge the following fees: For each levy, one deltar; advertising, two deltars on each piece of property; for a deed, two deltars, for certificate of redemption, one deltar. The collector shall bave full power to levy upon all personal property, to satisfy any tax imposed by this act. All taxes shall be a lien upon the property upon which they are assessed. And in case any property levied upon is about to be removed out of the city, the collector shall proceed to take into his collector shall proceed to take into his possession so much thereof as will pay the taxes assessed and costs of collection.

Sec. 186. If from any cause the sale of property levied upon or seized for taxes shall not take place at the time first appointed, the collector shall appoint sowe other time, give like notice, and proceed to sell such property in the manner prescribed in the first instance; and in case said property levied upon or seized for taxes cannot be sold on the day advertised, such sale may be postponed from day together. Prices nominal.

Such notice, shall be advertised in the official journal of the city, and also posted at the mayor's office, and at two different public places in the city; and at the expiration of such notice, and on the day therein specified, the collector shall proceed to sell such property at public anetion, in front of the court house door of the county of Bexar, or such other building as county of Bexar, or such other building as may be used for that purpose; provided, that when real estate or property is offered for safe, the smallest portion of ground shall be sold for which any person will take the same, and pay the taxes, costs and fees.


