A Tribute to Tom Corwin.
Ex-Governor Ashley delivered a
lecture in Chicago a day or two ago on
"Men and Measures during Ten
Years in Congress," and in the
course of his remarks spoke of Tho-
mas Corwin as follows:
Foremost among the genial and
companionable members of the
House stood Thomas Corwin, of
Ohio. He belonged to the ancient
regime, and had been distinguished
for wit and humor, as for active ser-
vice in Congress. He had been too
long a Whig to forget the teachings
of conservatism. He was ill at ease
in the new and aggressive Republi-
can Party. In his most radical ef-
forts he was far behind the speak-
er that the latter sometimes told
him that unless he adopted one side
he would drift down the current
and land in the ranks of his life-long
political opponents. He was never,
in any sense, a reformer; and after
giving his adhesion to the compro-
mise measures of 1850, including the
fugitive slave bill, he was always
classed by the radicals as an oppo-
nent of emancipation. At least he
was a national Unionist, and voted
for Mr. Lincoln in 1860. During
Mr. Ashley's service with him in the
House, occasionally in the excite-
ment of debate, he would address
the Speaker as Mr. President, and
the members as Senators, and then
stray into the abandoned fields of
whiggery, and eloquently elaborate
the beauties of conservatism. The
peculiar humor of Corwin made him
a general favorite among all parties.
As a man, few possessed more love-
able traits of character. He was
generous and noble in all his im-
pulses; never without a kind word
or witty expression to relieve the
embarrassments and asperities often
engendered by party strife. He
was keen without being malignant,
refined and elegant, and yet always
effective.
No man felt the hurt of a wound
inflicted by Corwin. When he
spoke, every part of his person
spoke, and his powers of ridicule
left small chance for reply. His
mobility of feature was very remark-
able, giving point and effectiveness
to his sentiments. He was a man
of simple nature, and remarkably
abstemious in his habits. Mr. Ash-
ley never saw him indulge, even in
a glass of wine at dinner. He had
ambition, but it was not arrogant
or selfish. His first aim was to ex-
cel as a debater. That he wished
to be President, and at one time la-
bored for it, is doubtless true, but
the failure did not trouble or sour
him, as it has so many. He will
ever have a place among our distin-
guished men. The speaker saw him
in the midst of a story with which
he was entertaining a party at
Washington, stricken with apoplexy
and death. Thus passed away
Thomas Corwin, the orator and
statesman, who in his last days
atoned for all his mistakes by his
devoted love of country, and the
unflinching faith with which he
served to serve her in the hour of
agony and despair.

**What the "Fat Contributor"
Knows About Farmers.**
Now that winter is approaching,
it would perhaps be as well to dis-
continue haying, and turn your at-
tention to getting in your Fall saw-
logs. No farmer can consider his
Fall work complete until he has his
cellar well supplied with sawlogs.
Scattered around the blazing hearth
of a winter's night there is no fruit
more delicious.
A correspondent asks us what we
think of late plowing. Plowing
should not be continued later than
10 or 11 o'clock at night. It gets
the horses in the habit of staying
out late, and unduly exposes the
plow. We have known plows to
acquire springhalt and inflammatory
rheumatism from late plowing.
Don't do it.
To an other correspondent who
wants us to suggest a good drain
on a farm we would say a heavy
mortgage at ten cents, will drain it
about as rapidly as anything we
know of.
When you make cider select no-
thing but the soundest turnips,
chopping them into sled length be-
fore cradling them. In boiling your
cider use plenty of ice, and when
boiled hang it up in the sun to dry.
A pickaxe should never be used
in picking apples. It has a ten-
dency to break down the vines and
damage the hives.
In sowing your winter applejack
a horse-rake will be found preferable

to a step-ladder. Step-ladders are
liable to freeze up, and are hardly
palatable unless boiled with sugar.
In cutting down hemlock trees
for canning, select the largest.
Don't throw away the chips, as they
make fine parlor ornaments, encas-
ed in rustic frames of salt and vin-
egar.
The coming cold weather should
suggest to the humane farmer the
necessity for a good cow shed. The
following is a good receipt for mak-
ing a good cow shed:
Pour a pallid of boiling hot water
on her back, and if that don't make
a good cow shed—her hair we are
no prophet to anybody.
Now is the time for planting your
Winter hay. The pink-eyed South
down is probably the best variety,
as it don't need polling, and begins
to lay early.
SOMETHING must be radically
wrong at West Point. For months
past we have had evidence of a lack
of discipline among the cadets not
at all creditable to the officers of
the Academy. It is more than sus-
pected that the latter have counte-
nanced the ignoring of the colored
cadet, and that they have winked
at the various impositions practised
upon him by his white comrades.
And now we have it that three stu-
dents at West Point were forcibly
dragged from their quarters at night
by the first class, taken to the moun-
tains and directed to leave forth-
with, under penalty of being tarred
and feathered. We learn from pri-
vate sources that the cadets instru-
mental in this outrage had the auda-
city to report their action to the
commandant and their reasons
therefor, and that the commandant
replied that "he would investigate,
but was not yet fully prepared to
indorse their course." If this is a
specimen of West Point discipline,
the Academy sorely needs recon-
structing. Washington Chronicle.

With a view of inducing Ger-
man immigrants who may arrive at
the port of New Orleans to remain
in the State, and also in order to
provide comfortably for the poorer
immigrants during their stay in the
city, the Louisiana Legislature last
winter passed a bill providing for
the erection of a suitable depot,
(something like Castle Garden, in
New York, probably) or house of
reception for German immigrants.
In this building new comers of this
class who may be destitute will be
temporarily cared for, fed, and shel-
tered, and furnished with all need-
ful information to aid them in es-
tablishing themselves in their new
home. The institution will be un-
der charge of the German Society of
New Orleans. Governor Warmoth
having recently signed the bill, it
has now become a law. This is a
good beginning in the immigration
system of Louisiana, and, if im-
proved upon as the importance of
the question involved deserves, and as
time shall develop the necessity of
a more extensive plan of encourage-
ment to immigrants, the State can-
not fail to reap a large benefit from
this wise legislation.

Some of even the warm-blooded animals bury themselves in the earth and remain in a state of partial stultification until the season is over, and the elixir of the spring sunshine stimulates their stagnant blood, and restores their vigor.

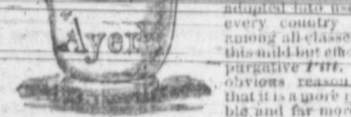

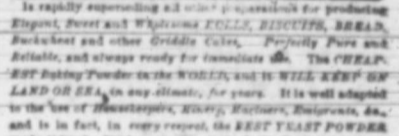

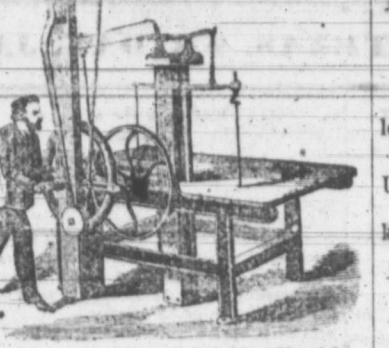
