Wool.

Wool has without doubt been used by mankind in the production of fabrics for clothing from the most remote period of the world's history. The great need of warm material to counteract the inclemency of Winter, especially in Northern climates, has tended in every age to create a demand for this useful commodity, which has hence become a staple in the markets of all nations.

The manufacture of woolen fabrics was introduced into Great Britain about the time of the Roman invasion, but there is little doubt that it was known to a limited extent even before this, as Phoenician merchants, previous to this period, traded with England for metals, especially tin, and doubtless wool was numbered among the numerous articles used in barter in those ancient times; and it is highly probable that the Aborigines of Great Britain, rude and uncouth as were their customs, were acquainted with some primitive method of manufacturing this commodity. As time progressed and Europe became populated, the growing of wool became one of the most important branches of industry.

As far back as the twelfth century, the manufacture of wool into cloth centered in the Counties of Suffolk and Buckinghamshire. Many towns in Yorkshire were also engaged in this production, and Yorkshire has now the largest woolen trade in the kingdom. Many towns in the West of England engaged in active competition, manifesting much energy and skill, and are now celebrated for peculiarly fine specimens of cloth of the best quality.

Spain at one period produced the choicest wools, but since the Merino sheep were imported into Saxony, Saxon wool has been in great demand, and is deemed by many to be the most valuable. Some descriptions of wool cannot be converted into fine cloth; therefore, choice lots of merino wools are much sought after. Germany at one time exported large quantities of wool into England, but since the colonization of the Cape of Good Hope and Australia, these latter places have competed most successfully, and now annually contribute especially to the English market, the largest amount of wool.

It is almost impossible to give any idea of the number of sheep required to supply the necessary amount of wool for one year. Indeed, it is not in the slightest degree necessary, as the mind would fail to grasp the truth on account of its magnitude.

In England, a few censuses of sheep have been taken, but at best

they were only approximations to the actual number; that at the early part of the present century stated the sheep at 26,000,000, and the wool at about 90,000,000 lbs. showing an average of about 3 1/2 lbs. of wool to each sheep.

The amount of wool produced depends very largely upon the breed. Some will only average 14 lbs. per sheep, but in favorable climates, where the pastures are abundant, an average of 8 or 10 lbs. is secured.

Jem Black, the Rat-Catcher of London.

A writer in the St. James' Magazine discourses, by way of a pleasant subject, on "The Vermine Destroyers of London." The article includes a memoir, with spicy personal anecdotes, of Mr. Tiffin, who holds the high office of "Bug Destroyer" to "Her Majesty;" and here are some of the reminiscences of Jem Black, a famous rat catcher who, we fancy, is not without imagination.

He once went to a cowkeeper's, where the animals could not lay down or eat their food for the rats, which used to get into the manger and fight at them. "I went to work there," said Mr. Black, "and actually took out three hundred rats from one hole in the wall; I had to carry them in my mouth and hands, and under my arms, and in bosom and pockets, to carry them to the cage." When in course of "sterminating" seven hundred rats at the residence of one Mrs. Browne, of Camdentown, Her Majesty's destroyer nearly got destroyed himself. He "was stooping down under the manger, when a cow heard the rats squeak and, butted him up against the bull; the bull was very savage, and he fainted, but he was picked up and washed, and then he came to."

He was "dreadful bit" on the same occasion, for he had to lie on the ground and push his naked arm into the hole until he could reach the rats. The vermine fastened upon him, and gnawed at his flesh so savagely that it was cut into ribbands and dreadfully lacerated. At a news near Russell square, Mr. Black destroyed a colony of rats that had taken up their quarters near a cartload of common bricks. They were under the floor and near the partition of the stable. When the wood-work was pulled down, the coachman said: "Well, rat ketcher, if you had been employed years ago, a great deal more corn would have gone into the horses."

The vermin had worried a pair of beautiful chestnut horses by gnawing away their hoofs, and had nearly driven them mad.

Mr. Black supplied most of the happy families in London. He sold rats to ladies who kept them in squirrel cages. He had sent members of the "large-tail species" to all parts of the globe, and nearly every town in England. Upward of three hundred were exported to France. He had rats of every color—fawn and white, black and white, brown and white, red and white, blue, black, and white; black, white and red. "People used to come from all parts of London to see his collection. At a shop in Leicester square he sold a female rat and six young ones for ten shillings. They were a beautiful and docile group, just like a sow suckling her pigs."

Only a word of encouragement—a single word! It gives to the drooping spirit new life, and the steps press on to victory.

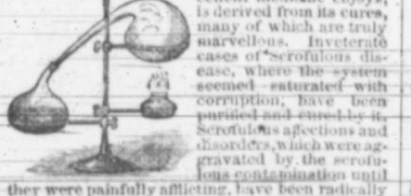
