THE CASHMERE GOAT.

Here is something that our agricultural, Industrial, and Stock raising Association would do well to consider, and make some researches upon the subject. If the Cashmere Goat will thrive in Nebraska, assuredly the temperament of Texas, would make the enterprise of Goat raising, a lucrative one.

An Ordinance

Enforcing the collecting of fines and costs imposed in the Recorder's court, not oth-orwise provided for.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of San Antonia.

Section 1. That in all cases where a fine or fine and imprisonment only, are provided for by any Ordinance of the city, as a punishment for offences committed in violation of any of the city ordinances, the Re-

punishment for offences committed in violation of any of the city ordinances, the Recorder may order that in default of immediate payment of the fine and costs, the defendant he committed to the city prison or
put to hard labor on the public works of the
city, under the direction of the Police, until
the line and costs are paid; allowing one
dollar per day until the sam amounts to
that of the fine and costs.
See, 2. Should a prisoner refuse to labor
when directed, by virtue of any order or
judgment of the Recorder's Court, and not
be excussed by reason of the City Physician's
certificate of disability, then the officer haying him or her in charge, shall place the
person so refusing in solitary confinement,
and feed him or her on bread-and water
only, until he or sie may consent to work
as required, or until the fine and costs are
satisfied at the rates provided for in the
first section of this ordinance.
See, 3. Any prisoner wishing to be ex*
cased from labor under this Ordinance,
shall apply to the city physician for an

cased from labor under this Ordinance, shall apply to the city physician for an examination, and he shall certify as to the fact, and if he officially certify that the prisoner is unable to work, then he shall be excused; provided the city physicians certificate shall not release the prisoner from confinement in the city prison, the time required to make the sum of the fine and costs, unless the city physician shall further officially certify that the imprisonment would cause great bodily injury to, or endanger the life of the prisoner.

The Morgan Monopoly.

Charles Morgan, whose rapacity and greed have manifested themselves in times past, in connection with his steamship line, has at last reached the bounds prescribed by human patience, and hereafter will find himself forced to pay some consideration to the wants, necessities and rights of the pub lic, or else see a rival company bearing off the hard dollars, that to his ears have had so pleasant a sound. The merchants of New Orleans and Galveston, have taken the initiatory, and a fine vessel, the Kelso, is now running between the two points in opposition to the Morgan line, and a few weeks will find two others in the trade.

Morgan, with all the arrogance of a monopolist, has adopted retaliatory measures, in the shape of charging those who patronize the other line (but who find one steamer not enough for the service) doable freight rates on all shipments which necessity forces them to make by his line.

We shall not go into the merits of the case, but lay the facts before the merchants of Wes' Texas, leaving them to judde how worthy and descrying of patronage a man is, whose mental calibre will allow him to stoop to such petty spite.

Now the teeth of this monopolist can be drawn, and the arrogant old gentleman rendered harmless, if our people will but act as a unit in frowning down his attempts to erush the opposition line that has been started.

The traffic and trade between the Cres cent City and Texas are sufficiently large to warfant the employ of half a dozen steamers, and the success of another line can be secured, if our people will but bestow upon

them a reasonable share of patronag Heretofore Morgan has always, by lower ing his rates, and losing a few thousands for the while, succeeded in warding off opposition, but the people have been too often caught in that trap to now be longer fool-As soon as opposition ceased Morgan would increase his rates to exorbitant proportions, and in his extortion, make up the sees sustained in running down his rivals. Let every merchant of West Texas instruct his shipping agent to use the vessels of the Morgan opposition, line so long as the rates as shown by authenticated records, still yesterday without interruption. are within reasonable bounds. By this means, Morgan will be brought to taw, and own the entire State of Texas.

Deep Plowing.

We gave space a few days since to an article upon the steam plow and the benefits of deep plowing. We herewith give a short paragraph from a Western paper, a practical attestation of the theory

We write to tell how much corn can be dised out here in the swamps and ponds We write to ten have made and ponds. Forty-five years ago the low lands of this township were sold for taxes, and when sold were not considered worth redeeming. We have disched and put in drain tile, and We have ditched and put in drain tile, and have just gathered eighteen hundred bush-

We have ditched and put is drain tile, and have inst gathered eighteen hundred bushels of sound corn oil from eighteen acres. We planted June the 6th and 7th, it being the third planting; the worms baving eaten up the two first plantings.

We give herewith our method of cultivation: The ground was broken eight inches deep, then harrowed until the ground was fine and well pulverized. Made furrows three feet nine inches apart and planted in drills. Tended the crop with weir's two-horse cultivator. As to the benefits resulting from deep plowing. I think there is nothing like breaking the ground deep in order to secure a good crop. Whother the season shall prove either wet or dry, I recommend plowing from eight to twelve inches deep. I think my ground is stronger, and produces better crops, on become of my method of cultivation; and I consider that I have been well paid for my labor.—This has been a very dry season, but it is quite certain that ditching and deep plowing have not hurt my corn. Let others beat the swamps of Indiana if they can.

The ills of Humpty Dumpty, thus described in the aucient ballads, seems to have found a paralell, thus attaching additional weight to the adage that history repeats itself. A great many years ago there existed such a thing as a Democratic party, which in the zenith of its power, was as flourishing as a green bay tree, and sat upon the walls of the Nation, guarding jealously the flesh pots which under the motto of "To the victor belongs the spoils" they were in full possession of. It is needless to count the ramineations and changes in the policies of this party, it being sufficient to recall only, the time when a nation needed assistance, and the Humpty Dumpty Democracy instead of affording it, became rather a drag and a detriment to the unity of a country, with all its glories of old time patriotism.

BAILROADS.

In our elippings we have strayed as the following in a Chicago paper. As the city of San Antonio has suffered pretty much as the town of Racine, it is pertment to the once, to give here the situation of Racine, and show the lesson to be learned from the experience not only of the past in our own city but of that "twenty other cities in Wisconsin upon whom the same blight has fallen."

Some fifteen years ago, the city of Racine, Wisconsin, subscribed \$200,000 in aid of railroads. The bonds were issued, but the railroads were a failure. For a few years the interest was paid, but the burden was too great; and the city pactically repudiated the whole debt. Nevertheless. the ruin had been wrought. Racine was set back. Capital and industry took alarm, and, through twelve years or more, the city has been struggling to recover from the misfortune that had fallen upon her. A number of citizens formed a "Racine A number of citizens formed a "Racine Bond Association." and have been engag-ed quietly for many years buying up such of the city bonds as they, could purchase, and on the 1st of January they made an exhibition of accounts. The outstanding city bonds, with accumulated interest amounted to \$653,277.28. The local bondholders voted to fund their bonds in nev ten-year bonds, bearing ten per cent in-terest, to an amount equal to what the bonds cost them, and interest at 10 per cent. By this arrangement, the nonmal amount of the debt was reduced from \$653, to \$322,504. The holders of the other bonds have not consented to a like arrangement. Even after this arrangement the amount is much larger than the original debt. The city proposes to tax itself armually to pay the interest and principal of this debt, and thus release Racine from the load which has so long borne her to the dust. There are twenty other cities in Wisconsin, upon whom the same blight of railroad subscriptions has fallen, who are not so fortunate as Racine. Though no interest is paid, the bonds are held by those who can walt, and these bonds stand is the way of any growth of the cities. \$653, to \$322,504. The debt is accumulating rapidly. In the meantime capital avoids all places where a judgment and execution against the city may be enforced at any moment by the United States Marshal. What is true of these Wisconsin cities is equally true of ownerous counties and towns in this State, and sooner or later who shall have the in Illinois.


