**NEW ORLEANS, Feb 2**—Cotton active—  
 middling 14 1/2 15. Gold 11 1/4.

**LONDON, Feb 2**—An official dispatch an-  
 nounces that Gen. Bourbaki's army, 80,000  
 strong, entered Switzerland to-day.

Gen. Changy accepts armistice.  
 Mails re-established between Paris, Havre  
 and Delpepe.

**LIVERPOOL, Feb 1**—Cotton dull, tending  
 down, Uplands 8 1/2, Orleans 8 1/2.

**NEW YORK, Feb 2**—Cotton quiet, weak—  
 Uplands 15 1/2, Orleans 16. Gold 11 1/4.

**MADRID, Jan 31**—At the grand review of  
 the army, 40,000 troops took the oath of fi-  
 delity to the King.

**WASHINGTON, Feb 2**—Senate—Business  
 unimportant.

House—Abolition of test oath was resum-  
 ed. Bill finally passed and goes to Presi-  
 dent.

**BORDEAUX, Feb 1**—Government issued a  
 decree ordering election for National As-  
 sembly on 8th of February.

It disqualifies for election to Assembly  
 members of families reigning over France  
 since 1789, and all who acted as imperial  
 official candidates in past elections, or held  
 office as Senators, Ministers or Counsellors  
 of State, under the Empire, and prefects  
 who have accepted office between 1851 and  
 1870.

Gambetta has issued a proclamation say-  
 ing: Frenchmen, Prussia believes the armis-  
 tice will dissolve our armies and secure  
 the election of a Chamber ready to consti-  
 tute a shameful peace. It is necessary to  
 make the armistice a period for instruction  
 of our young troops, to continue with un-  
 relaxed vigor organization for defense; war  
 while you install a national republican As-  
 sembly who are willing to make such peace  
 only as is compatible with the honor, rank,  
 and integrity of France.

**VERSAILLES, Feb 1**—Bismarck indisposed  
 —was visited by the Emperor.

**NEW YORK, Feb 2**—Gold very strong and  
 active, opening at 11 1/4; down to 4, up to 11 1/4

**LELLE, Feb 2**—In favor of peace. Le Pro-  
 gress repudiates forever all wars of conquest  
 and demands that no negotiations be made  
 with Prussians while on French soil.

**LIVERPOOL, Feb 2**—Cotton flat and irreg-  
 ular; Uplands 7 1/2, Orleans 8.

**LONDON, Feb 2**—Entrance of Bourbaki's  
 army into Switzerland effected.

Bureau for receiving and forwarding pro-  
 visions to Paris has been established at  
 Dieppe.

Bourbaki's army reached Switzerland—  
 many thousands died of starvation. 15,000  
 taken prisoners.

Ten million people would vote for resto-  
 ration of the empire to-morrow.

France will refuse to continue war.  
 The mobiles are arriving at Bordeaux  
 and shouting "Vive La Emperor."

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.**—Manteloff re-  
 ports that previous to the armistice he  
 captured ten guns, seven metraillences  
 and four thousand prisoners. German loss  
 small.

Armistice is accepted by all parties ex-  
 cept Marseilles.

Jules Favre confesses he had overstated  
 the supplies of Paris, and appealed to the  
 Emperor to pity Paris and hurry up sup-  
 plies.

In complying, the Emperor sent forward  
 six million rations and fifteen thousand  
 cattle.

The Prussians have dismounted guns  
 from the walls of Paris, and are strength-  
 ening their positions against the possible  
 failure of peace.

**NEW YORK, Feb. 3.**—Cotton dull; Up-

It is believed that many of the delegates  
 elected will favor peace on any bearable  
 terms.

Jules Favre telegraphs that the Ger-  
 mans will forbid elections in Alsace.

**Horrors of the Bombardment.**

**LONDON, Jan. 16—9:30 P. M.**—Paris news-  
 papers of the 10th inst. unite in saying  
 that the rain of projectiles, some weighing  
 95 kilograms, unparaleled in the his-  
 tory of sieges, was pouring into that por-  
 tion of Paris lying between the Hotel de  
 Invalides and Odessa. The bombardment  
 continues without interruption throughout  
 day and night, and was so violent on the  
 night of the 9th, between the church of St.  
 Sulpice and the Museum, that shells fell  
 every two minutes. The hospitals, ambu-  
 lances, schools, public libraries, and  
 churches of St. Sulpice, Sabarrouse, and  
 Val de Grace and many private houses have  
 been struck. The number is unknown.

Women were killed both in streets and  
 in their beds, and infants in their mothers'  
 arms. One projectile, which fell in Rue  
 Vanouard, killed four children and wound-  
 ed five others.

The unrivaled works of art in Luxem-  
 burg Museum were destroyed. The hospi-  
 tal Val de Grace suffered greatly, and  
 many of the wounded soldiers there, were  
 killed in their beds. Paris is transformed  
 into a battle field, in which the women  
 show themselves as brave as men.

"MUTTON HAMS" are among the smoked  
 luxuries of Georgia, and promise to become  
 as articles of food, a source of commercial  
 revenue to the State.

General Market Report.

FRIDAY EVENING, Jan. 27.

A considerable dullness pervades all branches of the wholesale trade. Grocers and Provision dealers are doing a satisfactory business, but in most other branches everything is quiet. Freights still continue at highest rates, and a great want of increased transportation facilities is felt. From the fact that transportation is hardly to be found at all, even at the present exceedingly high rate, many goods are becoming scarce in our market, and a general rise is noticed in all bulky and heavy goods.

SATURDAY, Jan. 28, 1871.

Hides—Still arrive freely. Sales for the week about 17,500 lbs.

For Texas, 5 to 15 lbs, 16 1/2c  
do 15 to 25 lbs, 13 1/2c  
do 25 to — lbs, 11 1/2c

A fine lot of Mexican hides, about 12,000 pounds, all that arrived this week, bought on private terms.

Wool—In this staple, we have to report about 60 bales from abroad, making no lodgment here, having been carried over for better quotations, and in transit to the Coast for orders.

The reports from the North, per account sales, for short clip of November, are satisfactory. With the above exceptions, and large arrivals from Mexico, falling elsewhere, to order, we have nothing new to report.

The 14,600 B. which were bought to arrive from Mexico that week, arrived Wednesday and passed forward to New Brunswick Manufacturing Co.

COTTON—The shipments for the week to Mexico amount to about 400 bales. With the prospect of a speedy close of the European war, prices are stiffening, and upon the return of peace, will, no doubt, continue to improve. Quotations nominal, 9 1/2 @ 10c.

DRY GOODS—A general dullness prevails in that line, as is usual at this season. We do not expect much improvement before March. Staple goods, especially cotton goods are somewhat declining, while all goods of French manufacture as silks, ribbons and fancy goods have advanced from 2 1/2 to 50 per cent.

FREIGHTS—Are still rising. There being no grain, and most of our farmers having returned to their homes, to prepare for the cultivation of the soil, there is no prospect of an improvement until spring. One train was loaded this week for Stockton at \$4 1/2 1000b.

CORN—We noticed considerable arrivals from Mexico, partly sold to government contractors, and the remainder to private consumers, at prices ranging from \$1.35 to \$1.50. To-day we hear of some parties offering \$1.60.

An Ordinance

Enforcing the collecting of fines and costs imposed in the Recorder's court, not otherwise provided for.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio.

Section 1. That in all cases where a fine or fine and imprisonment only, are provided for by any Ordinance of the city, as a punishment for offenses committed in violation of any of the city ordinances, the Recorder may order that in default of immediate payment of the fine and costs, the defendant be committed to the city prison or put to hard labor on the public works of the city, under the direction of the Police, until the fine and costs are paid; allowing one dollar per day until the sum amounts to that of the fine and costs.

Sec. 2. Should a prisoner refuse to labor when directed, by virtue of any order or judgment of the Recorder's Court, and not be excused by reason of the City Physician's certificate of disability, then the officer having him or her in charge, shall place the person on refusing in solitary confinement, and feed him or her on bread and water only, until he or she may consent to work as required, or until the fine and costs are satisfied at the rates provided for in the first section of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Any prisoner willing to be excused from labor under this Ordinance, shall apply to the city physician for an examination, and he shall certify as to the fact, and if he officially certifies that the prisoner is unable to work, then he shall be excused; provided the city physician's certificate shall not release the prisoner from confinement in the city prison, the time required to make the sum of the fine and costs, unless the city physician shall further officially certify that the imprisonment would cause great bodily injury to, or endanger the life of the prisoner.

Sec. 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.
