Wasted Hears.

One hour a day is three hundred and sixty five hours a year, which, reckoning ten hours as a day's work, amounts to thirty-six days. That is to say, by saving one hour a day, we can save thirty-six full working days in a year's time. Again, three hundred and sixty-five hours are equal to seventy-three days, offive hours each, and it has been computed that two bundred such days closely devoted to reading are sufficient to make an individual of ordinary intelligence thoroughly con-versant with English literature. That is to say, by reading one hour each day, we can become at the end of three years well read individuals. These striking estimates should be forced home particularly on the attention of those who daily waste an hour or more in bed durnig the win-ter mornings; who lie half sleeping, half waking, waiting for someloody to strike a light and kindle the fire; who, in stead of resolutely spring-ing from their conches and applying themselves to some kind of labor indolently wait upon the movements of domestics. This habit, so tempting and tenacious, once fixed, costs individual very many of the most precious bours of his life.

The above suggestions are worthy of the consideration of those who complain, as a justification for ignorarce, that they have no time to read; that there is never a moment to spare for books. How many wasted moments could such persons count up every night before retiring! Those who spend their evenings at corner grocery or tavern; who exconvivial companions; who tarry long over dinners; who devote night after night to the theaters and other places of amusement, which are neither instructive nor elevating; who sit round the fire, hour after hour, gossiping about neighbors, magnifying their faults and belittling their virtues; who devote the hours of market who devote the dev the hours of car or bont passage to and from business, to small talk or to the reading of the unimportant dissipating details, personal centre-versies, scandals, and revelations with which daily papers are too often padded; who promenade the avenues in fine linen, to see and to be seen who squander the summer month at watering places and other fashionable resorts - should, one and all, count up their misspent hours for one week, if they would realize how large a portion of their lives absolutely goes to waste. 

WE observe by our exchanges, that more and more attention is being daily given to: the consideration of the cheap method of constructing railways through sections of country where heavy, goods are transport-

In our ewn State, where capital lascarce and the cost of construction necessarily high, on account of the deficiency of labor, the narrow guage should be popular for all roads. The city of Houston, we believes has the honor of being the starting point of the first of these, should be successful enterprises; the projected line running to New Braunfels and thence to San Antonio,

In other portions of our country, in Ohio, and in many States further to the West. the narrow guage has become popular, for its fully serving the purpose of freighting teavy goods. Coal, iron, ore, copper and so forth one be carried at cheaper rates, with less wear and tear to the road, than can the same material be transported overa broad gnage.

Another thing, small towns and com-munities can club together and pash these roads to complection without burdening themselves with enormous debts. The cost is so small, compared with the outlay for broad guage roads, that a very light tax suffices to put these roads in working order. We hope that the company started at Houston, will som put its hands to work, and by a practical showing of the merits of these roads, induce other sections of our State to fellow in their foodsteps. There is no doubt but that millions of money, may in shis way be saved to our State, that otherwise would be expended in constructing roads of broader guage, without any material advantages, over the narrow roads.

The encouraging news reaches as from Washington that Mr. Finklenburg, of Missouri, introduced a bill in the House creating a National Bureau of Immigration. which, it seems has every prespect of bein persed. Since our Legislature has prefer red to waste its time and the money of th State in special and railroad legislation, at reated the matter of immigration with ut ter contempt, we rejoice in seeing at last the light beaming upon as from another di-rection, and we forwently hope it will shine bright enough to expose all the private peculation on immigration which is nov trying to work its way into our legislation

We are fully convinced that a well regulated Immigration Bureau would have made our State powerful and wealthy in a few years, and that every cent invested by the State in this matter, would have been re-paid to her a thousand fold. But our states-men concluded otherwise, and the Bureau of Immigration as provided in the Constitution of Texas, will probably remain more ornamental to the State than useful.

The bill of Mr. Finklenburg creates a bu rean of immigration, but places the whole matter under the control of the Secretary of the Treasury, with a superintendent at the port of New York, and making the U.S. Collectors at all other ports ex officio superintendents of immigration. It provides for a uniform system that shall supply emigrants from Europe and from Asia with accurate and indispensable information in advance, accomplish great reforms in trans portation by sea and land, and secure am ple protection, after arrival in this country, against the tricks of swindling agents and runners," and against the inconvenience of confficting legislative enactments in different States and conflicting police regulations in different ports. 


