TELEGRAPHIC
LONDON, March 18.—In the House of Lords to-night Earl Granville announced the conference on the Eastern question closed; that a treaty had been signed at foreign office, abrogating restriction on admission of foreign men-of-war into Dardanelles and other ports in time of peace. The Danubian Commission is prolonged twelve years. It expressly declares that no power can relieve itself of the obligation of the treaty without the consent of all signatories. Emperor William has set out on return to Berlin, accompanied by a large and brilliant suite of friends and aides of the army and representatives of the German parliament. The party that received him at noon to-day were received with great enthusiasm by returning troops with whom the emperor was escorted. The matrons of the National Guard at Mont-Marte have announced their return. The city is triumphantly celebrating the anniversary of the fall of the Bastille. A deeper violation of the government of Versailles, Nancy and Roubaix. The Germans have relinquished control of the occupied provinces, in respect to religion and education but will retain the management of the postal, railway and telegraph services. The North German official gazette says unless France protests provincial Germans returning to their homes and associations, reprisals will be made. Arkansas politics have assumed a new phase. Lieut. Gov. Johnson resigned, because the Secretary of State, one of Clayton's men, was elected Lieutenant Governor, and Clayton was again in the arena for United States Senator. A special to the Memphis Avalanche accuses Johnson of selling out. WASHINGTON, March 14.—The Republican of this morning says the Secretary of War yesterday telegraphed to General Terry, commanding Department of the South, to send at once all the available troops to Chester and York counties, South Carolina, to assist in putting down the insurrection and maintaining peace. Paris, March 14.—The Paris and Lyons railroad will be placed in the hands of its former managers to-morrow. Several policemen were mobbed. The press urged stringent measures. LONDON, March 14.—King William has arrived at Nancy; goes home via Metz. The final meeting of the Black Sea Conference will take place to-day. The government decided to send an immediate reply whether the despatch calling Germans from France had been annulled. Favre asked time to reply granted. Herz Fabrice has been appointed to the chief administration of the occupied French provinces. St. Petersburg, March 14.—The existence of a secret treaty between Russia and Prussia is officially denied. Brussels, March 14.—Renouncing French prisoners leave their arms in the hands of the Belgians. WASHINGTON, March 14.—Senate.—Mr. Sherman called Mr. Sumner to order while reading his Dominican petition, upon point of order that foreigners could not petition to Congress. President Colfax sustained the point of order. The bill to amend the act directing the Secretary of War to survey the channel connecting the Mississippi river with the Gulf of Mexico. Beck's general amnesty bill reappeared upon motion to reconsider the vote, by which the bill was referred to the Judiciary Committee the effect of which was to put in a passage. Mr. Beck accepted the amendment excluding from its benefits certain classes, explaining that without these exclusions the bill would have no chance. The extending committee members of Congress who abandoned their seats for the rebellion, and officers of the army and navy over twenty-one, who joined the rebellion and members of conventions which adopted ordinances of secession and who voted for the same. Quite a long debate ensued when finally the bill failed—vote 120 against 22, not two-thirds. Adjourned. WASHINGTON, March 14.—The joint committee on commerce recommended substantially the adoption of Hunter's Ke-Kur bill. It authorizes the President to employ troops to suppress disorders without requisitions from the State governments. It also establishes an elaborate code for the trial and punishment of Ke-Kur by Federal courts. Any one of a designated band made punishable for acts of undetected members, the damages from such hands shall be payable by the counties wherein the disorder occurs. Jones shall take the iron-clad oath. His report was discussed three hours in caucus, with a strong opposition to both the military and judicial features of the bill in the Senate caucus, which adjourned to ten o'clock to-morrow without action. House caucus meets to-night to consider the report. It is believed the Senate caucus will order the bill to be put on its passage without material modification. The following appointments are confirmed: Cruise, Postmaster at Athens, Ga.; Chas. F. Benjamin, Clerk of the Southern Loyalist Claims Commission. Nominations: Walker N. Smith, Assistant Attorney General; Wm. Mitchell, Solicitor of Internal Revenue; Conant, Marshal of North Florida; Michers, Appraiser of Merchandise for Mobile. Private dispatches from Little Rock report Clayton's election to the Senate. Concord, March 14.—Election returns up to one o'clock indicate that the Republicans hold their own. Later—an incomplete vote indicates a plurality for the Democrats and leaves the result in doubt. Chicago, March 14.—Pembino dates to the 25th, report another revolt on the part of the Canadian troops; the situation is utterly lawless. THE Boston Times thinks the income tax should be styled the Bountwell grip. LOUISIANA'S debt is \$28,000,000.

[GENERAL NATURAL—No. 26.]
AN ACT making appropriations for the consular and diplomatic service of the United States for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and for other purposes.
Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the following sums, and the same are hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the objects hereinafter expressed, for the fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, to-wit:
For salary of envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to Great Britain and France, at seventeen thousand five hundred dollars each, thirty-five thousand dollars.
To Russia, Prussia, Spain, Austria, Brazil, Mexico, China, and Italy, at five thousand dollars each, twenty-five thousand dollars.
To Chili, Peru, and Japan, ten thousand dollars each, thirty thousand dollars.
For ministers resident at Portugal, Switzerland, Greece, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Turkey, Ecuador, New Granada, Bolivia, Venezuela, Nicaragua, San Domingo, Costa Rica, Honduras, and Salvador, at seven thousand five hundred dollars each, one hundred and thirty-five thousand dollars.

For minister to Uruguay, accredited also to Paraguay, eleven thousand two hundred and fifty dollars.

For expenses under the contract, one hundred thousand dollars.
For expenses incurred under instructions of the Secretary of State of bringing home from foreign countries persons charged with crimes, and expenses incident thereto, including loss by exchange, five thousand dollars.
For relief and protection of American seamen in foreign countries, one hundred thousand dollars.
For expenses which may be incurred in acknowledging the services of masters and crews of foreign vessels in receiving American citizens from ships, five hundred dollars.
For payment of the seventh annual installment of the proportion contributed by the United States toward the capitalization of the Suez Canal, fifty-five thousand five hundred and eighty-four dollars; and for such further sum, not exceeding five thousand dollars, as may be necessary to carry out the stipulations of the treaty between the United States and England.
To pay to the government of Great Britain and Ireland the second and last installment of the amount awarded by the commissioners under the treaty of July one, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, in satisfaction of the claims of the Hudson's Bay and the International Agricultural Company, three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars in gold coin. Law 26.
That before payment shall be made of that portion of the above sum awarded to the Fugate Sound Agricultural Company, all taxes legally assessed against the property of said company, owned by said award, before the same was made, and still unpaid, shall be extinguished by said Fugate Sound Agricultural Company; or the amount of such taxes shall be withheld by the Government of the United States from the sum hereby appropriated.

Among this wandering mail, was a letter of Mr. Warrmann's, containing drafts to the amount of three or four thousand dollars, remitted to this city, and which had already been considered lost beyond recovery.

Of course, its arrival was a relief to all parties, and especially to the postmasters at both points. As yet it has been impossible to determine where the fault lies regarding the sending of this package off its regular route. It is pretty well shown that it cannot be the office here, for the arrangements of, and checks upon the post-office system, here, are such that it could not happen, as it would require the same error at the hands of three different employees, at three different times of handling, to send a package astray. All other offices in the State lack the care and system that prevails in the San Antonio office, so to some of them we ascribe the error.

We had the pleasure yesterday of examining a work of art, from the hands of Mrs. J. M. Harwell, paid work being a life-like portrait of our fellow citizen, S. G. Newton, taken with the Masonic dress, and given by the touches of the painter's hands, all the richness of colors and shade that makes the picture an almost portraiture. To the person of taste the style of painting affords a fine opportunity for study of those intricacies of the art, that books fail to contain theories of; intricacies wherein the subject for sketch or painting becomes a study, and the most striking peculiarities of the person sketched enter with such fidelity into the painting, that the effect of semblance is considerably heightened. We have seen the Colonel a hundred times, looking just as he looks in the picture.

He has an earnest, thoughtful look in the picture, but none of that stiffness that ar-

ists are so wont to infuse into a portrait. The dress, the effects of shadow, the neutral tints of the background show a skillful and experienced training on the part of the lady artist. We accord it the highest encomiums. First, because it is deserving of them; second, because the art is of the highest order of refined judgment and cultivated taste; and lastly, because we feel that Mrs. Harwell has fully sustained the reputation she brought with her, of an artist of rare merit and promise. The picture is for the Masonic Lodge, over which Col. Newton presides, and it must ever be appreciated as a faithful and striking likeness of him, that will outlast perhaps a century. Mrs. Harwell deserves the patronage and encouragement of our entire community.

COLUMBUS UPSON, Esq., announced himself as the Attorney of C. B. Owsley, the man who penned the libellous Herald article against Judge Gamble. The State's attorney endeavored to prove that this Owsley was a strolling penny-a-liner, without a residence or character. Columbus said he would admit that Owsley had joined the radical party since the writing of the libel, when the witness, Dr. Slocum, very happily replied, that he was willing to swear that Owsley had greatly improved in character since his conversion to radicalism.

Columbus got a Rowland for his Oliver, that time.

THE counsel for Logan, in their speeches in his defense for the libel of Judge Gamble, were exceedingly laudatory of our worthy District Attorney, Mr. Dittmar. They declared him "the ablest, most faithful, most energetic, and most successful" attorney who ever represented the State in this country. We are glad to know there is at least one officer appointed by Gov. Davis who gives satisfaction to these captious political schemers—for be it known, that Logan was defended by nearly every ardent Democrat of the San Antonio bar. But we cannot conjecture why they should bestow such damaging praise, unless it be in fear of further "informations" for libel; for, in the same breath, they asserted that Mr. Dittmar would not have informed against the Herald men. Perhaps not, but we believe otherwise. How a State's Attorney could be "faithful" and do otherwise, may appear plain to Devine, Upson & Co., but will not be apparent to anybody else, who ever read the infamous and vulgar slander of the Herald. But the leading attorney for the defense, was energetically indignant because the information was filed by a carpet-bagger. There are those who will remember when he was also a carpet-bagger, and a district attorney, but the difference is, that was long ago. Neither Nova Scotia nor New York felt the loss when Logan's chief defenders shouldered their carpet-bags and came to the wilds of Texas. It is time for them to move again, to a more barbarous region, for their peculiar notions to be appreciated.

The San Pedro Springs have become decidedly a popular place of late, and the road thither a fashionable drive. Just at this season of the year the beauties of the place are manifesting themselves in the shape of beautiful green stretches of prairie, and blooming shrubbery, while the air is laden with a thousand perfumes of the wild flowers of dale and hillside. Duerler, the lessee of the park, is as genial and obliging as of yore, and takes delight in doing the honors of the place. His arrangements for fishing, boating, and his collection of animals, are both worth a visit to see them. It is contemplated to again run the omnibus between our city and the Springs.

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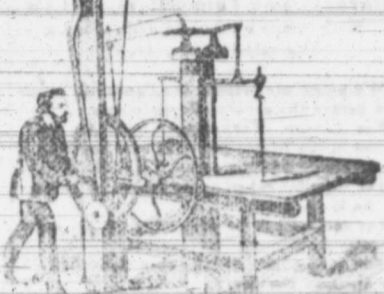
