OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Third Session of the Forty-first Congress.

[GENERAL NATURE—No. 35.]

AN ACT to provide for the better security of life on board of vessels propelled in whole or in part by steam, and for other purposes.

Sec. 52. And be it further enacted, That every steamer navigating the ocean, or any lake, bay, or sound of the United States, shall be provided with such numbers of life boats, rafts, life-preservers, and drags, as will best secure the safety of all persons on board such vessel...

Sec. 53. And be it further enacted, That every sea-going steamer, and every steamer navigating the great northern or northwestern lakes, carrying passengers, the building of which shall be completed after six months from the passage of this act, shall have not less than three water-tight cross-bulkheads, said bulkheads to reach to the main deck in single-decked vessels, otherwise to the deck next below the main deck; the same to be made of iron plates, sustained upon suitable frame-work, and properly secured to the hull of the vessel; the position of material of which the same shall be constructed to be determined by the general rules of the board of supervising inspectors.

Sec. 54. And be it further enacted, That if any licensed officer shall, to the hindrance of commerce, wrongfully or unreasonably refuse to serve in his official capacity on any steamer, as authorized by the terms of his certificate of license, or shall fail to deliver to the applicant for such service at the time of such refusal, if the same shall be demanded, a statement in writing as to the reasons for such refusal, or if any pilot or engineer shall refuse to admit into the pilot-house or engine-room any person whom the master or owner of the vessel may license shall be revoked on the same proceedings as are here provided in other cases of revocation of such license.

Sec. 55. And be it further enacted, That every captain, engineer, or pilot, or other person employed on any steamboat or vessel, by whose misconduct, negligence, or inattention to his or their respective duties on such vessel, the life of any person shall be destroyed, or in consequence of fraud, connivance, misconduct, or violation of law by any owner or inspector, or other public officer, the life of any person shall be destroyed, he or they shall be deemed guilty of manslaughter, and, upon conviction thereof before any circuit court of the United States, shall be sentenced to confinement at hard labor for a period of not more than ten years.

Sec. 56. And be it further enacted, That every sea-going steamer, and every steamer navigating the great northern or northwestern lakes, carrying passengers, the building of which shall be completed after six months from the passage of this act, shall have not less than three water-tight cross-bulkheads, said bulkheads to reach to the main deck in single-decked vessels, otherwise to the deck next below the main deck; the same to be made of iron plates, sustained upon suitable frame-work, and properly secured to the hull of the vessel; the position of material of which the same shall be constructed to be determined by the general rules of the board of supervising inspectors.

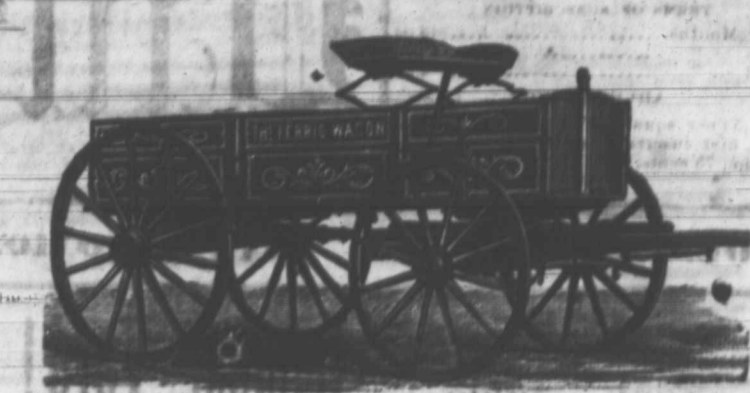

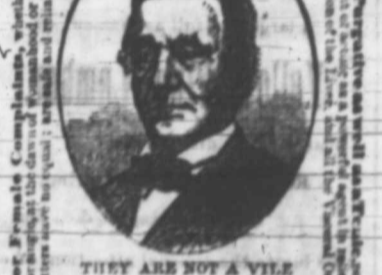

AN ORDINANCE Providing for the Assessment for the fiscal year of 1871.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio, That all persons owning property within the city of San Antonio, liable to be taxed and all taxable residents, be required to render their property and persons for assessment; and that the City Assessor shall complete such assessment on or before the 1st day of June, A. D. 1871.

SECTION 2. That in all cases of failure to render property for assessment, as above provided, the Assessor shall proceed to assess the same, and for such failure shall add thereto ten per cent of the taxes so assessed.

SECTION 3. That each and every person rendering property for assessment shall take and subscribe the following oath, before the Assessor, who is hereby authorized to administer the oath, and which shall be attached to each assessment list: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that, to the best of my knowledge, information and belief, the annexed statements contain true and correct and complete lists of all property, money and credits within the city of San Antonio, which I am required to list, acting for myself or for any one whom I may represent, and of all, subject on account of which, I am in any capacity, chargeable for taxes; and that in my opinion, the valuations of property listed are not below the fair cash value thereof. So help me God."

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication. Approved, San Antonio, March 28, A. D. 1871. WM. C. A. THIELEPAPE, Mayor, City of San Antonio.

AN ORDINANCE Amending an ordinance regulating the Markets of the City of San Antonio, approved December 19, 1870.

SECTION 1st. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of San Antonio, That no person who has once rented a stall in one of the Market Houses of the City, and has given up or quit such stall, shall be permitted again to rent the stall so given up or quit, until after the expiration of twelve months from the time of so quitting or giving up the same.

SECTION 2. That issues of stall may deliver to their customers, at any time, any articles sold by them provided the same shall have been first exposed in the Market House for the inspection of the Market Master and any person violating the provisions hereof, by failing or refusing to subject such articles to the inspection of the Market Master, before the delivery of the same, shall be fined not less than Five dollars nor more than fifty dollars and costs, and in default of payment shall be committed to labor on the public works of the City as provided by ordinance.

SECTION 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication. Approved, San Antonio, March 28, A. D. 1871. WM. C. A. THIELEPAPE, Mayor City of San Antonio.
