And any Indian agent, or sther person in the employment of the United States, who shall, in viola-tion of the provisions of this section, ad-vise, sanction, or in any way aid in the vise, sanction, or in any way aid in the making of such contracts or agreements, or in making such payments as are here prohibited, shall, in addition to the punishment herein imposed on the person making said contract, or receiving said money, be, on conviction, dismissed from the service of the United States, and be forever disqualified from holding any office of profit or trust under the same.


