Austin Letter.

Revolution in the Legislature -Speaker Evans ousted from his place-The Election Question, &c. AUSTIN, May 11th, 1871.

On Tuesday, the ?th, a Legislative storn began to gather, brought on by Speaker Evans, who took the floor in support of the proposition to hold a general election this Fall. Mr. Evans placed himself on Constitutional grounds, and although he had taken part in a caucus that decided to pass ever the election question, he claimed that is conscience smote him so severely that he felt justified in breaking through his caucus obligations. He compared himself to Martin Luther, when he became the champion of religious liberty. In this defiance of the party caucus Mr. . Evans had the unanimous approval of the Democratic members, and a few Republicans. The question was postponed to allow a further consultation, and on Tuesday night a caucus was held. Mr. Evans attended this caucus, but bolted.

On Wednesday morning a resolution was offered declaring the Speakership vacant. A scene of excitement ensued. Mr. Evans called one of his fellow bolters, Mr. Robertson, to the chair, and took the floor to fight it out. Mr. Evans found himself with the entire democratic vote and a few Re publicans at his back, fighting a majority of the House, and that majority entirely Republican. He made a very violent and abusive attack upon those who were in favor of displacing him, and at one time the session seemed likely to break up in a free fight-democratic members brandished their canes, - Republicans shaking their fists-and one Democrat, it is said, laid his pistols and bowie knife out on his desk for use. Notwithstanding this, however, the majority of the House steadily carried out was displaced and Mr. Sinclair made Speaker. The Democrats wrote out their resignations, threatened if Evans was removed they would resign and break a quorum, but this little secession game was all for bum ombe : no one resigned.

There is a general feeling of sorrow and forbearance on the part of Republicans towards Mr. Evans, and he will certainly regret his speech of Wednesday, and feel that in administering this lesson of party drill, the rule applies to him he was always zealous in applying to others,-he must also remember that he was only elected a member of the Legislature, and not Speak-er of the House, and that the House had the right to remove him at will. 


