TELEGRAPHIC
Latest from the seat of War.

London, May 3.—Frankfort advices
state that great excitement was occasioned
by an attempt on the life of Baron
Charles M. Rothschild, by a French soldier,
who entered the office and asked to see
the Baron. When asked his business, he
demanded 400,000 francs and threatened, in
case of refusal, to blow up the house by
means of a bag which he held in his hand.
The clerks considered him a maniac,
and tried to turn him out. He then put a
match to the bag and an explosion occurred,
slightly wounded two brokers who were
waiting for the Baron. The perpetrator
was a French officer and stated he was
one of a gang who had conspired for plan-
dering bankers and he was selected by the
lot to go to Rothschild's. None of the
clerks were wounded.
Private but reliable information intimates
that it is the intention of the Ger-
mans to restore a regency as the legiti-
mate government should the Versailles
fail in enforcing their authority.
London, May 2.—The Times special
says: The insurgents themselves are

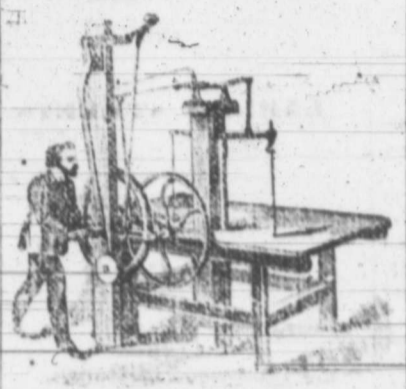
