**HEADQUARTERS STATE OF TEXAS,**  
ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE,  
AUSTIN, May 11, 1871.  
General Orders No. 8.  
On the fourth of May, 1871, Sergeant R.  
N. PARKER and eleven men of Company B,  
(Captain Cox) Frontier Force, engaged,  
and completely defeated and dispersed,  
a band of Indians, estimated at from thirty  
five to forty warriors, on Rocky creek, in  
Palo Pinto county, killing ten warriors  
and recapturing forty horses which had  
been stolen by the Indians in the town of  
Palo Pinto. Sergeant PARKER and four  
of his men, viz: Privates WILLIAM WAT-  
SON, CALUM BOTTENHOUSE, F. M. GRAY-  
SON and JOHN HAYWOOD, were wounded.

Comment upon the action of this little  
band is unnecessary. The Governor, how-  
ever, desires to express in General Orders  
his high appreciation of the indomitable  
bravery displayed by these in the engage-  
ment; against overwhelming odds in the  
face of every disadvantage, a handful of  
the frontier troops have taught these  
savages a lesson which they will not soon  
forget, and such action is deserving of emu-  
lation on the part of the other companies  
of the frontier force, whose duty it is to  
free the frontier from the ravages of these  
savages and establish peace and safety in  
that locality.  
This order will be published at the first  
parade of each company of the frontier  
forces after its receipt.

**Proceedings of the City Council.**  
Adjourned Regular meeting,  
May 15th, 1871.  
Present, his honor, Mayor Thielepape.  
Councilmen, Messrs. Bell, Pentenrieder,  
Moore, Duerber, and Groos.  
Minutes of meetings of April 1, 29, and  
May 9, were read and approved.  
Petition of R. Eagar, requesting the privi-  
lege of postponing payment of his real-estate  
taxes until October, was granted.  
Petition of E. Feldtman, for part pay-  
ment for making assessment, was granted.  
Petition of C. Hartnett, for part of com-  
pensation for making city map, was grant-  
ed.  
Petition of Wagner & Hummel, for per-  
mission to build a wall to connect their  
property and the store of A. Sartor, on the  
front line of said buildings, was referred to  
the Improvement Committee.  
Petition of C. Holligmann, for privilege  
of using the water of the ditch irrigating  
his land, to run a threshing machine, was  
referred to the Committee on Petitions and  
Ordinances.  
Communication of the City Surveyor  
concerning a claimed public street, claimed  
by Mr. Kingsbury as his property, was re-  
ferred to the City Attorney.  
Mr. T. G. Williams, as a committee from  
the Agricultural Association, was heard  
in regard to inviting the Hon. Horace  
Greely to visit our city during his  
trip into Texas. Action in the matter was  
deferred until some other business had been  
attended to.  
Mr. Pettis was then heard in regard to  
the petition of Mrs. Schmidt, requesting that  
the valuation of the land taken from her,  
by the City, in widening Commerce street,  
be submitted to arbitration. The petition  
was referred to the Improvement Com-  
mittee, and on condition that they report in  
favor of arbitration, the Mayor was author-  
ized to choose an arbitrator for the City.  
Communication of Alamo Fire Company  
No. 2, concerning their funds, was referred  
to the committee on Petitions and Ordin-  
ances.  
Communication of Welder & Upton con-  
cerning the claim of John Vance, was re-  
ferred to the city attorney.  
Two communications from Davis & Mur-  
phy, concerning their fees in the Coupon  
and Bond cases trial, and their employment  
in conducting the cases in the United States  
Courts, was read. On motion their offer  
was accepted.  
Council then adjourned until 3 P. M., May  
16, 1871.

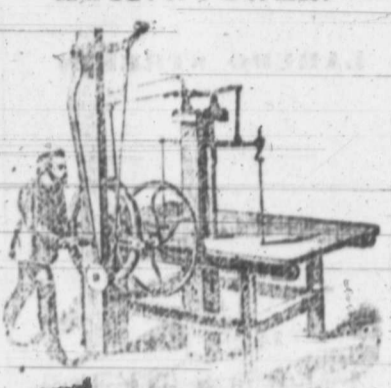
