If we were astonished and pleased at the display of neatness, order, and of the per-fect system prevailing in the office of the Secretary of State, we were none the less pleased with the business air, and the pleasant surroundings and fittings up of the office of Gen. Davidson, who is Adjutant General of the State, as also Chief of the State Police.

The General has evinced his soldierly tendencies, in his arrangement of arms of different patterns and calibres, about the office, and the tasteful adornment of the walls with the national flag. Still more decidedly has he evinced this tendency, in the selection of none but tried and faithful Union soldiers as employees, men whom a nation's peril have tried, and found always to the front, ready to battle for the right, and preservation of her integrity. The General himself, is a thorough soldier, as our people well know, and he has served upon other, besides American battle fields.

A long and distinguished career in India, acquainted him thoroughly with the more ardgous duties of a solder's life, and gave him the concomitants of a strength of mind and body, that is Herculean in its tendency.

The General has made excellent choice of an Assistant Adjutant General, in the person of Major Audrew S. Donnan, a man who has for twelve years been connected in some way with military matters. Previous to the war, he was at a military school for three and a half years, and of course, availed himself of the first alarm, in 1861, to show his patriotism and devotion to the country, by volunteering to assist in the national defence. He was ordered to the front, and served in many severe engage ments, rising in grade, until 1865 found him with a captain's commission.

At the close of the war, he was transferred to the department of the Adjutant Geueral of the army, where he became thoroughly conversant with the routine of office ial duties, and the neat and complete reords, the indexing, and the careful filing ad endorsing of letters and papers in Gen Davidsen's office, show how near to perfection the science of organization will bring the most intricate and weighty official bus iness. One thing is specially observable about the office-the absence of an undue and perplexing amount of "red tapelsin. The General is easily approached. The President's Fiscal Victory.

Whatever may be said against Presiden Grant by partison critics or dissatisfied Republicans, the financial record of his Administration is one of magnificent swe-cess. The total revenue of the Govern-ment under Andrew Johnson, from March 1st, 1867, to March 1st 1869, was \$664,4%, 412.25; and under the President Grant, from March 1st, 1859 to March 1st, 1871, it was \$749,399,491.99—showing an increase of \$84,994,049,74. So much for faithfully collecting the public revenue secording to the requirements of law. The total expenditures of the Govern-

ment for the same period during John-son's Administration were \$450,045,750,17, and for the same period under President Grant they were \$233,342,859.96; showing a decrease of of \$125,700,940.21

Adding this increase of revenue and th decrease of expenditures together, we have a total gain under President Grant of \$211,624,938.95. This certainly looks like business, especially when we remem-ber that Congress last year took more than eighty millions of dollars in the way of tax reduction.

The decrease of the public cells from


