OFFICIAL LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Third Session of
the Forty-First Congress.

CHAP. XXIII.—An Act to amend an Act en-
titled "An Act to authorize the refund-
ing of the national debt."
Be it enacted by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the United States of
America in Congress assembled, That the
amount of bonds authorized by the
act approved July fourteen, eighteen hun-
dred and seventy, entitled "An act to
authorize the refunding of the national
debt," to be issued bearing
five per centum interest per annum,
be, and the same is, increased to five hun-
dred millions of dollars, and the interest of
any portion of the bonds issued under
said act, may, at the discretion of the
Secretary of the Treasury, be made pay-
able quarterly; Provided, however,
That this act shall not be construed to
authorize any increase of the total amount
of bonds provided for by the act to which
this act is an amendment.
Approved, January 20, 1871.

CHAP. XXXV.—An Act to divide the State
of Virginia into two judicial Districts.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the United States
of America in Congress assembled, That
the counties of Albemarle, Alleghany,
Amherst, Appomattox, Augusta, Bath,
Bedford, Bland, Botetourt, Buchanan,
Buckingham, Campbell, Carroll, Charlot-
te, Clarke, Craig, Cumberland, Floyd,
Franklin, Frederick, Fluvanna, Giles,
Grayson, Green, Halifax, Henry, High-
land, Lee, Madison, Montgomery, Nelson,
Patrick, Page, Pulaski, Pittsylvania, Ray,
Richmond, Roanoke, Rockbridge, Rock-
ingham, Russell, Scott, Smyth, Shenan-
doah, Tazewell, Washington, Wise, Wythe,
and Warren, of the State of Virginia,
shall hereafter constitute a new judicial
district of the United States, and be called
the western district of Virginia; and
the circuit and district courts of the United
States for said western district of Vir-
ginia shall be held at Lynchburg, Dan-
ville, Abingdon, and Harrisonburg, with-
in said district.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That
a term of the circuit and district court of
the United States for said western district
shall be held at Danville, on the first Monday
of March and September; at Lynchburg,
on the second Monday of March and Sep-
tember; at Abingdon, on the third Mon-
day of March and September; and at
Harrisonburg, on the Wednesday after
the fourth Monday of March and Sep-
tember, in each year.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That
the district of Virginia shall hereafter
consist of the counties of said State not
named in this act, and shall be called the
eastern district of Virginia; and circuit
and district courts of the United States
shall be held in said eastern district, as
follows: At the city of Richmond on the
first Monday of April and October, and at
the city of Alexandria on the first Monday
of January and on the first Monday of
July, and at Norfolk on the first Monday
of May and first Monday of November, in
each year.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That
the said circuit or district court for either
of said districts may, in its discretion,
order special terms, and order a grand or
petit jury, or both, to attend the same, by
an order to be entered of record twenty
days before the day at which said special
term shall be ordered to convene; and
said courts respectively at such special
terms shall have all the powers that they
have at a regular term appointed by law.
Provided, however, That no special term
of said circuit court for either district
shall be appointed except by and with the
concurrence and consent of the circuit
judge.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That
all suits and other proceedings, of whatso-
ever name or nature, now pending in the
circuit or district court of the United
States for the district of Virginia, shall
be tried and disposed of in the circuit and
district courts, respectively, for said eastern
district, as the same would have been
if this act had not been passed, and for
that purpose jurisdiction is reserved to
the said court in the said eastern district
and the clerk of the circuit and district
courts of the present district of Virginia
shall retain the records and files of the
said circuit and district courts, at the
city of Richmond, and do and perform
all the duties pertaining to the said
offices, respectively, within the eastern
district, except as hereinafter provided; and
all process returnable to or present-
ing notified for any term of the present
circuit or district court shall be deemed to
be returnable to the next term of said
court, respectively, in the said eastern
district, as fixed by this act.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That
upon application of any party to any
suit or pending in the present circuit or
district courts of the United States, for
the present district of Virginia, which
should have been commenced in the prop-
er court for the western district if this act
had been in force at the time of the com-
mencement thereof, the proper court shall
order that the same be removed for fur-
ther proceedings to the proper court for
said western district; and thereupon the
clerk shall transmit certified copies of all
the papers and of all orders made therein
to the clerk of the court to which such
suit or proceeding shall be removed, and
all further proceedings shall be had in
said court, to which the same shall be re-
moved, as if the said suit or proceed-
ing had originally been commenced there-
in.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That
the passage of this act shall not have the
effect to destroy or impair the lien of any
judgment or decree rendered by the cir-
cuit or district court of the United States
for the present district of Virginia, prior
to this act taking effect; and final process
on any judgment or decree entered in the

circuit of district courts of the United
States for the district of Virginia, or
which shall be entered therein prior to
this act taking effect, and all other process
for the enforcement of any order of said
courts respectively, in any course of pro-
ceedings removed as herein provided,
shall be issued from and made returnable
to the proper court for the eastern district
of Virginia, and may be directed to and
executed by the marshal of the United
States for the said eastern district in any
part of the State of Virginia.

Sec. 8. And be it further enacted, That
there shall be appointed a district judge
for said western district of Virginia, who
shall receive an annual salary of three
thousand five hundred dollars; and there
shall also be appointed a marshal and
district attorney of the United States for
said western district of Virginia, who
shall respectively receive such fees and
compensation, and exercise such powers
and perform such duties as are fixed
and enjoined by law.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That
the circuit and district judges, shall ap-
point four clerks, each of whom shall be
clerk both of the circuit and district
courts for said western district, one of
whom shall reside and keep his office at
Lynchburg, another shall reside and keep
his office at Abingdon, another shall re-
side and keep his office at Danville, and
the fourth shall reside and keep his office
at Harrisonburg, who shall receive the
fees and compensation for services per-
formed by them, respectively, now fixed
by law.

Sec. 10. And be it further enacted, That
either of the clerks of the circuit and dis-
trict courts for said western district is
herby authorized under the direction of
the district judge of said western district
to make a transcript from any of the re-
cords, files, or papers of the district and
circuit courts of the United States remain-
ing in the office of the clerks in said eastern
district, of all matters and proceed-
ings which relate to or concern liens upon
or titles to real estate situated in said
western district; and for that purpose
shall have access to said records in the
office of the said clerks in said eastern
district; and such transcripts, when so
made by either of said clerks, shall be
certified to be true and correct by the
clerk making the same, who shall be
certified shall be valid in all courts and
places equally with said originals.

Sec. 12. And be it further enacted, That
this act shall not affect the completion of
the census of the State of Virginia for the
year eighteen hundred and seventy; and
nothing herein shall affect any laws
or existing officers except as herein mod-
ified and provided.
Approved, February 3, 1871.

RESOLUTION—No. 9
Joint Resolution for the Restoration of
Captain Dominick Lynch, of the United
States Navy, to the active List from the
reserved List.
Be it resolved by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the United States of
America in Congress assembled, That the
President of the United States of America be
authorized to nominate, and by and with
the advice and consent of the Senate to
appoint Captain Dominick Lynch to the
active list of the navy, as a captain.
Approved, January 30, 1871.

[RESOLUTION—No. 51.]
A Resolution authorizing the President to
nominate, and, by and with the Advice
and Consent of the Senate, to appoint
Lyman G. Spaulding a Master in the
Navy of the United States.
Resolved by the Senate and House of
Representatives of the United States of
America in Congress assembled, That the
President of the United States be, and he
is hereby, authorized to nominate, and, by
and with the advice and consent of the
Senate, to appoint Lyman G. Spaulding,
who resigned as midshipman in June,
eighteen hundred and sixty-six, master in
the navy of the United States; Provided,
That if it appear upon examination that he
has been relieved from the physical defect
which led to his resignation, and is other-
wise physically competent for service.
Approved, March 3, 1871.

[RESOLUTION—No. 52.]
A Resolution for the relief of Settlers on
the public Lands.
Resolved by the Senate and House
of Representatives of the United States
of America in Congress assembled, That
settlers on the public lands of the United
States who have been required to make
proof and payment for their lands under
the act to extend the provisions of the pre-
emption laws to the Territory of Colorado,
and for other purposes, approved July
fourteen, eighteen hundred and seventy,
and by instructions from the general land
office, under date July thirty, eighteen hun-
dred and seventy, shall have two months
additional time given them under which to
make such proof and payment.
Approved, March 3, 1871.

[RESOLUTION—No. 53.]
Joint Resolution to amend Section four, Act
of July twenty, eighteen hundred and
sixty-eight.
Resolved by the Senate and House of
Representatives of the United States of
America in Congress assembled, That
section four of the act of July twenty,
eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, in re-
lative to fermented liquors, be amended so
that the same shall read as follows: "The
liquids used for the manufacture of vine-
gar exclusively; but nothing in this re-
solation shall be construed to authorize the
distillation of such fermented liquors, ex-
cept in an authorized distillery."
Approved, March 3, 1871.

Railroad Election Notice.
THE STATE OF TEXAS,
County of Bexar.

It is remembered that at a regular session of the Hon. Police Court, held in and for the county of Bexar, on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1871, the following proceedings were had, to wit:

The petition of more than fifty (50) bondholders of the county of Bexar, having been presented to the Police Court of said county, asking for an election to take the opinion of the electors of said county on the proposition that said county shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake, in Colorado county, to the city of San Antonio, in Bexar county, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of Five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said county, to the manner and upon the conditions set forth in said petition, and which conditions are hereinafter more fully set forth.

And the court having duly considered the said petition, and being satisfied of the right of the petitioners to ask for and have an order for such election, by virtue of the act of the Legislature, entitled "An act to authorize counties, cities and towns to aid in the construction of Railroads and other works of Internal Improvements," approved April 12th, 1871.

It is therefore, hereby ordered by the Court that an election be held in accordance with said Act, at the Court-house of the county of Bexar, to commence on the fifth day of July, 1871, and continue for four consecutive days, to wit: the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th days of July, 1871, to take the opinion of the electors of said county of Bexar, upon the proposition above mentioned, which is as follows, to wit:

That the County of Bexar shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake in the county of Colorado, to the city of San Antonio, in the county of Bexar, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said county of Bexar; each bond to be for the sum of one thousand dollars, payable thirty years after its delivery, and bearing interest at the rate of eight per centum per annum, payable annually upon interest coupons to be attached to each of said bonds; upon condition nevertheless, that the said Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company fully complete and equip their said Railway to the city of San Antonio within two years from the time when the qualified voters of said Bexar county shall have voted affirmatively on the said proposition; and that the bonds aforesaid shall be delivered to the said Railway Company when the said Railway shall be fully completed and equipped to the city of San Antonio and not before, and that the said bonds shall bear interest only from the date of their delivery. And further provided, that the said Railway Company shall execute and deliver to the said county of Bexar, within sixty days after said election, their bond in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful completion and equipment of said Railway within the time and to the place aforesaid.

The vote on the proposition aforesaid shall be by ballot "for the proposition" or "against the proposition," as prescribed by the act aforesaid.

It is further ordered that J. W. Van Slyck, C. Wurzbach and H. P. Small are hereby appointed managers to conduct said election in accordance with said Act, and to make a return thereof to this Court, on Wednesday, the 15th day of July, 1871.

It is further ordered that this order shall be published for three weeks previous to said election, in the "San Antonio Express," a newspaper published in the city of San Antonio, in said county of Bexar, and it is hereby ordered that a special meeting of this Court be held on Monday, the 15th day of July, 1871, that being the first Monday after the return day of said election, for the purpose of ascertaining and recording the result of the election herein and hereby ordered.

I hereby certify that the foregoing is a true and correct copy of the original order, entered upon the minutes of the Police Court of Bexar county, at its May term, A. D. 1871.
