Greecism.

"There is a tide in the affairs of men, which taken at the flood, e.e., is an axiom that seems to have made at least one convert to his logic, and that man is Horace Greeley. Scarcely is the ink dry wherewith he signifies his modest acceptance of the Presidency, in case of nomination and election, ere he spreads his sails and goes in to make political capital to further that event. The South and its people are the first mouthful he proposes swallowing, and the severity and the clear exposition of wrongs and outrages at the South, now give way to letters and speeches wherein a new halo is cast around the people he has so long abused, and "carpet baggers," "thieving carpet-baggers," as Horace Greeley calls them, come in for his antagonism and abuse. To the mass of intelligent Republicans South his injustice will be felt keenly. Risking life and means and their all, in upholding national Republican principles; standing all the brunt of internal prejudice, and too often internal violence, Republicans South, have reconstructed State after State and restored law and order to a people where only confusion and violence existed under Democratic management.
In the utterances of Horace Greeley, wherein the actual political situation is entirely ignored, we fail to see ought but a catch-penny to have every Democratic paper in the country make capital for him preparatory to a nomination to presidential honors. With his paper, the *New York Tribune*, of the last year containing hundreds upon hundreds of columns of well-authenticated cases of Ku-kluxery and outrages wherein "carpet-baggers," as he calls them (but Republicans of nerve, as we know the class he alludes to are) is in itself the best assurance of his glaring inconsistency, and places him in a false light to the nation, either in the one case or the other.
As far as our own State is concerned, Mr. Greeley saw nothing of it. From the moment of his stepping upon its soil he was absorbed by a class of political mountebanks who stand first on the State rolls as great Democratic guns and lights. Right under the very nose of the man who loves justice so well, the Republican mayor of Houston was excluded from the stand where the venerable Horace received Democratic after Democrat, listened to naught but Democratic twaddle, and had his indignities controlled by a notorious Dem-

ocratic demagogue, to whom very few earnest Republicans felt like applying for introduction. Under such circumstances we are not astonished at his foolish speech before the Union Republican Committee at New York. First, ignorance as to the actual status of political affairs in this State; second, his earnest desire to conciliate certain classes of the Southern people and secure their aid in urging him for the Presidency, allows us to place weight enough upon his injustice to make us indignant in finding that he who has been the most earnest advocate of the Republican party, in, when his personal aims and ambition come into his cranium, declined to do it most glaring injustice.

Morgan's Road.

The *Indianola Bulletin* of the 20th comes at the EXPRESS again and its article of "Why the San Antonio railroad will be built to San Antonio." It fails to enlighten us as to Mr. Morgan's intention, but assures us the road will be built to Austin, if we do not agree to build it ourselves, to our city from Quere.

We have in a previous article shown that the road from Ledbetter to Austin, which is to be finished this year, is a connecting link with the Galveston and Houston road, and consequently all the products of the country in and around Austin will go to Galveston, where Morgan's steamers will be as much benefited as though the Indianola line ran to Austin. Now, under the circumstances of this connection, is it likely that Morgan will build an opposition line to one that is already advantageous to him, and leave San Antonio and its resources the spoil of some other company? Hardly; and we call upon the *Indianola Bulletin* editor to explain how he reconciles such want of tact to Mr. Morgan's clear-sightedness, which he attributes to him. The fact is, as we stated before, that Mr. Morgan is, in self-defence, and to save a loss of a million and a-half already expended in forty-four miles of road, forced to complete the route to San Antonio as soon as the Columbus road starts in to work. If he runs it to Austin, he is competing with a road that already carries the products of the country to Galveston to his steamers and taking from them return freights, while San Antonio and its valuable commerce is left to a rival railroad.

We give our *Indianola* contemporary the benefit of his assertion that Mr. Morgan has never contributed one cent to its support. All we have to say is, that we think it remarkable that the *Bulletin* should be the defender of a man whose name is a by-word in the mouths of the people of West Texas for all that is grasping and monopolizing. Millions he has paid for the privilege of bleeding the people of West Texas, buying up other companies so that he might hold the commerce of our country in his grasp and draw from it millions of hard-earned money. Not a single benefit has ever accrued to our people from his business-connection with them; but, on the contrary, every internal interest has suffered from the burdensome rate of charges, which have affected alike articles of either necessity or luxury.

Mr. Morgan may be King of the Gulf, but he will never be monarch of all West Texas. Two years from this time a road will be running to this place connecting us with New Orleans. If Mr. Morgan, in a fit of spite against San Antonio, had rather build his line to Austin and thus compete with one that already carries freight to his vessels at Galveston, it is no harm to us, for the Columbus route can and will offer us terms as favorable as those that Mr. Morgan offers; for, his avarice and greed will more than balance the difference in rates between five hundred miles of sea and all rail transportation.

Mexico.

This unfortunate country is about to be afflicted with one of those revolutions which seem to belong to its natural order of things, and for which she has attained an unenviable notoriety. The coming Presidential election has arraigned the different parties in bitter hostility to and the prospect of a general onslaught on each other, accompanied, of course, with *prosecutions*, assassination and the like, increases hourly.

The two most promising candidates for the Presidency, are Juarez and Lerdo de Tejada. The former being in power, and exercising control over the different departments and branches of government for a long period of years, has apparently a considerable advantage over his former confidant and Chief Executive officer, Tejada, and by a judicious use of the government patronage it is thought that he cannot be ousted; particularly as he is sustained by a powerful element in the National Congress, and he has moreover a controlling influence over the army, which may go far to reverse the decision of the people, should it be unfavorable to him in the election which comes off to-day.

Tejada, however, is not idle, he is a diplomatist of the first water, and a man of extraordinary courage, and endowed with great resources. He is supported by the clergy, and is consequently the head of a powerful faction.

A third candidate in the field is Porfirio Diaz, who has the reputation of being a pure minded patriot; it is thought that the people may prefer him to either of the two extremists.

It is to be feared, however, that the defeated party in the election will endeavor in the seditious manner, to gather his adherents and endeavor to unsettle his more popular rival, in which case we may expect a repetition of the ravages and devastation

of civil war, which has been the curse of one of the most lovely countries on the face of the earth.

Report of the Grand Jury.

To the Hon. G. H. NOONAN,
Judge of the 23d Judicial District:
The Grand Jury convened at the June term of the District Court, A. D. 1871, respectfully beg leave to report that they have thoroughly investigated all business brought before them, and the jury being made up principally of stock men, particular attention has been given to that interest. A large number of witnesses have been before them, and all reasonable efforts have been resorted to in order that criminals of every grade might be brought to justice. *

They have been in attendance fourteen days, and many witnesses being absent, and the chain of evidence being broken, they were unable to prosecute further the cases brought before them.

They inspected the court-house and jail, and while the Sheriff merits every consideration, for the cleanliness of the prison, they must report it as a nuisance and a disgrace to the community. A new court-house and jail should be provided as early as the finances of the county will allow.

They would further report, that, considering the frontier locality of this county, that it is very creditable that more crimes are not committed, and the morale of this community will compare favorably with any other of equal population in the United States.

In conclusion, we would report that the citizens of Bexar county should not be censured for the few cases of murder that have been brought before them, as they were committed by transient persons and not by citizens of this county.

Railroad Election Notice.
THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Be it remembered that at a regular session of the Hon. Police Court, held in and for the county of Bexar, on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1871, the following proceedings were had, to wit:

The petition of more than fifty (50) freeholders of the county of Bexar, having been presented to the Police Court of said county, asking for an election to take the opinion of the electors of said county on the proposition that said county shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake, in Colorado county, to the city of San Antonio, in Bexar county, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of Five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said Bexar county, in the manner and upon the conditions set forth in said petition, and which conditions are hereinafter more fully set forth.

And the court having duly considered the said petition, and being satisfied of the right of the petitioners to ask for and have an order for such election, by virtue of the act of the Legislature, entitled "An act to authorize counties, cities and towns to aid in the construction of Railroads and other works of Internal Improvements," approved April 19th, 1871.

It is therefore, hereby ordered by the Court that an election be held in accordance with said Act, at the Court-house of the county of Bexar, to commence on the 15th day of July, 1871, and continue for four consecutive days, to wit: the 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th days of July, 1871, to take the opinion of the electors of said county of Bexar, upon the proposition above mentioned, which is as follows, to wit:

That the County of Bexar shall aid in the construction or extension of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway from the town of Columbus on Eagle Lake in the county of Colorado, to the city of San Antonio, in the county of Bexar, by making a donation to the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company of the sum of five hundred thousand dollars in the bonds of said county of Bexar; each bond to be for the sum of one thousand dollars, payable thirty years after its delivery, and bearing interest at the rate of eight per centum per annum, payable annually upon interest coupons to be attached to each of said bonds upon condition nevertheless, that the said Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway Company fully complete and equip their said Railway to the city of San Antonio within two years from the time when the qualified voters of said Bexar county shall have voted affirmatively on the said proposition; and that the bonds aforesaid shall be delivered to the said Railway Company, when the said Railway shall be fully completed and equipped, to the city of San Antonio and not before, and that the said bonds shall bear interest only from the date of their delivery. And further provided, that the said Railway Company shall execute and deliver to the said county of Bexar, within sixty days after said election, their bond in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful completion and equipment of said Railway within the time and to the place aforesaid.

The vote on the proposition aforesaid shall be by ballot "for the proposition" or "against the proposition," as prescribed by the act aforesaid.

It is further ordered that J. W. Van Slyke, C. Wurzbach and H. Frenzel are hereby appointed managers to conduct said election in accordance with said Act, and to make a return thereof to this Court, on Wednesday, the 12th day of July, 1871.

It is further ordered that this order shall be published for three weeks previous to said election, in the "San Antonio Express," a newspaper published in the city of San Antonio, in said county of Bexar; and it is also ordered that a special meeting of this Court be held on Monday, the 17th day of July, 1871, being the first Monday after the return day of said election, for the purpose of ascertaining and recording the result of the election herein and hereby ordered.

I hereby certify that the foregoing is a true and correct copy of the original order, as entered upon the minutes of the Police Court of Bexar county, at its May term, A. D. 1871.
