Sec. 26. That there be, and is hereby,
 appropriated, for increased compensation
 to assistant marshals in taking the census
 of three hundred and seventy, the sum
 of three hundred and fifty thousand dol-
 lars.
 Sec. 27. That for the purpose of more
 effectually securing life and property on
 the coast of New Jersey and Long Island
 for the fiscal year ending June thirty,
 eighteen hundred and seventy-two, two
 hundred thousand dollars, to be expended
 in accordance with the provisions of the
 Act for the better preservation of life
 and property from vessels shipwrecked
 on the coast of the United States, ap-
 proved December fourteenth, eighteen
 hundred and fifty-four, and that the Secretary
 of the Treasury be authorized to employ
 crews as experienced surfmen at such sta-
 tions and for such periods as he may deem
 reasonable, not to exceed forty dollars per
 month for each person to be employed.
 That the jurisdiction conferred by the
 joint resolution of June eighteen, eight-
 teen hundred and sixty-six, in regard to
 claims from the counties of Berkeley and
 Jefferson, in the State of West Virginia,
 and by the joint resolution of July thir-
 ty-eight, eighteen hundred and sixty-six,
 in regard to claims from the State of Ten-
 nessee, and by the joint resolution of De-
 cember twenty-three, eighteen hundred
 and sixty-nine, as amended by the act
 of March three, eighteen hundred and
 seventy-one, in regard to steamboats and
 other vessels, shall not be withdrawn or
 impaired by any construction of the law
 creating commissioners of claims to exam-
 ine claims arising in States proclaimed to
 be in insurrection, and that jurisdiction
 over all claims presented by loyal citi-
 zens from said State of Tennessee, and
 from said counties of Berkeley and Jeffers-
 on, to the proper department before the
 third of March, eighteen hundred and
 seventy-one, shall remain as before the
 passage of said act creating said commis-
 sioners of claims.
 For covering the steam-pipes in the
 Capitol with fire-proof non-conducting
 felt, eight thousand dollars.
 Sec. 28. That there be, and is hereby,
 appropriated, to pay expenses of the leg-
 islative assembly of West Virginia, Terri-
 tory, convened October, Anno Domini eight-
 hundred and seventy, and for printing
 journals of said assembly, and incidental
 expenses of the office of secretary for the
 year eighteen hundred and seventy, the
 sum of four thousand two hundred and
 fifty dollars.
 Sec. 29. That three thousand dollars be
 appropriated, out of which such sum shall
 be paid to John Thompson Mason, late
 collector of the port of Baltimore, for ser-
 vices rendered in the discharge of his
 duties as collector of the port of Baltimore,
 for light-house purposes outside the
 limits of his collection district, such sum
 as the Secretary of the Treasury may find
 legally and properly due, and pay on an
 adjustment of the accounts by the Treas-
 ury Department, as hereinafter provided.
 Sec. 30. That the act approved January
 the twenty-second, anno Domini eighteen
 hundred and sixty-seven, entitled "An act
 to fix the times for the regular meet-
 ings of Congress," be, and the same is
 hereby, repealed after the adjournment
 of the present session of Congress.
 Approved, April 20, 1871.

UNITED STATES.
Public Acts Passed at the Ses-
sion of the Forty-Second Con-
gress.
 CHAP. XXI.—An Act making Appropria-
 tions to supply Deficiencies in the Ap-
 propriations for the Service of the Year
 ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred
 and seventy-one, and for other
 Purposes.
 (Continued)
 For the assistant observers at the
 Naval Observatory, in addition to the sum
 appropriated by "An act making appro-
 priations for the Naval Service for the
 year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred
 and seventy-two, and for other purposes,"
 approved March third, eighteen hundred
 and seventy-one, five hundred dollars.
 Sec. 20. That so much of the proviso
 in the act making appropriations to sup-
 ply deficiencies, and so forth, approved
 April twentieth, eighteen hundred and
 seventy, as limits to completion of the
 marine hospital building at Chicago, Illi-
 nois, to a sum not exceeding three hun-
 dred thousand dollars, is hereby repealed;
 and it shall be lawful for the proper au-
 thorities to expend the money already ap-
 propriated for continuing the work upon
 said building: Provided, That no part
 of said work shall be expended un-
 til plans and specifications shall have
 been completed that will limit the cost of
 said building to a sum, including all mon-
 ies already expended, not exceeding three
 hundred and fifty-nine thousand seven
 hundred and seventy-nine dollars and
 thirty-four cents.
 Sec. 21. That the Secretary of the Treas-
 ury be authorized to sell, for the best
 price in cash that can be obtained, the
 marine hospital building in the city of
 San Francisco; and the proceeds of such
 sale, or so much thereof as may be neces-
 sary, shall be held and reserved as a fund
 for the erection of a pavilion hospital on
 some government reservation in or near
 said city, if Congress shall hereafter so
 determine.
 Sec. 22. That there be appropriated out
 of any money in the treasury not oth-
 erwise appropriated, twelve thousand dol-
 lars for the relief of destitute aged persons
 in the District of Columbia, such sum to
 be received and distributed by such officer
 or association of persons in the District
 of Columbia as the Secretary of War shall
 designate, and that a report of the dis-
 tribution of the money, hereby appropriated,
 shall be made to Congress at its next
 session.
 Sec. 23. That the Secretary of the War
 be hereby authorized to furnish to the Na-
 tional Freedmen's Relief Association con-
 demned clothing and bedding, if such
 there be on hand, not needed by the army,
 not exceeding five thousand dollars in
 value, for distribution among the desti-
 tute aged persons above mentioned.
 Sec. 24. That the use of the buildings in
 Arroyo Square occupied by the quar-
 termaster's department, if not needed for
 the public service, be retained, in the dis-
 cretion of the Secretary of War, for the ac-
 commodation of the Freedmen, for the purpose
 of enabling it still further to relieve the
 destitute persons above mentioned.
 Sec. 25. That the provisions in the act
 entitled "An act making appropriations for
 sundry civil expenses of the govern-
 ment for the year ending June thirtieth,
 eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and
 for other purposes," for the erection of a
 public building in the city Saint Louis,
 Missouri, for the use of the custom-house
 and other civil offices of the government
 of the United States, shall be extended
 and made available for and during the
 year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hun-
 dred and seventy-two.
 Sec. 26. That the salary of the Consul
 at Matamoros, Mexico, be established at
 two thousand dollars per annum for the
 fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen
 hundred and seventy-one, and thereafter,
 That there be paid to the deputy assistant
 treasurer in the office of the assistant
 treasurer in the city of New York the
 sum of six hundred dollars, the same be-
 ing a deficiency in his compensation for
 the present fiscal year.

It would be a good thing if all office-holders earned their money as hard as the members of the State police do their sixty dollars per month.

A MAN was brought in from the country yesterday charged with stealing. Among the articles purloined was a Confederate dollar note. Here we see the effect of the incendiary speeches of "our beloved chief-tain." Here is a man taking Confederate money already. In case he is indicted, "the bar" will sympathize with him and he will be ably defended. A subscription ought to be started at once.

It is dangerous to take notes that way. In the District Court Christian Meyer was on trial for stealing from the house of George J. Gage various and sundry articles of wearing apparel, etc.

The evidence for the prosecution was very damaging, and the cross-examination only made it worse.

San Antonio, Texas, has done a wonderful thing in voting a subsidy of \$200,000,000 to the Galveston and Harrisburg railroad from Eagle Lake to that city. This road will connect with Houston, which is the great railroad center of Texas, by way of the Tap to the Brazos and Galveston road. By this connection San Antonio will place herself in communication with all the railroads that lead out of Houston, which is an important fact to be borne in mind by the people of New Orleans, since they are looking to a speedy construction of the New-Orleans, Mobile and Texas railroad to that city. This is an item that Auditor Graham may cogitate on while he delays to sign the bonds that belong to the latter road. — N. O. Republican.

The glories of the Yaqueme valley are not to be enjoyed without discomfort. A correspondent writes of the hotels there: "Their board partitions are mere confidence traps, and every whisper sounds from roof to cellar. I learned in this way more of my neighbor's conjugal confidences in three days than I ought to have known in 30 years."

A religious newspaper in England has discovered the Commune which exhibit recent French history in an entirely new light. The Paris insurrection of 1871, and a part of the Jesuitic scheme to secure the Gallican church, and Communism, to whom this careful British author attributes the murder of the Archbishop, was no other than the Fenian MacAniff in disguise. If anybody doubts after this that Jesuitism, Fenianism, and Communism are one and the same thing, let it be borne in mind that three successive Archbishops of Paris, who were Gallicians in opinion, have been assassinated. Mgr. Sibour was killed by a supposed priest. Mgr. Affre was shot at the barricades, and our British journal volunteers the extraordinary intimation that he was treacherously fired at from behind by the Ultramontane Society of St. Vincent de Paul. And now here is Mgr. Darboy, perishing at the order of a French High-American Socialist-Fenian Jesuit. There could not be anything plainer, and we dare say a great many people at Exeter Hall will believe it. — N. Y. Tribune.

LATEST and best authority gives the population of the globe at 1,350,000,000. In America, 72,800,000; in Europe, 267,000,000; in Asia, 793,400,000; in Africa, 188,000,000; in Australia and Polynesia, 3,800,000. These people speak about 3,500 different languages, and are set up into about 1,000 different religious sects. 
