Public Acts Passed at the Ses-
sion of the Forty-second Con-
gress.
 Supplemental Convention between the
 United States and Great Britain, con-
 cerning the Renunciation of Naturaliza-
 tion in certain Cases. Signed February
 23, 1871; Ratified March 24, 1871; Rati-
 fications exchanged May 4, 1871; Pro-
 claimed May 9, 1871.
 By the President of the United States of
 America:
 A PROCLAMATION.
 WHEREAS a convention supplemental to
 the convention of May 12, 1870, between
 the United States of America and Her
 Majesty the Queen of the United King-
 dom and Great Britain and Ireland, con-
 cerning naturalization, was concluded
 and signed at Washington by their re-
 spective plenipotentiaries on the twenty-
 third day of February, 1871, which sup-
 plemental convention is word for word
 as follows: (Signed)
 Whereas by the second article of the con-
 vention between the United States of
 America and her Majesty the Queen of
 the United Kingdom of Great Britain
 and Ireland, for regulating the citizen-
 ship of citizens and subjects of the con-
 tracting parties who have emigrated, or
 may emigrate, from the dominions of the
 one to those of the other party, signed
 at London, on the 13th of May, 1870, it
 was stipulated that the manner in which
 the renunciation by such citizens and
 subjects of their naturalization, and the
 renunciation of their native allegiance, a
 may be made and publicly declared,
 should be agreed upon by the govern-
 ments of the respective countries, the
 President of the United States of Ameri-
 ca and Her Majesty the Queen of the
 United Kingdom of Great Britain and
 Ireland, for the purpose of effecting such
 agreement, have resolved to conclude a
 supplemental convention, and have nam-
 ed as their plenipotentiaries, that is to
 say, the President of the United States
 of America, Hamilton Fish, Secretary of
 State, and Her Majesty the Queen of the
 United Kingdom of Great Britain and
 Ireland, Sir Edward Thornton, Knight
 Commander of the most honorable Order
 of the Bath, and her honorable extraordi-
 nary and minister plenipotentiary to the
 United States of America, who have
 agreed as follows:
 ARTICLE I. Any person, being original-
 ly a citizen of the United States who had
 previously to May 13th, 1870, been natu-
 ralized as a British subject, may, at any
 time before August 10th, 1872, and any
 British subject who, at the date first
 aforesaid, had been naturalized as a citi-
 zen within the United States, may, at any
 time before May 13th, 1872, publicly de-
 clare his renunciation of such naturaliza-
 tion by subscribing an instrument in writ-
 ing, substantially in the form hereunto
 appended, and designated as Annex A.
 Such renunciation, by an original citizen
 of the United States, of British nationality,
 shall, within the territories and jurisdic-
 tion of the United States, be made in du-
 plicate, in the presence of any court au-
 thorized by law for the time being to admit
 aliens to naturalization, or before the
 clerk or prothonotary of any such court;
 if the declarant be beyond the territories
 of the United States, it shall be made in
 duplicate, before any diplomatic or consular
 officer of the United States. One of
 such duplicates shall remain on record in
 the custody of the court or officer in whose
 presence it was made; the other shall be,
 without delay, transmitted to the Depart-
 ment of State.
 Such renunciation, if declared by an
 original British subject, of his acquired
 nationality as a citizen of the United
 States, shall, if the declarant be in the
 United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ire-
 land, be made in duplicate, in the presence
 of a justice of the peace; if elsewhere in
 Her Britannic Majesty's dominions, in tri-
 plicate, in the presence of any judge of
 civil or criminal jurisdiction, of any jus-
 tice of the peace, or of any other officer
 for the time being authorized by law, in
 the place in which the declarant is, to ad-
 minister an oath for the purpose, or other
 legal purpose; if out of Her Majesty's do-
 minions, in triplicate, in the presence of
 any officer in the diplomatic or consular
 service of Her Majesty.
 ARTICLE II. The contracting parties
 hereby engage to communicate each to
 the other, from time to time, lists of the
 persons who, within their respective
 dominions and territories, or before their
 diplomatic and consular officers, have de-
 clared their renunciation of naturaliza-
 tion, with the dates and places of making
 such declarations, and such information as
 to the books of declarants, and the times
 and places of their naturalization, as may
 have been furnished.
 ARTICLE III. The present convention
 shall be ratified by the President of the
 United States, by and with the advice and
 consent of the Senate thereof, and by Her
 Britannic Majesty, and the ratifications
 shall be exchanged at Washington as soon
 as may be convenient.
 In witness whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and
 have affixed thereto their respective seals.
 Done at Washington, the twenty-third
 day of February, in the year of our Lord
 one thousand eight hundred and seventy-
 one.

 [SEAL] EDWARD THORNTON.
 I, A. B. (Insert name), being origi-
 nally a citizen of the United States of
 America, (or a British subject,) and having
 become naturalized within the dominions
 of her Britannic Majesty as a British sub-
 ject, (or as a citizen within the United
 States of America,) do hereby renounce
 my naturalization as a British subject, (or
 citizen of the United States,) and declare
 that it is my desire to resume my national-
 ity as a citizen of the United States, (or
 British subject.) (Signed) J. J.

BLANK DEEDS, For Sale at this Office.

The enormous debt brought upon this country through the rebellion, is being rapidly extinguished by the economy and financial management of the Republican party. Man who grumble about taxes frequently advocate Democratic doctrines, which can lead ultimately to no other issue than a revival of the rebellion and consequent increase of the war debt. This seems inconsistent. The more reasonable course for property holders and tax-payers to adopt would be to develop the hearty support of the party that saved the country once, and will do so again should occasion require it.

How singular it is, that while the deeds of the Ku-Klux have been established by coroners' inquests and unimpeachable testimony, not only of sufferers but of other eye-witnesses, that no serious attempt has been made to charge similar outrages upon the Legal League!

If there were but a slight foundation for the imputation of lawlessness on the part of the Republicans, the Democracy would take immediate advantage of it, but as no such thing are known as Legal League outrages, we may implicitly believe that they do not exist. It would be as incongruous a term as "a Republican robbery" or "Democratic Unleash."

Those who have their rights excited whenever the word Ku-Klux is mentioned, would do well to read the letter of J. Lancaster, editor of the Navaota Reeper, in the New York Tribune of the 10th inst. Mr. Lancaster is an old and respected Texas, having been a participant in the Texas revolution, a "fighting" Confederate officer until the surrender, and a life-long Democrat. Yet his youngest son, a mere boy, was inhumanly tortured and hung, because he stepped over night at the house of a former slave of his father, who raised him from a child, and this was done by disguised men, who are well-known but cannot be punished on account of their wealth and influence in the community. It is true this happened over a year ago, but similar outrages occurred in Bastrop county a few weeks ago.

Here is a chance for the facious Democracy to give another fitting rear.

The Galveston News makes six lines from the Express the best of a really able treatise on the States rights doctrine, which occupies more than half of one of its long columns, containing an extract from the Southern Era, quoting a decision of the Supreme Court sustaining the doctrine. We have not the space, and perhaps not the ability, to argue this question exhaustively. The assailable Democratic objection to the abolition of State lines is, that it would tend to the establishment of a central government; and that the liberties of the people would be endangered by this concentration of power; and that this danger of despotism can only be averted by vigorous assertion of the rights of each individual State. This is the Democratic argument, fairly stated.

We say, without the slightest hesitation, that we hope and believe that the day will come when there shall be no State lines whatever. We advocate the revision of the rotation in office system and several other weakening peculiarities of our government. The News will doubtless be shocked at the tendency to "centralized imperialism." The Republican party is the party of centralization; it is also the party that practically carries out the system of branding the masses.

The Democratic party still advocates the States rights doctrine which went down with slavery. The keystone of the arch on which the Democratic structure is raised is "ignorance of the masses." The stronghold of the Democracy was and is in the South, and in the "progressive" State of Georgia 50,000 white adults can neither read nor write. The Republican

The Confederacy was the offspring of Democracy, and had it succeeded, does any sane man suppose that we would have had a vestige of civil liberty remaining? But that would be immaterial to the News, as long as the "constitutional rights" were secured. The negro would still be a serf and his master a bloodthirsty bully; there would be no liberty of the press, while the poor white trash would be carefully kept in ignorance and degradation that their blood might be poured out when danger threatened the "constitutional rights" of the slaveholder.

As the old slaveholding aristocracy of the South acknowledge the beneficial effects of the abolition of the "Divine Institution," the perpetuation of which was guaranteed by the constitution, there is reasonable ground for believing that the views of the Democracy may be modified with reference to other reforms that will be carried out by the party that deals with the problems of the future, and not with the dead issues of the past.

Alas! Poor Yorick.

Several of the leading democratic journals repudiate Jefferson Davis and his secession speeches. We are given to understand that "Mr. Jefferson Davis has no connection with the democratic party. Then we would like to know what party those who "hung on his lips" at Atlanta and Augusta, belong to? They are certainly not Republicans.

Now, here we see the ingratitude of the democracy: If ever a man has carried devotion to a party, to an extreme, that man is Mr. Davis; he has been an "adamantine democrat," and now in his old age, bowed down by misfortune, he is kicked out of the party ignominiously. He may well exclaim, in this hour of his political dissolution, decided and gloomy by those who once humiliated themselves before him in the dust: "Had I but served my country with half the zeal I served the democracy, I would not have been insulted and abandoned in my declining years."

The absolute necessity of an election this fall is becoming more generally advocated every day. Aside from the Constitutional objections to the holding of a third session, there are many urgent reasons in favor of the adoption of the suggestions made at the meeting of the County Convention of Bexar county, a few days since.

We expect, and are prepared for a violent opposition from a number of the Senators and representatives in any election this fall, but they should remember that the interests of the country are large, and not that of individuals should be the object of all services of the people, and that they will do well to ascertain the sentiment of the people on this subject, before they make up their minds what course they intend to pursue.

There will be a large number of these representatives of the people, who know that their chances of reelection are exceedingly small, and from these, principally, we expect the adoption of nothing that will endanger their pockets. They have no means of making a living, much less accumulating money or property, than their peers, and certain little privileges of office.

The prospective passage of a few more railroad schemes will enable them to retire into private life with a competence. Now the bribery that was carried on, almost openly, during the last session, is one of the strongest reasons that can be urged for an election this fall; that the next Legislature may be composed of men who represent the people.

It is very straining on the imagination to believe that impetuous individuals who were elected to the Legislature, and immediately indulged in a most expensive mode of living, and were found to always have money in any quantity, are honest men. Fast horses, rapid females, cigars, wine, fine dinners and promiscuous gambling with twenty dollar gold pieces every night, require a larger amount of the circulating medium than the State of Texas pays for the privilege of subsidizing railroad companies; and in some instances these economical gentlemen, after spending the session in the enjoyment of the requirements above mentioned, have managed to save enough to invest largely in property. We understand that Senator Gaines, in particular, has humbled himself that he might be elected, and he did feel himself so exalted that on one occasion, at least, he laid aside the reserve which his Democratic friends usually observe on such subjects, and gave as a reason for his sudden prosperity that he understood the use of his nose and eyes.

Now the honest people of the State want to be represented by honest men, and their wishes should prevail over the claims of the bloodsuckers that plundered the public treasury at the last session.

Let us have an election this fall. There are constitutional grounds in favor of it, and it is the wish of all honest men who have paid any attention to the railroad bribery that disgraced us at the last session.

Yeague Post—Fly-time.

The winter settlers in the lovely valley of the Sacramento seem to have adopted the rule followed by the Dutch in laying out the streets of New York—viz to build wide houses, and the paths the cows made in going to and from water.

An ordinance compelling property holders to place the line of all new buildings a certain distance back from the old line has done much to make our street resemble those of modern cities. The loss of the owners has been assessed by a jury and paid by the city. This is the only way to obviate the evil of narrow streets without doing manifest injustice to the owners of property.

We believe the subject has never been tested by the courts of the county therefore a decision on this subject is greatly to be desired and the prospects are that we will be accommodated, Mess. Wagner & Rimmel bought a small lot between their store and that of Mr. Sartor, paid no attention to the city ordinance, but having removed the debris of the old building proceeded to lay the old foundation of the new building on the old line. The city authorities will of course take the necessary legal steps to have the line of the building placed back and consequently we may expect a decision on this subject that will settle definitely the rights of the city in the matter of widening our thoroughfares.

The weather has been extraordinary all over the United States this summer. The heat has been unusually excessive and for a number of a destructive and peculiar nature have prevailed.

In England, also, the weather has been unusual; thunder storms and freshets have caused great damage to property and life. The learned in these matters think that a change is taking place in the climate of England and of the United States, as both countries are becoming more subject to severe drouth and destructive storms.

It is not our intention to convey any idea to the San Antonio Express, not being surgous, such efforts would be foolish.—Galveston News.

There is another reason the News seems to have overlooked. It is a criminal offence to convey that which a man is not possessed of.

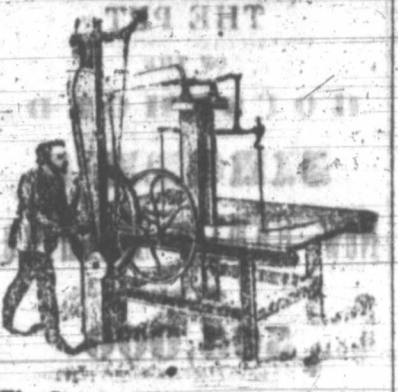
