But the reason for this opposition to what is everywhere recognized as the true and only safeguard against the loss of civil liberty, lies deeper than would at first appear. It is true that all hopes, and to a certain extent, all desire for the re-establishment of slavery have gone glimmering, but the hope of obtaining special legislation regulating the labor of the black race to the special benefit of his former master, has not been given up. The effective and continued management of the school system would destroy this last hope of ruling the South, as in bygone days, but that they are occasionally successful in their scheme, is shown by the fact that in Georgia the free school system has been virtually defeated by democratic wire pullers in the legislature.


