**Loss of Confidence.**

"I was joking, of course, and had quite  
forgotten the affair when, some days after,  
I happened in the court room during the

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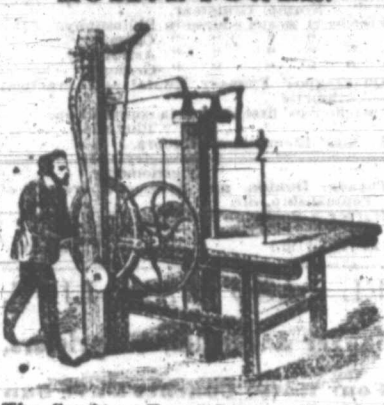
