TELEGRAPHIC
WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Felix R. Barnett has been appointed Indian Commissioner, vice Parker, resigned.
The cabinet session to day was attended by all the members excepting Greenwell, who was represented by one of the Assistant Post-masters.
The Pleasanton-Boutwell embroglio was the topic of consideration, but the discussions were not characterized by any difference in the point of adjusting the difficulties by supporting the Secretary of the Treasury. It may, therefore, be considered certain that Pleasanton will be removed and that Deputy Commissioner Douglas will succeed him.
The question of appointing an arbitrator under the Washington treaty was a feature of to-day's consultation, and without positive official endorsement, it can be stated that in all probability Charles Francis Adams will be designated to that office by the Secretary of State.
The debt statement shows a reduction of eight millions two hundred thousand. Coin balance, seventy-three millions; currency eight millions. During July the amount of national bank currency issued, was one million seven hundred and eighty thousand; under the law the same amount of 3 per cent. must be retired.
Mr. Von Schlozer, the new German Minister, presented to the President to-day the customary speeches made in accepting credentials. President said in addition, that ties arising from extended commercial intercourse and from mutual intercourse with Germany, many of our best citizens are natives of your country. Mr. Westernberg, from the King of the Netherlands also presented.
LONDON, Aug. 1.—Prince Arthur's pension of £1,500 per annum having passed both Houses, received assent.
But one case of cholera at Hull, and steps have been taken to localize the disease.
LONDON, Aug. 2.—In consequence of rumors as to the intention of the International Society, a vessel laden with petroleum was forbidden to ascend the Seine to Rouen.
LONDON, Aug. 2.—Papers having been seized at Marseilles showing a purpose of the Internationalists to fire the docks and burn the shipping and take the city during the confusion. Searey and Bourges were to be fired and taken in the same manner.
PARIS, Aug. 1.—Cholera has appeared in South France. Measures have been adopted to prevent it from spreading, if possible.
VERMILLES, Aug. 2.—President Thiers yesterday threatened to place his resignation of government in the hands of the Assembly, in consequence of the defeat of decentralization. It is thought to day, however, the matter will not be made a cabinet question.
BOSTON, Aug. 1.—Four barns struck with lightning; one burned with several valuable horses.
Mail steamer Delta, from Bermuda, reports a fire at Point-a-Pitre, Guadalupe, and nearly the whole town burned. Thirty thousand people are without shelter.
Sugar ready for shipping destroyed.
Town was rebuilt entirely of wood after its destruction by a earthquake in 1843. Supposed incendiary.
NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Two men were thrown from the Second Avenue street cars on Sunday by two roughs; one is dead and the other will die. The murderers are at large.
United States Commissioners Balkman and Love have been busily engaged all day in making arrangements for the thorough investigation into the cause which led to the explosion of the ferry boat Westfield. They are determined to make full inquiry and elicit all facts possible to disclose where the negligence and culpability rested. The investigation will commence to-morrow before the commissioners.

The delegates are without instructions, as to preference for any particular candidate but are instructed to vote for the strongest man, most likely to defeat Hancock. As the secretary of the meeting has failed to forward us a copy of the proceedings we are unable to give our readers the resolutions.

Next week we shall review the action of the Police and show the Republican votes how they are represented by the Justices of the Peace they elected.

A RUN-A-WAY horse and buggy sullied the solitude of market street day before yesterday (Friday) afternoon. We understand it was the property of Mr. Shook, who was thrown out, but not hurt. The buggy was a complete wreck. The accident was caused by a small boy scaring the horse.

The meeting at Boerne that passed resolutions concerning the course of the Government in regard to the Indian question should have likewise passed a resolution recognizing the persistent efforts of Gen. Reynolds to obtain the removal of the Kickapoo, and the arduous services of the army in doing what they can with the limited available force at their disposition to protect the frontier.

It is on this account Mr. Degener has incurred their bitter animosity, no Democrat is hated more cordially, nor is there one more bitterly denounced by Davis, and his mouthpiece, the Austin Journal, than this man, Mr. Degener. To prevent his nomination Davis and Newcomb, and every official, are using their every attention to pack the nominating Convention to be held at New Braunfels on the 14th prox. The School Boards of Directors are canvassing the school districts for that purpose, and from what we can learn, we deem the chances decidedly in favor of the nomination of Jimmy Ledown over Degener. We had supposed the strong German county of Medina would have sent delegates favorable to Degener, but we learn that two office-holders of Davis' have been selected, and of course they will cast their votes for Jimmy Ledown. Hence we have concluded that as the nominating Convention will be composed of State or County officials, and those of the Loyal League, and knowing how bitterly the colored element and the yankee radical element hate the Germans, we are well satisfied that our friend Degener has not the ghost of a chance for a nomination. His friends and supporters may be numerous and faithful, yet yankee trickery will win.—San Antonio Herald.

We should not take the trouble of clipping the above extract from the Herald, although we have seen the substance of it elsewhere in nearly every democratic journal of Western Texas, had not the last issue of Journal contained some remarks that had a similar drift.

We know full well that nothing could more favorable to Hancock than the present course of the official organ at Austin,

but we believe that the Journal is being manipulated in the individual interest of Mr. Newcomb, (the protestations of his friends and himself to the contrary,) but that Gov. Davis neither desires or sanctions such a course.

If this course is persisted in, we shall feel ourselves called upon, in our turn, to address some pertinent questions to the gentleman that, by common consent, is looked upon as the rival of Mr. Degener.

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
