### Our Congressional Platform.

In a former article in the EXPRESS, the suggestion was made that the nominating convention at New Braunfels establish a platform upon which the Congressional candidates will be required to place themselves, and on the occasion referred to we gave some hints as to our ideas of the character of the platform. We make the following suggestions for the benefit of delegates that will be present at the Convention, should they see fit to profit by them:

1. Endorsement of the National Republican Platform.
2. Endorsement of President Grant and his administration.
3. Endorsement of Governor Davis and his administration.
4. Endorsement of all those administrative measures that are calculated to protect life and property, and to promote education.
5. Endorsement of the Governors veto in opposition to Railroad subsidies.
6. Protection of the frontier at the expense of the United States Government.
7. No session of the Legislature in September but State and municipal elections this fall.

It is to be hoped that the Republicans of the Fourth District will give this matter serious attention and that the platform, as proposed, may be acceptable.

The Journal of the 11th plays "man" and refuses to answer a few questions which we as "a humble dweller on the prairie" had a right to ask of a candidate who seeks the votes of the people.

The Convention should not permit any delegate to represent the people of a county in another district from that of which he resides, as this if carried out would cause conventions to be a farce. The object is to ascertain the sentiment of the district and this can not be done if the counties are represented by men who live elsewhere.

It seems, that it makes no difference how dirty a tumbling republican gets himself; if he can only crawl out again he is received with open arms by his companions. For instance observe the touching affection that is shown the filthy Gainers by the Journal and Union. The regaining of Gainers again is no gain to the party, but he may be very useful in electing Gen. Clark. We do not straddle such Republicanism.

This strong-minded woman in the north are always at daggers points with some one for not giving them all their rights, or uttering disparaging remarks about them. St. Paul, Henry Ward Beecher, and General Grant, are frequently referred to in terms more emphatic than complimentary.

If St. Paul is abused for the gentle admonitions of the strong-minded in his day, what will be done and said about the Rev. Jamieson, at the great national camp meeting at Roundlake the other day, who made use of the following language:

Women and the devil turned everything upside down in the beginning. God had given to woman a special gift of influence that he had withheld from man. But Satan had got her early in her life, and she had kept up her wickedness ever since. I don't know of any sisters, the devil hasn't left you alone yet. Satan refused to smite Job's wife because he knew she was one of his best allies.

The letter of Mr. Peyton Smyth and a few friends, "earnest opponents of Radicalism" to John Hancock and the General's reply are to be found in the columns of Herald.

How little singular that after the charge has been so completely refuted as the General says it has, that so many prominent (I suppose of radicalism) should see fit to address the General at all on this subject and it is still more singular that the General should come to San Antonio "to rise to explain." Perhaps by the time he got here, some of the gentlemen who pushed into print with such avidity, will be able to refresh their memories sufficiently to be able to tell, not what he did not say, but what he did say. We suppose there is no doubt about that unfortunate expression in reference to "niggers." If there is, perhaps it would be better for Mr. Smyth to interrogate him on that point also.

When General Hancock has explained his explanation we will give the substance of what he did say.

### The New Braunfels Convention

On Saturday there will be four candidates for congressional nomination: E. Degener, John Newcomb, D. D. Dierdorfer, and Lewis G. Brown.

Mr. Dierdorfer and his friends are doubtless aware that he has no chance whatever, being almost unknown to the voters of the district.

Gen. Brown's chances are not better than Dierdorfer's, for the same reason, and the object of his re-appearance on the field immediately after the public announcement of Mr. Newcomb's becoming a candidate, is very apparent, but it occurs to nobody to imagine that it is his own nomination he seeks.

There are really but two candidates before the delegates for election: Hon. Ed. Degener and the Hon. Jas. P. Newcomb.

The records of these gentlemen are so well known as to need no comment from us at this time, and we will therefore confine ourselves to their present position before the Convention, as candidates for nomination.

Mr. Degener has been the announced candidate of the Republican party for a long time. It has been so well understood that Mr. Newcomb would be the opposing candidate for nomination. Any one who has noted the tone of the State Journal for the last six months, in reference to Mr. Degener's congressional efforts to advance the welfare of the people of Western Texas, coupled with other indications at San Antonio, taken in connection with the drift of the conversation of those who were best acquainted with Mr. Newcomb, can have arrived at no other conclusion than that Mr. Newcomb would be a candidate for nomination.

For this we were prepared, and to this we had not the slightest objection, and had Mr. Newcomb placed himself before the public as a candidate on Mr. Degener's arrival in Texas, no republican in this section would have hesitated in pledging Mr. Newcomb unqualified support, in case he were nominated.

If the sentiments of the republicans of the 4th district have undergone a change in regard to Mr. Newcomb, he has no one but himself to ascribe it to.

Mr. Newcomb did not announce himself on Mr. Degener's arrival, but remained seemingly "a looker on in Venice" until public sentiment and the dictates of prudence compelled him to appeal to the public in a card a few days before the Convention meets, and after a majority of the delegates were already instructed to give their votes to Mr. Degener.

It was essential for the success of the Republican nominee that there should be no wrangling among the candidates for nomination, and there did not exist the slightest necessity for it.

A meeting of a Convention, representing the sentiment of the entire district, had been called for the purpose of framing a platform upon which the candidate for nomination would be required to place himself, and this would definitely settle the position of the nominee toward the administration of Gov. Davis, taking it for granted that Gov. Davis has no policy of his own antagonistic to the will of the people.

This effectually removed the necessity for any disagreement between opposing candidates.

The surprise of Mr. Degener and his friends can be imagined when, in the Journal of July 25 he finds that before he can appear before the nominating convention he must submit to a cross examination at the hands of his yet unannounced but well known antagonist, and this too in an offensive and arrogant manner.

We replied to this unheard of mode of electioneering with ridicule and defiance, but at the same time referring to Mr. Degener's willingness to answer all interrogatories at the Convention, but refusing satisfaction to the Journal, and we asked cessation of this mode of warfare which would compel us to reply in defence of Mr. Degener, as thereby the prospect of electing the nominee ever Hancock would be endangered by internal dissensions.

We subsequently referred to the platform that stands at the head of our columns for information regarding Mr. Degener's position.

But from that day to this the Journal has willfully and maliciously mis-constructed Mr. Degener's refusal to be criticised by the organ of Mr. Newcomb into an affected superiority over the people.

We are satisfied that the delegates themselves decide who it is that affects to assume a pompous style of self-sufficiency toward the people they represent. We are satisfied too, from our knowledge of the republican sentiment of the delegates, that they will repudiate with scorn, as we have done, the idea that the State Journal is better able to judge as to the views of the people on the measures of the administration than the people themselves.

Either of the gentlemen referred to are capable of properly representing this district in Congress, and we have only to regret that the course of the Journal has been such as to justify the inference that no candidate but Mr. Newcomb will receive any substantial support from the parties who are responsible for the suicidal course the Journal has taken in this matter.

The Grand Jury of Bastrop county deny the existence of Ku Klux bands in that county, although the testimony of a number of witnesses was explicit that the parties who committed the outrages were Ku Klux, and so called themselves.

It is not denied that a church and school house were burned, and that within a comparatively short time six or eight murders have been committed, not to men-

tion several meetings, and for these offences that have been a single trial or conviction, and for the Grand Jury declare that no Ku Klux exist. The Governor has written a scathing letter to Judge Carpenter, of that District, and the prospect of martial law being proclaimed is very ominous. Should the Governor see, he will be sustained by the people generally. The day has passed in Texas when the popular sympathy drifts in favor of the law breaker.

The Sunday Law excitement is on the increase in Cincinnati, and the Commercial says that the popular demonstrations have declared that the law shall stand.

The law itself reads:

"It is hereby declared to be unlawful for any keeper of any tavern, coffee-house, restaurant, confectionery or drug store, except for medicinal purposes, to sell, barter, or give away, upon Sunday, any ale, beer, port or other fermented or spirituous liquors, or suffer the same to be drunk upon, in, or about, his or her premises."

And the prominent Journal who advocate the enforcement of the law call upon the Mayor to enforce the law and shut up every drinking place on Sunday. While the Commercial triumphs in the first part of the article from which the above was taken, it loses courage upon receiving intelligence that the lower branch of the common council had passed a bill to repeal the law.

The Victoria Advocate of the August 11 publishes a ridiculous piece of absurdity and says that it appeared in the Express. As no such piece ever appeared in the Express the Advocate has made a mistake, or done worse. Please mention the date of the Express that contained the article referred to.

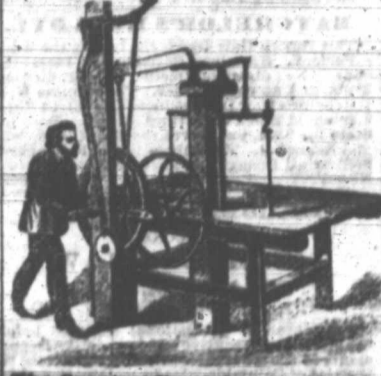
