LET THE AMERICAN PEOPLE PONDER! Ku-Klux Bitchery! Eleven Pregnant Facts Brought to Light by the Congressional Investigating Committee. Its Democratic Fidelity, Its Hellish Features and Party Purposes.

The Congressional Committee investigating the Ku-Klux Bitchery—a sub-committee in South Carolina—have now been in daily session more than five months, and have had before them many scores of witnesses from all sections of the late in rebellion States—men of both high and humble station—Presiding Elders, Preachers, ex-Members of the Federal Congress and ex-Members of the Confederate Congress, ex-Generals of both Armies, Governors and ex-Governors, Judges, Solicitors, Sheriffs, Revenue Officers, Officers of the Army, Postmasters, School Teachers, Repentant and Non-Repentant members of Ku-Klux Klan, and dozens of named and unnamed whites, black and white.

1. That in all the insurrectionary States, and generally diffused, though not found in every county, is an oath-bound, secret Organization, working only at night, and its members always in disguise, with Officers, Signs, Signals, Pass-words, Grips, and all the necessary paraphernalia, with the pledge and sworn purpose of putting down the Republic and putting up the Democratic Party; known in different localities among the initiated by different names, but everywhere recognized by the general cognomen "KU-KLUX."

2. That the organization came into being a few months previous to the last Presidential Election, during which cause it was in its most vigorous condition, but it is now through all the South, with more efficient discipline and effective direction than ever, reviving in preparation for the next Presidential campaign, when, as the soldiers of their victims in Tennessee a few weeks since, "a general voting is to be allowed to any Southern State, by black or white."

3. That this Ku-Klux organization is the premeditated and determined scheme for carrying the South at the next election of President, and so, by securing the entire electoral vote of that section, make sure the election of the Democratic nominee.

4. That the officers and establishers of these "dens" (as they appropriately call their separate bands) are the leading and active Democratic politicians of the South.

5. That the scheme has the hearty good will of a large section of the Democratic party in all these States, and the acquiescence of nearly the entire party.

6. That the direct and chief purpose of the organization, as sworn by all the victims, as the assertion—uniformly made to them by these midnight assassins, and corroborated by the universal testimony of the repentant and divulging members of the Order, is this: The putting down of the Republican and the putting up of the Democratic party.

7. That while the Democratic and Ku-Klux Witnesses on their direct examination usually deny the political purpose of the Order, asserting that the Ku-Klux are social necessity growing out of the abolition of the old system; that they have to ride the country to "keep the Niggers in their places" thus under the influence of Radical Legislation and Methodist Preaching the Niggers are liable to become sassy, and without an occasional Ku-Klux visit would "begin to think themselves as good as his folks;" and that these frequent floggings, and an occasional murder, are necessary to maintain such a state of morals among the Blacks as will permit the vice-lusting Whites to live in their neighborhood; yet, on the cross-examination, these Witnesses also very generally, as well as very reluctantly, confess that the intention of Republican voters is a prominent and not to be regretted result.

One of the months of more than two hundred Witnesses is every syllable of this established, and more than ten thousand of the thousands dead, from hidden plots by weapons, by swamp and marsh, and from the simple, soberest fired homes, about their ghastly AMEN! Education.

We are confident that when the compulsory school system has been placed in working order, that the thinking men of the State, particularly those who are fathers of families, will rally to its support with enthusiasm, and that it will eventually be looked upon as the most beneficial measure that the Republican administration has introduced, not even excepting the State Police.

It is the experience of all countries that a failure to adopt some well arranged system of educating the young, inevitably results in an alarming increase of criminals. A street railroad has commenced running in Constantinople.

Returns from North Carolina show that the republicans have gained largely and have carried the state by over 10,000 majority.

Correspondence.

NEW BRUNSWICK, Aug. 16, 1871. Editor of the Antioch Express: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your issue of the 10th inst. containing a copy of the New York Herald's account of the Convention of the Republican party of this district, and I am glad to see that you have assembled a more complete and thorough representation of the republicans of Western Texas. Every county in the district was represented, and that too for the most part by men of standing and influence, of judgment and discretion, and moved by a desire to promote the best of true republicanism, rather than that of individualism.

The Convention assembled at ten o'clock on yesterday, electing as temporary chairman Hon. F. E. Guthrie of De Witt county, and as temporary Secretary Callaway Jones, of Colorado county. After the appointment of committees on credentials and permanent organization, the Convention adjourned until 8 o'clock P. M. Upon the meeting at that hour, the Hon. Thomas H. Baker, of Caldwell, was elected President of the Convention by acclamation, and the usual number of Vice-Presidents and Secretaries were chosen without trouble, after the report of the committee on credentials had been received by the Convention, there being no seriously contested seats. Upon motion, the President appointed a committee of nine to draft resolutions, instructing them to report at 10 o'clock A. M. on the following morning.

When the Convention met this morning, being informed that the committee on resolutions was not quite prepared to report, the Convention adjourned until 11 o'clock. Not until and the platform of principles reported by the committee was read twice, and immediately adopted by acclamation. A committee was then appointed to wait upon the Hon. B. DeGroot and other candidates for congressional honors, and request them to appear before the Convention, and to announce, before their names were submitted, whether or not they would stand fairly and squarely upon the platform as adopted. Hon. Mr. DeGroot was the first to briefly state that he cordially and freely approved every portion of it.

Hon. J. P. Newcomb, in a happy and generous speech, singling out why and how he came to offer himself as a candidate, withdrew his name, as did also Gen. L. G. Brown, when, upon motion, the Hon. B. DeGroot was nominated by acclamation at precisely 12 o'clock. Mr. DeGroot was loudly called for, and made an able and telling speech, entirely sustaining the whole Convention and the platform which had grown out of the crisis, but we doubt well-timed counsel, course of the Austin Journal, that he was not in full accord with the policy of the State administration, were unjust and without foundation. A marked effect was produced upon every person present, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. Mr. DeGroot was frequently interrupted by applause, and I regret that want of time prevents me from undertaking to give a brief synopsis of his speech. Every one seemed more than rejoiced that they had their noble and tried old standard-bearer again to the front, and felt that the battle they are sure to win was already won.

Mr. Newcomb followed in a spirited and able speech. He announced that he would take the stump for Mr. DeGroot, and between his pointed thrusts and our standard-bearer's heavy knocks, if Gen. J. Hancock has a breath of political life left in him, it will be as plain that the best intellectual party physician will be unable to detect it.

There has been a glorious work done here during these two days; the breakers are all running in the most general election. The harmony which exists in our ranks, and which they have been trying hard to believe had no existence, but which has here been made so clearly manifest, will fall like a thunder bolt among the dismayed ranks of the democracy. The Convention has been largely attended by outsiders, and the town has presented a lively appearance during its session. The Convention meets at 8 o'clock this evening to conclude its labors in reorganization, and will adjourn.

The visit of the Prince of Wales has not turned out as was expected, as his failure to obtain the release of the Fenian prisoners, and the blooded attendant on the meeting of the citizens of Dublin to ask royal intercession has exasperated the Irish more than ever against the royal family.

The Republican party of Kentucky have defeated the Democratic majority in the State of England, and are on the march for the railroad. The Virginia papers poke fun at the knights that poke sticks at the rings. Gen Rafael Quesada landed with an expedition of several hundred men on the Cuban coast, and has not been defeated as reported. There is no doubt that indulgence will be granted to the obscure, the ignorant, the weak, and the erring, but the leaders of the Commune shall be treated without mercy.

Carl Marx, a German, is the founder of the International Society. The census of Great Britain show that out of about 31,500,000 people only 30,000 are land-holders.

Russia is a great horse country, having one horse to every three inhabitants. In Indiana a great slave seeks a divorce. Mr. Hatch, the book keeper of the Amador Mines in California was mortally wounded by rioters after he had shot one of the ringleaders in self-defense. There is a prospect of serious fighting.

Platform and Resolutions of the New Brunswick Convention. Whereas, it is customary for political parties to announce their Platform upon the opening of a political campaign, and particularly in this age, when the people are agitated upon issues both National and local in their character, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Republicans of the 4th Congressional District of Texas, in Convention assembled, recognize the Republican party as the party of progress and civilization, and we pledge ourselves, as we have done in the past, so in the future, to protect the rights and liberties of the people, without regard to race or color. Resolved, We hereby declare that we are in full harmony with the National Republican party, and that we endorse the Platform, National and State, of said party. Resolved, That in President Grant we recognize the standard-bearer of the Republican party, and that we support his administration.

Resolved, That we have the greatest confidence in the ability and honesty of Governor E. J. Davis, and heartily endorse his administration, and particularly the principal measures enacted, such as the Miller Bill, Peties Bill, the law prohibiting the carrying of deadly weapons, and the School Bill, which secure to us the protection of life and property, and the education of our children. Resolved, That we recognize the Republican party as the champion of a judicious system of Internal Improvement, to develop the great resources of our State, yet we are abundantly in our State Executive for his firm stand against a too lavish expenditure of subsidies for railroads.

Resolved, That we emphatically instruct our Representatives to use all their power for the protection by law of our frontier against the depredations of the savage Indians, and that we demand it the imperative duty of the national government, to reimburse the State of Texas the expenses incurred on account of Frontier Protection. Resolved, That thirty years of Democratic misrule, including the destruction caused by the rebellion, has left our State and local governments in dilapidation and ruin making it necessary now to call upon the people to bear a heavy tax in order to establish order, suppress crime, promote education and to repair and erect public buildings and open and repair public highways, but as soon as the means are secured to build the necessary school houses, and the local government in proper running order, we favor a reduction of taxation, pledging ourselves to this policy, and against the increase of taxation by the granting of railroad subsidies, etc.

Resolved, That the Democratic State Convention, refusing to accept the natural and legitimate fruits of the late rebellion, by forcibly declaring in their platform their purpose to restore the government to its original basis, and obliterate the laws of the United States in defense of liberty, to expunge the 13th, 14th, and 15th amendments to the Constitution, from that instrument, and recommit the colored man to the virtual condition of a slave calls for earnest condemnation at our hands. Resolved, That we hereby declare it to be the determination of this Convention to elect in the name of no man as a candidate for Congress who does not give his unqualified support to the party nominee and the platform herein set forth.

THE HOWE SEWING MACHINES ARE LEADING ALL OTHERS.

Received the Cross of the Legion of Honor and Gold Medal at the Paris Exposition, in 1867, and the Gold Medal at Amsterdam Exhibition, in 1869.
