CONVENTION
BETWEEN THE
General Post Office of the United States of America and the General Post Office of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.
(Continued.)
ARTICLE XI.
Duplicate orders shall only be issued by the postal administration of the country on which the original orders were drawn, and conform with the regulations established or to be established in that country.

ARTICLE XII.
At the close of each quarter, three copies of an account shall be prepared and transmitted by the office at London, exhibiting the balance found due on the exchange of orders during the quarter; which balance, if due by the United States office, shall, if due by the British office, it shall be paid at New York, and always in the money of the country to which the payment is made. If, pending the settlement of an account, one of the two postal administrations shall ascertain that it owes the other a balance exceeding one thousand pounds sterling, the indebted administration shall promptly remit the approximate amount of such balance to the credit of the other. This account, and the letters which accompany such intermediate remittances, shall be in accordance with the Forms C, D, and E, annexed to the convention.

ARTICLE XIII.
Until the two General Post Offices shall consent to an alteration, it is agreed that, in all matters of account relative to money orders which shall result from the execution of the present convention, the pound sterling of Great Britain shall be considered as equivalent to four dollars and eighty-six cents of the gold coin of the United States.

ARTICLE XIV.
Each exchange office shall certify its orders to the other, in amounts designated in the denominations of the money both of the despatching and receiving country, at the rate of conversion established upon the basis of gold by Article XIII of this convention. This convention shall be checked at the receiving office of exchange.

ARTICLE XV.
All payments for money orders, whether to or by the public, if not in gold, shall be made to the nearest practicable equivalent.

ARTICLE XVI.
The value, in gold coin of the United States, of deposits in paper money made in that country for payment in Great Britain, shall be determined at the exchange office of New York, according to the rate of premium on gold, on the day of receipt at that office of notification of such deposits. On the other hand, the value, in United States paper currency, of money orders certified in the lists sent from the exchange office of London to the exchange office at New York, shall be determined (also at New York) in accordance with the premium on gold on the day of the receipt of such lists.

ARTICLE XVII.
Orders which shall not have been paid within twelve calendar months from the month of issue shall become void, and the sums received shall accrue to and remain at the disposal of the country of origin. The British office shall therefore enter to the credit of the United States, in the quarterly account, all money orders entered in the lists received from the United States which remain unpaid at the end of the period specified. On the other hand, the United States office shall, at the close of each month, transmit to the British office, for entry in the quarterly account, a detailed statement of all orders included in the lists despatched from the latter office which, under this article, become void.

ARTICLE XVIII.
Repayment of orders to remitters shall not be made until an authorization for such repayment shall first have been obtained by the country of issue from the country where such orders were payable and the amounts of the repaid orders shall be duly credited to the former country in the quarterly account. It is the province of each postal administration to determine the manner in which repayment to the remitter is to be made.

In Lamar county the corn crop has been injured by the drought.

BEEF BROT brandy is attracting attention in England.

The Herston Telegraph calls the Governor a little tyrant—he is six feet four inches.

In the District Court of Harrison county, at the last term, seven were convicted for felonies and one for murder in the first degree.

The proposal submitted to the voters of Galveston to donate \$500,000 to the Central Transit railway company, has been defeated.

There have been four attempts, three of which were successful, to burn the school houses of the colored people of Colliu county.

By the Journal of the 20th, we see that Hancock, in a recent speech, remembered having said something detrimental about the Germans, but he alleged that it was done in irony. Wasn't it irony?

RICHARD NELSON announces himself a candidate for Congressional honors in the third district. General Clark is the regular nominee, and independent candidates stand no chance.

The only objection that has been urged against Bryant, the republican nominee in the second district, is that he is a republican. His election over the disreputable Coomer is considered certain.

MARSH COOPER and McDonald, while sitting in a grocery, were shot by some unknown person from a distance, and severely wounded. All of which happened in the town of Woodland, State of Texas. The circumstance is much regretted, particularly by the gentlemen who were shot.

The Campaign Opened.

With this number of the Free Press we open the campaign on behalf of the republican candidate, and we shall contribute our share in driving from the field our democratic opponent.

We have on one side the notorious Mr. Hancock, a political turn-coat, who really does not know what party he belongs to; he is at one time a would-be leader of a negro regiment, at another he declares them to be miles, while in the mean time he has been raising a colored regiment of his own. This is the same man that, a few years ago, when he thought to improve his congressional chances, grossly insulted the Germans, and who now, in order to gain a few votes, is as obsequious as a boot-black. In a word, he is a dunkey of the first water.

The people know and will appreciate his successful efforts in behalf of Western Texas, and for the improvement of the harbors on the coast, and we mention his endeavors to protect our exposed frontier.

Besides this, we know Mr. Degener to be a man of honor in whom there is no guile—a Republican from principle, who in 1868 planted the standard of freedom and equal rights.

He is a man of progress and discretion, who understands how to sift the wheat from the chaff.

Can any Western Texan, who desires the prosperity and welfare of the country, hesitate in deciding which of these two men shall represent us in Congress?

The Devil's Dream.

We have for some time suspected our devil of democratic tendencies. His selfishness, greediness, and use of bad grammar, goes far to create that impression. Our worst fears have been realized—he has let the cat out of the bag: he is a Democrat.

We found it out in the following manner: On entering our office yesterday morning we were struck with his supernaturally bad and morose appearance. The corners of his naturally expressive mouth were drawn down and he didn't have a word to say. We asked him what was the matter, and then a fear about the size of a boy's marble rolled out of the corner of his eye and splashed on the floor. He covered his face with his hands and booh-booh'd right out, "Oh, that barbecue! I always said so. Oh, that barbecue!" "What barbecue?" we enquired; "we haven't had any barbecue." "When it was seen by the Democrats that a few Germans were dissatisfied, they thought it would be a good idea to have a grand barbecue at the San Pedro springs; when Gen. Hancock came over, so as to fool them into becoming Democrats. We thought if we could only get them to attend a democratic barbecue that we would have them sure, but if it didn't turn out right—Oh, that barbecue! (Here the devil was again overcome by his feelings.)

"Well, it was a real old-fashioned democratic barbecue. You see the democrats out in the country didn't know anything about the departure, nor accepting the amendments and the like; so we most of them can't read, and they thought it was a real old-fashioned Confederate democratic blow out, and they came in from Wilson, Attascosa, and from the Cibola by the thousand. You never saw the like; it reminded me of when Sibley's brigade came through on their way to New Mexico. They came just a-whooping and howling, with their six shooters and bowie knives on; some of them had red handkerchiefs tied around their necks, and had Mexican hats and spurs on, and if you had seen them galloping past on their ponies, with their yellow hair flying in the wind, you would have thought that the old Confederacy had come to life again.

"The speaker's stand was tastefully decorated with the Union flag and another waved above it. On the platform were seated nearly a dozen ex-judges, ex-colonels, ex-generals, a few of our prominent German citizens, and one or two negroes, and perhaps a United States officer or so.

"The whole thing would have been a grand success if it had not been for one unfortunate circumstance, and that was that some one had sent out three or four barrels of whiskey. The rebel-democrats had come out to have a good time and didn't care much about politics, but you see when they got to drinking that whiskey with a pint cup, their real sentiments would show themselves and the consequence was that by the time Judge Hancock was about to address the audience they were all half drunk, and there was nobody that dared to take the whiskey away from them.

"Some of them were running horse races and shooting for Jeff. Davis and shooting off their pistols, and Judge Hancock began to wish he were back in Austin in the midst of his family.

"Then they all gathered around the speaker's stand, and one of the prominent democrats arose and said, 'fellow-citizens, I have the honor to introduce to the taxpayers of Bexar county, General—I mean Judge Hancock, of Austin, who will proceed to expose the corruptions of radicalism.' It was in vain that the gentlemen on the platform endeavored to appease the crowd; they fired off their pistols and waved their bowie knives at the speakers. "Is there no Confederate general present who has influence with these men?" enquired Judge Hancock of his friends, but a glance showed that all the democrats on the platform had never been in the army. The whiskey drinking was still kept up, and some one in the crowd proposed to hang Hancock because he had been colonel of a negro regiment, which was received with great applause. The Judge inwardly resolved that if he ever got out of this scrape he would be a Union man sure enough in the future.

"The crowd made an attempt to get on the platform but the ladder had been removed. The Judge then called for some one to go to Gen. Reynolds for assistance, but it was thought he might refer them to the civil authorities. 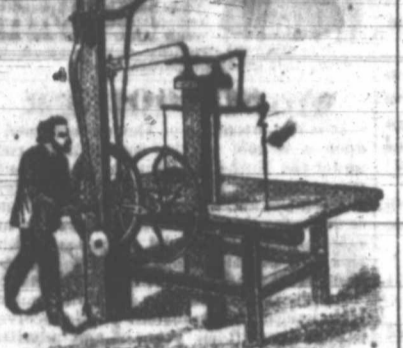
