TELEGRAPHIC. PARIS, Aug. 29.—Riva's proposal for prolongation of term of Thiers will be brought before the Assembly to-day.

Gen. Durrot appointed military commander at Bruges. Reported Radical deputy will resign seats in the Assembly and contest election in all departments.

Discussion of report of committee upon motion submitted by M. Rivet for prolongation of power of Thiers will begin in Assembly to-morrow.

Municipal council of Paris has resolved to issue in form of lottery at three per cent, loan for a large amount.

PARIS, Aug. 29.—Prussians will probably evacuated the forts near Paris on the fifth of September.

BERLIN, Aug. 28.—Prussian Cross Gazette confirms report that second meeting of German and Austrian Emperors has been arranged, and states it will take place probably on the 7th of September at Salzburg.

Emperor Francis Joseph will be accompanied by Count Von Bress. Firm basis laid at Gadsden for relations between the police and people, but no disturbance occurred.

The French delegation, who since their arrival in Ireland, have met with a constant succession of enthusiastic greetings from the people of Ireland, leave Dublin to-morrow for England.

The report of a treaty of alliance, offensive and defensive, concluded by Prussia and Italy, rests on the authority of a special dispatch to the London Standard.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Mystery of corpse in trunk clearing up. Alhas Anber, from whose notorious abduction the trunk was taken, has been arrested. People attempted to lynch him on his way to jail.

LOUISVILLE, Aug. 29.—Several hundred negroes collected around the Danville jail to protect a prisoner charged with arson, from the MacKlux, panicked during the night rushed into the streets, fired about a hundred shots, wounding several of themselves.
