Austin Letter.

The Legislature—A short Session earnestly wished for—General prospects.

Austin, Sept. 14th, 1871.

The Legislature is together again. Their meeting at this time is unfortunate, and there is really nothing to keep them here. The prospect of an adjournment within a week seems probable; and the only important action likely to be had is an act ordering an election. Senator Bowers has introduced a bill providing for a special election for members of the Legislature on the 29th of November, but his bill will not pass. The constitution requires the constitutional amendments passed last session be submitted at the same time of an election for members of the Legislature; his bill is, in this particular, impossible. Republicans also favor a general election, embracing all officers, and then will also necessitate a vote upon the Capital, and a three months notice. A measure will pass providing for an election but not that of the worthy Bowers. Should an election act pass then will also be a new apportionment.

The Republican party is better united and much stronger in the Legislature than when it adjourned, all of the bolting Senators, republican, are working all right now.

News from all quarters of the State is cheering, and every day serves to dispell the clouds raised by the howling Democracy.

The flimsy charges about radical taxation are fast working in favor of the Republican party. Sensible people are not likely to be pulled around by the nose by such men as Hancock, and as the day of election approaches the undecided are making up their minds to cast their votes upon the Republican side. This county is splendidly organized and Mr. Hancock must look abroad for comfort. One thing is said and repeated in all quarters, that the Germans are not going with the Republican party; whether true or false it causes lamination; and I hope it will be proven in October next that our old rebel enemies have made a mistake. When the no-tax party is triumphant it will not last long unless its twin sister a no-government policy is also inaugurated and that will not last very long.
