MILITARY PERSONALS.—The State Department at Washington has forwarded to General James H. Carleton—Commanding this Post—a cipher received in an obliquely silver mounted seal, a present to this officer from General Housin of the Army of Tunis, Africa, also a Turkish sword, of fine quality. The blade of the sword, or scimitar, is of pure Damascus steel, very ancient, and is valuable and interesting as a relic of the Middle Ages, having been used in the expedition of the Spaniards from Tunis during the first century of Mohammedanism. The mounting, of pure silver, is curious from the fact that it displays a commendable attempt at hermetic skill and workmanship, and altogether the scimitar is one highly to be prized and complimentary to Gen. Carleton.
GEN. BRER, C. CARD, acting chief Quartermaster of this Department left here on Sunday morning for New Orleans, in obedience to special Order No. 187 to attend as a witness before a General Court Martial and will be absent for several weeks. Maj. Samuel T. Chubb, Commissary of subsistence, has been assigned to perform the duties of the Quartermaster's Department during the absence of General Card.
GEN. JOHN F. HATCH, 9th U. S. Cavalry, detailed as President of a General Court Martial, to assemble at Fort Clark in town en route to the last named Station.
COL. NATHANIEL S. CONSTANCE, Assistant Quartermaster A. S. A., arrived here from the north a few days since and has been assigned to duty as member of a Board of officers, for the purchase of cavalry horses, which are to be purchased in open market. Col. Constance achieved an enviable reputation during the war as a live Quartermaster and brave soldier. He bears, on his person no less than dozen gun-shot wounds as gentle reminders of the late "unpleasantness."
MAJ. GEORGE E. ELLEN, Assistant Quartermaster A. S. A., stationed at Fort McIntosh, reached this city on Sunday, en route for his Post—from leave of absence. Maj. Allen will remain here a few days after which he will start to rejoin his Station.

Among the guests at the Continental Hotel, we notice the name of Gen. James A. Ekin, Deputy Quartermaster General U. S. A. During the war he was an intimate friend of President Lincoln and Secretary Stanton.
