TO THE GERMANS.

The Germans should unanimously support their own countryman, Degener, because the American that is opposed to him is an unconvicted felon and a disgrace to the name of American.

That any considerable number of respectable Germans should vote for Hancock would be a disgrace to the German name.

The respectable Americans respect Mr. Degener as much as they are ashamed of Hancock.

Tidal Wave at Galveston.

Private advices, by telegraph, from Galveston state that a tidal wave swept up the bay on Tuesday afternoon submerging and disabling a number of vessels, inflicting a large amount of damage to property, and causing general consternation in the city. No details have as yet been received.

Why Hancock should go to Congress.

From his record and speeches we give the following reasons which should be convincing to him:

- Because I am a successful scoundrel.
- Because I cursed the Dutch and the Niggers.
- Because I didn't invade Texas.
- Because I did speculate in cotton.
- Because Throckmorton swore I was a liar.
- Because I am an old know-nothing and a practical incoherence.
- Because I want to see Austin go ahead at the expense of San Antonio.
- Because I am too pure to be tricky (oh, yes).

Remember, Mr. voter, when you go to the polls, if you have any kink in your head about the taxes being very high that they are less in Bexar County this year than last. That the school tax is collected in installments, one-fourth every three months, and if the first installment is sufficient no more will be collected; and think a minute if you are not being fooled by a rascally set of politicians who have sprung this question to lead you into difficulty.

THE ELECTION.—What a flood of glorious recollections these two words bring to our memory!—Herald.

Such recollections as free whiskey and hundreds of unlawful Mexican voters, voting two and three times a piece, to the detriment of the Germans. You may well sigh; those things left with the lost cause, and haven't gone back yet.

Let every voter remember that his vote for Degener decides if he favors President Grant's administration, and the national policy of the Republican party, and his vote for Hancock places him in opposition to the Republican party of the nation and in favor of the "lost-cause."

Let every law-abiding good citizen remember that a vote for John Hancock is a vote not only against the Republican national administration but against our State administration that has met the endorsement of the national administration in its efforts to give Texas a good, safe, State government.

How do the people of Texas, who have some pride in our State, like the idea of sending Hancock to Congress as the anti-public school candidate; would it not disgrace us in the eyes of the nation?

Humbling Democratic Thoughts.

We have lost this election through our own fault, and until we can have more discreet leaders in Texas, we may expect a repetition of these defeats.

The Hancock meeting in front of the Monks Hotel, his intemperate language, and the subsequent howling down of the republican speakers, when the crowd refused to hear them, was bad enough, but the last affair has ruined us; it has lost us the German vote, which we might have gained, if the boys could only have been persuaded to keep still.

At the Throckmorton meeting there were about three hundred niggers, and at least one half of the crowd were republicans, and although Shelly told the niggers that they stunk, and he cursed the Governor and call the radicals thieves and rascals, and lied about the taxes, yet he was not interrupted a single time. Now it made a bad impression on the Germans; they would like to see fair play, and that the democrats behaved like they did, was disgusting to them. The Germans that intended to vote for Hancock, wanted Newcomb to speak, that they might hear him, and the conduct of the boys in going on that way, convinced them, that we were afraid to have the question argued, and then the howling reminded them too much of 1861. They are disgusted and will vote for Degener, and to tell the truth, I am afraid it has disgusted even some of our reliable democrats.

There was no sense in reminding Alex. Sweet of his having been in Duff's regiment, because it is well known that he was in Germany during the best part of the war, and never was an ardent democrat. That was the first fool act.

The next was Gen. Young playing school-teacher over Newcomb. I am at a loss to explain the conduct of Young, he has never behaved that way before, and I conclude, that in order to be equal to his arduous duties at the Fair, he must have ever-stimulated himself. It was a wonder that he was not clapped in jail for the balance of the night. The proper and smart way would have been, to have made a great show of fairness by endeavoring to suppress the howling.

He couldn't have succeeded, but then he might have shown, that the respectable democrats were opposed to rowdiness, war. This would have had a good effect, particularly on the Germans, and might have saved us their vote. But as I said before, we have such leaders, that we must expect defeat.

My theory has always been, to treat your opponent with the most execrating politeness, unless your intent to make a fuss big enough to break up the meeting. These half way measures never succeed, and last night was a proof of it.

What was the consequence? Young got a warning that was pitiful to witness, the Germans were disgusted, and the boys discouraged.

I find, that the animosity among the real old fashioned sort of rebels against Newcomb is tremendous, and knowing that he was an old Texan and never given them any particular reason to hate him, I determined to find out the cause of it; so I enquired of a fellow, who was yelling for Hancock, the reason he hated Newcomb. He said, I don't hate him so much for what he has done, as for what he might do in the future. We are going to have another fight here in Texas, and if he has anything to say about it and if we are whipped, he would as leave hang us as not. That's what's the matter.

It was bad policy too, to hallow and yell at Houston, because he was a Union soldier, for that has a bad, mighty bad, effect on the Germans. They know, that it was the republican soldiers, that humbled the pride of southern chivalry, that had always treated the Germans as inferiors and they can't bear to see them insulted publicly by the men that long their sons and banished over them during the Confederacy.

I am a new departure man, I believe in playing loyal in a painful degree, until we can bamboozle the Germans and get our heels on them and the radicals, white and black, at the same time; but this can never be done as long as such men as Gen. Young get excited and the boys howl and curse in that way.

It was not Gen. Young's speaking to Newcomb in the middle of his speech, that was so bad, as it was that the crowd that had been howling for some time, only wanted a leader to make a disturbance.

In Seguin we have blundered worse than anywhere else. It should be the policy of the democratic speakers to treat Mr. Degener with great courtesy, particularly as he is a respectable man and they are not; but in Seguin they actually went about town, ringing a hand bell and selling Degener out at auction. Now this is too rough saw, and the Germans there are discouraged and will not vote for Hancock now under any circumstances. A prominent man there told me, that the Germans that voted for Hancock, was a hands-off; I don't know what that is; I expect it is the German for Democrat.

One thing is certain, and that is that the whole country will go republican, until the democrats learn to stop drinking whiskey and yelling at republican speakers.

MEMORS soap, the Herald to the contrary notwithstanding, is the best in San Antonio. It came out second best at the Houston Fair, it was first last year and there was tremendous competition.

It hasn't got, far enough in it to suit the Herald but no soap in the world can wash the stains out of that dirty sheet. If soap could do it Mangers would be able to. But it is too foul, too foul.
