CONVENTION BETWEEN THE GENERAL POST OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND THE GENERAL POST OFFICE OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

There shall be a regular exchange of money orders between the two countries. The maximum of each order is fixed at ten pounds sterling when issued in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and when issued in the United States as fully dollars in the national paper currency of the latter country.

Each country shall keep the commission charged on all money orders issued within it, but shall pay to the other country one per cent. on the total amount of such orders. No money order shall include a fractional part of a penny or of a cent.

The service of the postal money-order system between the two countries shall be performed exclusively by the agency of offices of exchange. On the part of the United States, the office of exchange shall be New York, and on the part of the United Kingdom, London.

The Howler's Convention.

The great bomb-shell that the Democracy boasted they had thrown into the Republican camp, has exploded in a very hair-raising manner. In the language of Josh Billings "it bust quietly".

When we come to examine into the records of the men that instituted and inspired the Convention, it is not to be wondered, that it was a failure.

What success can attend any movement, which is supported by Jack Hamilton, Morgan Hamilton, Pease, Tyson, Throckmorton, Green, Shelly, Ireland; the most of them belonging to the uncontracted rebel class?

There was not a man among them that could be said to belong to the republican party, and the republican party contains a majority of the people of Texas.

The Convention, so-called, started out with a lie, in as much as it claimed to represent the people of Texas, when in truth and in fact they represented only a dissatisfied minority, who would bid citizens under any or all forms of government.

The leaders proclaimed with a great affectation of fairness, that the movement was not a political one in any sense of the word, and they endeavored to cover by the real object of the meeting as much as possible; but the lesser lights spotted the whole thing by too much zeal for the party.

Ireland of Seguin was one of the principal managers. This was the identical Ireland that in the Convention of 1866 expressed the hope, that the time was not far distant, when he would again gird on his sword in defence of the Confederacy. In the tax law convention he imagined he saw the dawn of a brighter future for the Democracy and thus, indirectly, for the confederacy; and his speech showed the rebel teeth so plainly, that it alarmed the newly-dodged Democrat Pease; and the cautious Throckmorton felt dubious, well knowing the effect, such an exhibition would have upon the prospects of the Democracy.

The eyes of many of the delegates were opened by the speeches of the old rebel Democrats. And it reminded them too pointedly of the old night-mare of secession. Two delegates, one from Indiana and a German from Austin county left the convention disgusted and returned to their homes.

Throckmorton made a speech full of fatherly advice and abounding in vague patriotic utterances; but he was given to understand, that his gentle admonitions were not needed, and he preserved a respectful silence during the balance of the proceedings.

On the other hand Whiskey Jack made a speech, that delighted the unreconstructed; it was an old-fashioned democratic speech. What an illustration of the poverty of the Democracy, when they grab at the refuse of the republican party, and imagine, they have made a grand acquisition.

It is in "black and white" on the records of the District Court at Austin, that Jack Hamilton during his term as Provisional Governor appropriated \$10,000 of the school fund to his own use. This is by no means the only offence that is fastened upon him, but he is the man of all others, that the Democracy have picked up for their new leader. It was not, until his bad conscience and worse-whiskey had made a rebel of him, that the Democracy could find a fitting leader in him.

It would be tedious to go through the infamous records of each of these worthies, and we will not attempt it. It is enough, that the convention has been of more benefit to the republicans, that it was to the Democracy. It has opened the eyes of the people to the character of the democratic leaders, and that is all that is necessary to convince the people of the danger that must attend contemplating a party, that has such leaders.

AN AMERICAN TRAVELLING IN GERMANY

writes the following to the Illinois Staats Zeitung:
Not long ago I read in a newspaper, that an association had been organized for the purpose of excluding from the German language all foreign words, and in particular the use of the French words.
That is very good, and do you really suppose this means anything? Has any change taken place in this respect since the war? If you do, you are very much mistaken. The hotels have all got French names, as for instance "Hotel de Russie", "Hotel de St. Peterbourg", "Hotel de Belgique".

The porters at the hotels and the conductors on the cars address travellers, in French. The bill of fare is in French, and in no eating house have I ever found a German "bill of fare", but always a French Menu. The dishes and wines have all got French names; and the programs for concerts and theatres, at the watering places, are all got up in French; many families have also French nurses.

If you express surprise at this, you are told, that the French is excellent as a neutral language.

While in France the Germans are being insulted and maltreated, in Germany the people feel flattered, if they are allowed to speak to a Frenchman.

Even in Stuttgart, Munich, Berlin and Frankfurt, and other places, you find that the stores have French signs, although perhaps not two Frenchmen enter the door during the year.

A German-American is disgusted with such flattery. And let no one be deceived into believing, that the people are more moral or decent than they are with us. If you compare New York and Berlin, you will find, that the former stands much higher in the scale of morality, while the smaller cities will not bear comparison with ours. The American cities may be taken as models of morality, comparatively speaking.

As far as the bribing of sub-ordinates is concerned, the conductors on railroads take anything they can get. Last week an order was issued from the Department of Commerce, threatening with removal all railway officials that were found guilty of advancing the interests of one class of passengers at the expense of the rest.

Yesterday in Frankfurt I took the liberty of obtaining for a half guilder (about 20 cents) the whole railway coupe to myself, while other travellers were jammed together to the number of eight in a single carriage.

We have frequently referred to the notorious fact, that the old rebel leaders have not the power, even if they had the skill, to represent the rovism of the ignorant rank and file of the Democracy. Recent occurrences have made this fact almost self-evident.

If under a republican State government freedom of speech and action is rendered insecure, what would be the lot of Texas republicans, if a democratic president were at Washington, and a democratic State administration in Texas? The subject is not a pleasant one for republicans to think about, and yet if Texas republicans are derelict in their duty at the polls, we may have the question to deal with in a practical manner.

We ask the man of property and the man of peace, to read the telegrams in the light of the recent disgraceful occurrences in this city, and pause, before he folds his arms in fancied security, or perhaps is so blinded to his own interests as to vote for the rebel Democracy.

If we should ever be cured with a democratic State government in this State, the property owners and those who are afraid of the rebel rowdy, will curse the day they relaxed their vigilance and allowed the enemy to take the initiatory step to our backwards march to our ostensible condition.

The spirit of evil is ever active, and if we endeavor to fight the devil with pleasant smiles, or by putting on badly fitting dignity, instead of with fire, we will be making a laughing stock of ourselves to the vicious and depraved, who will grind us in the dust, in sober reality, as they did before.

It is useless for men of property to fold their arms and sneer at those, who are between them and the enemy, and it is very silly for such men to suppose, republican ascendancy in Texas will continue solely because they are republicans. It is votes, not dignity that is required just now.

Boston—The Anniversary of the Sisters of Notre Dame.

(From the Boston Journal, July 7, 1871.)
DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN PORTLAND ST.—An alarm from box 5, at twenty minutes past six o'clock last evening, summoned the Fire Department to Portland Street near Caseway. The roof of the brick school-house occupied by the sisters of Notre Dame, on Lancaster Street, sought from the flying embers, and the wood work around the windows was soon burning fiercely. The Hook and Ladder Company, which was early on the ground, took possession of the building and saved it from destruction. The stained glass windows in the rear of the chapel were totally destroyed, and also those of the school-room and upper story. The damage, estimated at about \$1,000, was fully covered by insurance in the Franklin office in this city.

Election Held at Groesbeck.

A gambler's Arrest and a Shot.
A COLORED MAN WOUND BY DEMOCRATS.
SIGN OF TERROR PREVAILING.
MARTIAL LAW NECESSARY.

Houston, Oct. 3rd.
The riot at Groesbeck commenced by an attempt of a colored man, named Cotton to arrest a gambler named Applethwaite for carrying concealed weapons.

The gambler resisted, and shot at the policeman, hitting him in the mouth. The policeman returned the fire, whereupon Applethwaite started to run and was fired upon by another policeman and killed. The white citizens immediately armed themselves, took possession of the town, threatening to exterminate the negroes and white republicans. Many of the latter left town or hid in safe places.

The mob killed an unoffending colored man, who was quietly sitting in his room. Many negroes would have been killed had they not hid themselves or left town. Sunday and Monday there was not a colored man to be seen in town, and they are afraid to go to their homes. I have talked with several refugees, white and black, and they all concur in saying a perfect reign of terror exists. Nothing but an application of martial law will suffice to restore order and bring the law breakers to justice. The policeman who shot Applethwaite took refuge in jail for safety.

The election is progressing quietly in Houston with good prospects for the Republicans.

Houston, Oct. 3rd.
Number of votes cast in Houston to-day one thousand five hundred and eighty. Fully 1300 are Republicans. The Democrats give up this county.

The storm in Galveston has resulted in immense loss of property. Crockett was destroyed by fire on Sunday night. Every house but one on the public square was destroyed. The fire originated in a stable.

Republicans are one thousand ahead in Grimes county on first day.

Third District will give from three to five thousand Republican majority.

I learn from passengers on Central road to-day, that the polls were not opened in Limestone county. Deperados have full control of the county and run loyal citizens out. Many refugees arriving in Houston.

The bloody tidings from Groesbeck, where the savage spirit of the rebel Democracy overflooded all bounds in wild deeds of riot and murder, reveals as in a mirror to all sensible Republicans, the condition of our State at large, if the ferocious and lawless passions of Ku-Kluxism and hatred towards Republicans should get the upper hand of the State government. Remember, ye who love peace, civilization and prosperity, that each vote cast for a Democratic candidate is a vote cast for the renewal of the murderous scenes of Groesbeck all over the State, and for a return of the indescribable horrors of Democratic dominion as illustrated in 1862-3-4. Are you ready for the question?—State Journal.

In addition to the telegraphic news concerning the riot at Groesbeck, the Governor has received information to the effect that the police in Groesbeck, being attacked by the rioters, barricaded themselves, and afterwards marched to Springfield, being about forty in number. They were pursued by the mob, several hundred strong, intent on wholesale murder, who also cut the wires and prevented all persons from leaving the town to call assistance to the beleaguered officers of the law. These latter have fortified themselves in the court-house at Springfield, where, at last advice, they were besieged by the mob. A young lady succeeded in escaping from Groesbeck and bringing dispatches to the Governor. Prompt measures have been taken in the disturbed districts to enforce the outraged law.—State Journal.
