**TELEGRAPHIC**  
THE VERY LATEST!

**The Burning City on Lake Michigan!!**  
The Greater portion of Chicago in ashes and the fire still raging.

**Interesting Particulars!!**  
KNOXWOOD, 10 miles from Chicago,  
October 9, 11 o'clock.  
Half the city is destroyed. The flames  
continue. Gas works, court house, and all  
heavy business houses destroyed.  
150,000 persons are homeless. Fabulous  
prices are paid for vehicles to carry valu-  
ables from danger.  
Loss of life is unknown; but the streets  
are filled with people looking for the lost.  
Chicago, Madison, Market, Clinton, Jef-  
ferson, Buffalo and Grand streets are  
ruined.

Both sides of the Chicago river is a mass  
of ruins.  
20 or 40 vessels are burning now and  
many have been destroyed.  
Every man in the city is called for duty.  
Nearly every bridge over the Chicago  
river burned. All is terror.  
Chicago, Oct. 9, 5 P. M.  
The entire business part of the city  
north of twelfth street, on both sides of  
the river and its branches, is destroyed.  
Every printing office, hotel and railroad  
depot are burned.  
The whole of the north side reported  
destroyed. A large district still burning  
on the west side north of Twelfth street.  
The fire has been stopped at Harrison st.  
From there to Division St. and from the  
river to the lake, an area of four miles  
long and one wide, all swept off.  
Wind-blowing a gale from the South-  
west and a charge to the north which is  
almost sure to sweep the entire residence  
district, south of Fifth street.  
It is asserted that the water works are  
still all right, but water has been shut off  
to the south, to supply the demands on the  
north.

Thousands are leaving the city by every  
available means.  
Great hunger and suffering inevitable.  
Every city and town offers assistance.  
Buffalo subscribes \$100,000; Cincinnati  
\$200,000; Saint Louis \$50,000, in reply to in-  
quiries the mayor asked for cooked food  
for the suffering.  
The firemen from other cities are on  
route to Chicago.  
Great credit is given the telegraph su-  
perintendent for what he has done in get-  
ting communications from the doomed city.

**CINCINNATI, Oct. 9.**  
Business is partially suspended owing to  
the Chicago fire excitement.  
**WASHINGTON, Oct. 9, P.**  
At the very latest the conflagration is  
progressing. Assistance is going from all  
directions.  
Railroads carry provisions on fast trains  
free.  
It is impossible now to give any correct  
statement of the loss, and but a faint idea  
can be formed. When it is stated that  
every bank in the city except two, that  
are on 23d street, south division, and one  
on Randolph street, west division, are  
destroyed, an idea of the truth may be ob-  
tained.  
All the wholesale stores, all retail estab-  
lishments, post office, court-house, cham-  
ber of Commerce, and every hotel in the  
south division, except Michigan avenue  
hotel, which is standing on the extreme  
southern limits, are in ashes.  
Every newspaper office, Tribune building  
which was supposed to be fire proof, is  
nearly submerged.  
Every theatre, six of the largest eleva-  
tors, the immense depots of the Michigan  
Southern and Illinois Central Railroad,  
both the passenger and freight depots of  
the latter, more than a score of churches  
and most of the shipping in the river, all  
destroyed.  
Men who were millionaires yesterday  
morning are nearly penniless to-day.  
But more terrible than all is the certainty  
that many have perished in the flames,  
how many none can tell.  
Perhaps no one ever will be able to tell,  
but it is certain, several persons perished  
and these are heart sickening facts that  
victims will be counted by scores.  
Hundreds of horses and cows have been  
burned in stables and on the north side,  
numbers of animals, though released from  
confinement, were so bewildered and con-  
fused by the sea of fire which surrounded  
them, that they rushed wildly to and fro,  
entering cries of fright and pain, until  
scorched and killed.  
Any attempt at description of the scene  
of this appalling calamity, would be idle.  
The simple fact is, that our great city of  
Chicago is destroyed and that hundreds of  
millions of capital here have vanished and  
nearly one third of Chicago's inhabitants  
are homeless.  
Any attempt to embellish would be mock-  
ery.

**LATER.**—It is now believed, the spread  
of the fire southward has been stayed at  
Harrison street, but on the north side  
there is no discussion of its fury.  
The entire division of the city is evi-  
dently doomed to destruction.  
There are grave fears that the flames  
may spread to the west side of the north  
branch of the river, and the inhabitants of  
streets nearest the river are already mov-  
ing to places of supposed greater safety.

TERRIBLE CONFLAGRATION!

The City of Chicago is a Scene!

TEN THOUSAND HOUSES BURNED AND ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND PEOPLE HOMELESS!!!

A terrible calamity has just befallen that prosperous and enterprising city, Chicago, the great gem of America.

The area burnt over, is several miles in extent, and ten thousand houses have been utterly destroyed.

A hundred and fifty thousand people are homeless, and in that latitude, at this early approach of winter, great suffering will be inaugurated.

Many who were but a few days ago comfortable, rich, and happy, are now penniless. But the great hearts of the American people are already opening, and large money contributions are being forwarded from all quarters to the sufferers.

The loss is estimated at fifty million dollars; but it must be much greater, as most of the finest business houses, as well as all the banks, insurance offices, hotels, railroad depots, newspaper offices, churches, and the fine Court House, are all destroyed.

Even fire-proof buildings did not escape; the fury of the gale being such as to communicate the fire to the combustible material, as merchandise, with which they were filled.

All the large cities within reach have sent their firemen and apparatus to the doomed city.

Surely this is a season of disaster to man; the number of railroad and steamboat accidents, which have occurred during the past few months, and the loss of life resulting, is almost unprecedented; scarcely an exchange has reached us lately, that did not contain the details of some terrible tragedy, involving a loss of human life.

With commendable promptness President Grant has ordered the Subsistence Department of the army to issue rations to the needy and destitute.

**The Olmos And Alazan Ditch.**  
To Col. Withers and others, of the Ditch Committee.

On Saturday evening last, in company with Mr. C. Hartnett, our city Surveyor, I have had the pleasure of seeing the stakes that marked the level of the water of this ditch, drove down on the hill side upon the right of the road, turning the bluff to the San Pedro Springs. This is the point around which it was thought by many impossible to take the water, but now the problem is solved, and strange to say that, even at this place, the level is so accurate it does not require as a lot of cutting. On the whole it is a grand success - worth thousands of dollars to the owners of property along the entire length, and thousands to the city of San Antonio. The lands lying between the rock quarries and the San Pedro Springs, will become valuable and heretofore were almost a barren waste, and the additional value to the property west of the San Pedro, can't well be estimated. Our City Surveyor, to accomplish this great work has spared neither time nor labor, and is only too proud to state that, to his entire satisfaction, it is a complete success, and the remaining portion of this ditch is *deus facit* and easily accomplished.

**In** speaking of water works and fountains for this city, just think of the comparative cost of like works in other cities, when the water of this ditch is at the San Pedro Springs *forty feet above the city.*

**I** have seen myself through the kindness of Mr. Hartnett, where the level marked the third window on the Presbyterian Church, supposed to be about forty feet from the ground.

**In** conclusion I will here remark that having named this ditch - "The Olmos and Alazan," I do so for these reasons - The water that will feed this ditch is to be taken from two large lagoons on the west side of the San Antonio river, which will be supplied from the waters of the Olmos and its tributaries. Taking none of the San Antonio river water proper, and that the lands to be irrigated are lying chiefly on the Alazan Creek into which this ditch will empty itself, I thought it would be very appropriate to name it "The Olmos and Alazan ditch." As one of the Committee appointed to confer with the Mayor and City Council in regard to this ditch I submit to that honorable body the name above suggested, for approval or rejection.
