House Bill No. 747.

This bill, entitled "An act to authorize the issuance of State bonds for the redemption of State warrants," is made the special order for tomorrow.

It authorizes the Governor to have prepared a million of dollars in ten per cent. State bonds, interest payable semi-annually.

These bonds are to be deposited with the State Treasurer and paid out at par to the holders of State warrants.

We hope the bill will not pass without an amendment authorizing the Governor to sell these bonds in the market, and apply the proceeds to the liquidation of the outstanding warrants of the State. What the creditors of the State want and need, for the most part, is not bonds, but money with which to meet the debts and claims they have themselves incurred. To offer a man who holds warrants for services rendered, a bond, is to give him something which he must immediately throw upon the market, at whatever discount, and sell to meet his own indebtedness. The loss he thus incurs is a virtual repudiation by the State to that amount.

The credit of the State of Texas, so soon as her previous audited indebtedness is provided for, will be good and her ten per cent. bonds should be at par, or nearly so. But the holder of warrants is entitled to his money, and his money he should have. Whatever loss is necessary in the sale or negotiation of the bonds of the State should be borne by the State and not by the creditors.

Let the House bill 747 be amended or substituted by another, embodying the principle of the prompt redemption of Treasury warrants by money obtained by the sale of bonds, or raised in any legitimate manner upon the credit of the State, and at the slightest approach to repudiation solemnly watched and resisted as unparliamentary, deplorable, and in fact fatal.—State Journal.

Proceedings of the City Council. Regular meeting. SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 10, 1871.

Present, his honor, Mayor Thielepepe. Councilmen—Messrs. Duerler, Moore, Pentzrieder, Callaghan, Elmendorf, and Groos.

Minutes of meeting of Sept. 29, read and approved.

The mayor reported concerning the petition of Mrs. Greenbeck that the record of the original deed had been found in the County records.

Petition of A. Tampe, for the repairing of a portion of Pasco street, was referred to the committee of Councilmen of Ward three.

Petition of a number of citizens, for the repairing of South street, was referred to the committee of Councilmen of Ward 4.

Petition of several Livery Stable keepers to be allowed to run public hacks during Fair time, without having to pay for license, was read, but no action taken upon it.

Proposition of O. M. Terrell, for the settlement of a claim on certain lots bought by Enoch Jones, of the city, was read and laid over.

Communication of A. W. Kempton, tendering a resignation as City Marshal and claiming that the city owes him a salary, was read, and on motion laid upon the table.

Report of the Finance Committee, on reports of City Collector and Treasurer for the month of September, and on bills of A. Siemerling & Co. and Leroux & Cugrove, was read and adopted.

On motion the mayor was authorized to have that portion of Prossido street, lying near the Court house, repaired. Council then adjourned.

Called Meeting. SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 11, 1871.

Present, his honor, Mayor Thielepepe. Councilmen—Messrs. Groos, Elmendorf, Pentzrieder, Callaghan, Norton and Duerler.

The object of the call was explained by the mayor, which was to appoint a commission to set a day for the election, during the mayor's proposed absence. On motion Councilman Groos was chosen to act in that capacity. Council then adjourned.

Texas Items.

The Falls county Mercury says the peach mast in Falls county this year is almost without precedent. The trees are literally loaded down with fruit. The oak mast is also very fine. The Mercury says: "We learn from our planting friends that the corn crop is turning out much better than anticipated."

The Bolivar Guard, of Sept. 25, says: "Judge East has arrived in Austin from Omaha, Nebraska. 'We may now look for something to be done for the Indianola, San Antonio and El Paso Railroad.'"

The Nacozes Valley, of September 23d, says a train of eighteen carts left Corpus Christi for the interior, loaded with goods valued at from \$20,000 to \$40,000.

The same paper says: "On Sunday evening, while a Mexican was filling a lamp with kerosene, in the gas plant along side of the building, the lamp exploded, setting fire to the building. The fire was fortunately extinguished before it did much damage."

Are the Offices of the Federal Government to continue Asylums for ex-rebels and Democrats?

When, within the past two months, the entire loyal, and administration press of the north was crying out against the shame and injustice of appointing to, and retaining in office, in the various departments at Washington, ex-rebels and rebel sympathizers, to the exclusion of ex-Union soldiers and sailors and loyal supporters of the Government during its life-struggle with treason and rebellion, we felt instinctively impelled to lend our voice to their laudible protests, as well as to direct attention to similar abuses nearer home.

But because we wished to avoid hasty conclusions, which might cost unmerited censure upon deserving and well meaning officers, and bearing "malice toward none and charity to all," we have hesitated, and suspended our remarks, until the occasion and evidence should "bear no lie, nor keep, to hang a doubt on."

That time has come. The occasion to speak is here, and it becomes our duty to do so.

This being the Headquarters of one of the most extensive military departments of the Government, the number of its employees is considerable, many of whom are voters in this district.

During four days of last week an election was being held for members of Congress, to represent this district in the councils of the Nation at the Federal Capitol; and of the two candidates for the honor of this position Mr. Degen, espoused and advocated the same and principles of the administration of President Grant, and the Union element of the country; and the other, Mr. Hancock, opposed the policy and measures of the Administration, and championed the cause and principles of the party and men who fought four years to destroy the Union and Government, of which President Grant is,—through the valor and sacrifice of its loyal sons,—the acknowledged head and protector.

As it so happened that a majority of these same employees,—retained in office, and receiving liberal compensations, by the military branch of the Government of which General Grant is the administrator—cast their votes in favor of Mr. Hancock, the enemy and defamer of General Grant's administration, and against Mr. Degen, his friend and advocate, it naturally elicited the playful inquiry: "Why is it thus, that these servants of the government strikes at the hand that feeds them?"

We were not long in "casting about" for an answer; the problem was soon solved. They themselves were, for the most part, of the number of the very men, who six years ago had their treacherous hands fastened upon the throat of the very government, that to-day affords them a beautiful subsistence.

We have not the space to enter into the details of this case, to the extent it deserves neither are we prepared or disposed to fix the responsibility of this unjust and unequal state of things. But we come to the human facts, which establish upon unquestionable authority, that there are in the employ of the Government—in its military departments at this post,—not less than fifteen persons, who served as officers, soldiers and "assistants" in the Confederate army. Some of these occupy prominent and lucrative clerkships, while others are engaged in the mechanical and other branches of the Quartermasters Department.

It may be questioned, but never was it more appropriate to inquire "can such things be, and overcome us like a summer's cloud, without our special wonder?" Yet so it is. While there are thousands of Union veterans, equally capable, and of a higher standard of intelligence, actually suffering for the necessities of life; who would joyfully accept these positions, and be of assistance in maintaining the principles, interests and men of the Republic; these men, who voluntarily engaged in Rebellion and treason against the government, and fought for years to destroy it, who have ever been, and ever will remain, Democrats of the "chicoric" so-called stripe, sympathizing with nothing of a republican nature or order, but ever leaning towards rebellion, lending their aid, and giving their suffrages to its friends and advocates, receive the fostering care and benevolent patronage, which belongs

alone to the patriots as an appendage to the services, trials and privation endured through years of sacrifices, and deserved from hard fought fields.

We are met of the number who insist in perpetuating the distinctions engendered by the war, and forever attesting the men who, from a false judgment or perverted education, committed the fatal error or treason; but we are decidedly averse to, and most emphatically protest against such men becoming the favored pensioners of the Government, and thus being rewarded and glorified for their treason, whilst so many of the patient, and eyed heroes of the Union, languish in want and neglect.

As we stated, we do not know who is to blame in this matter. It may be that the reticence of this Department from the more loyal Districts or States, rendered it difficult, at first, to procure competent and eligible persons to perform the necessary duties of the various offices; but this excuse will not answer for the present or future. Plenty of loyal, capable and efficient men can be had, here in San Antonio, willing to make the sacrifice of accepting and performing clerical and other Government duties at \$150 a month, or less; and if not attainable here, they will gladly come from the North, at their own expense, to accept such positions. And when we have men of this order in the employ of the Government, we may reasonably expect to be saved the humiliation of seeing an administration employ march to the polls and deposit his vote against the party from whom they derive a livelihood, amid the exultations of the enemies of the Government and its institutions.

We don't suppose that General Reynolds is cognizant of the facts we have recited. It is scarcely a presumable case, as he is, no doubt, unacquainted with the individuals referred to, not to mention their records. But let us assure him that we know whereof we write, and can establish the facts to his fullest satisfaction. His unquestionable record as a steadfast friend and supporter of General Grant's administration and policy, relieves us of the disagreeable duty of offering even a suggestion in the premises.

The Chicago Calamity.
Although we have received but brief accounts as yet, of this unprecedented disaster to our sister city and its afflicted citizens; enough of the distressing details is known to indicate the existence of terrible suffering there, and that the combined assistance of the Nation is needed to alleviate the forlorn condition of the people of this doomed city. No people on the face of the earth have such tender hearts and liberal hands for the unfortunate, as the Americans. For this reason we consider a lengthy appeal, in the present instance, superfluous. But we think proper to suggest to our leading merchants and business men, the propriety, indeed, duty of immediately calling a meeting for the purpose of expressing our sympathy, and raising a subscription in aid of the sufferers of this unhappy and desolated metropolis.

Who will be the first to adopt our humane suggestion?

Contrast.
During the recent campaign the democratic press has exhausted the vocabulary of lying, denunciation, and low slang slang in endeavoring to make it appear, that the democratic agents of Texas were being treated as they deserved by Governor Davis. In this attempt, to blacken the name of Governor Davis, they have not succeeded; neither have they succeeded in removing the Rotary Day reputation, that envelopes the name of John Hancock. Some republicans seem to have no objection to being represented in Washington by a democrat so eminently worthy of his party; and it may be inferred, that they again desire to serve as democratic door-mats; but as there are others, who do not think the whole duty of an American citizen is fulfilled in acting as an ornamental party figure head, we will make a comparison, or rather draw a contrast between the two parties in the vital particular of elections.

It has been the unceasing theme of democratic scribblers, that the democratic party would not be permitted to exercise the right of suffrage at the recent election, and this lying prediction has been the text, on which hundreds of hired itinerant shysters have preached disloyalty and lawlessness to the long haired, short brained cross-road chivalry.

Now this republican Governor of Texas has done for the State of Texas, what the Democracy has never even been willing to do for the State of New York; he has given us a fair and peaceable election, void of fraud or intimidation, so far as republicans are responsible.

We will not outstate the late election in Texas with the force that is annually enacted in New York, where regiments of "repeaters" boldly, shamelessly, and undisguisedly march all day long from one poll to another and vote at each, but we will confine ourselves to this city.

Let us recall for a moment the election of Mayor Lyons, which was conducted on the most approved democratic style, and recall the disgraceful shame, that was enacted, the herding of hundreds of the lower order of Mexicans from one poll to another, and thus defeating the will of the honest tax paying people of the country, and then compare that management with the late election in this city.

Should the democratic party come into power in this State, we will have had our last election; we will have old fashioned democratic election forces, but we will have no more elections.

Let us draw another contrast; New York is a model democratic city, so much so, that its municipal affairs are at a standstill, clogged by the accumulated corruption of the officials.

A peaceful body of American citizens endeavored to exercise their undoubted rights as such to parade the streets; their lives were endangered by a vile rabble of democratic vagabonds.

The Mayor of New York and the other Tammany thieves refused to protect these American citizens, and it was not until the Republican Governor of New Jersey had issued his proclamation on the same emergency, that Gov. Hoffman offered to protect the Americans against the twin city-raised brother of the humber chivalry, the New York ruff.

In Limestone county the constitutional and natural rights of American citizens have been infringed on by the partially civilized natives of that section; but there is no official prostitution with Gov. Davis. Martial law has been proclaimed, and American citizens will be protected in their rights by the Republican party, even if it should be necessary, (as it was in New York) to shoot a requisite number of these enemies of all law, decency and order. LET THE LAW BE ENFORCED.

Light Reading for Dignified Republicans.

Jersey City rises from the twentieth to the importance of the seventeenth.

Detroit recedes from the seventeenth to the eighteenth.

Milwaukee from the eighteenth to the nineteenth.

Albany, which was, ten years ago, the thirteenth, now takes the old place of Jersey City, the twentieth.
