The man attempted to draw a wampon, and did draw it, fireing at the policeman and severely wounded him in the left arm. The policeman drew his pistol on the first demandation and fired, hitting Applewhite in the atomach; several policementers interfered, and Applewhite was dispatched by several shots. This fact was made the occasion of a general uprising of the people, white and black, and to-day the county is the acone of insubordination and rebellion. Our officers are impatient to execute the laws. No Republican dare express bimself, and very few to show their heads. The mayor of Grossbock is pressed into the service of the mob and made to obey their arders. Every colored from Grossbock. STATEMENT OF JOHN T. DUNBAR.

On Saturday, the 30th of September, I was sitting on the platform in front of the Donnell House in Groesbeek. A man came along and said there was a man killed up town. I, with several others, started up the street. When I reached the place where Mr. Zadek keeps a grocery, I met a large crowd of men running and shouting: "Arm and shoot the dammed police!" I stepped on the side next to the house so as to let the crowd pass. After the crowd passed, which took them perhaps a minute, I looked up the street and sawa man named Dan Galagher come out of the bank or bookstore with a gun in his band. I left them to return to the Dounell House, and when I reached the next corner, on the same street that Zadek's store stands on, I saw two tien standing in a butcher's shop, one armed with a six-shooter, and the other armed with a double barreled shotgun; do not know their names; both seemed excited—the one with the six-shooter. gus; do not know their names; both seemed excited—the one with the six-shooter gesticulating and threatening to kill any one that came after him. About this time a large portion of the crowd that had passed me, returned, some shouting: "Shouthe damed police and their leaders!"
Sunday morning I left the Donnell Hou

and started up to the mayor. I there saw a large crowd in the front of his house The mayor was speaking, some of the crowd shouting. The mayor said something about keeping the peace. One man said: "Why have you not talked that way be-fore?" evidently intending to keep up the excitement. About this time a body of excitement. About this time a body of mounted men came in, some seventy five or more, armed with rifles and shot gans, yelling, and the crowd shouting in return. They coutinued on down the street and arrived in front of the Parker House. I left for the Dennell House and saw no more of them, it commencing to rain very hard at this time.
