amount of the direct tax, or nearly the
entire amount thereof, from balances found
due them on settlements of claims in the

this manner \$1,459,413, and has a balance
of suspended claims amounting to \$318,

W. OLIVER, of the judicial district in which the counties are embraced, who was sent by the Governor to the scene of the late insurrection to ascertain the true condition of affairs.

STATEMENT OF W. B. BONNER AND OTHERS. Springfield, Texas, Oct. 1, 1871. To His Excellency E. J. DAVIS, Governor of the State of Texas.

Our county is now in a state of riot and insubordination, demanding your immediate attention. Last evening, one of our special policemen attempted to arrest a man named Applewhite, in Groesbeck, for carrying concealed weapons.

It will be impossible to hold an election unless assistance reaches us speedily. We will in all probability refuse to open the polls unless we are forced to do so to preserve our lives.

ty, or make it tolerable for us to live here, but martial law of the severest type. In the name of God, Governor, help us, or we will be unable to maintain our positions as Republicans and our lives may pay the forfeit of our faith.

STATEMENT OF JOHN T. DUNBAR.

On Saturday, the 30th of September, I was sitting on the platform in front of the Donnell House in Groesbeck. A man came along and said there was a man killed up town. I, with several others, started up the street. When I reached the place where Mr. Zadek keeps a grocery, I met a large crowd of men running and shouting "Arm and shoot the damned police!"

Sunday morning I left the Donnell House and started up to the mayor. I there saw a large crowd in the front of his house. The mayor was speaking, some of the crowd shouting. The mayor said something about keeping the peace. One man said: "Why have you not taken that wretch before?"

(Signed.) JOHN T. DUNBAR.

Mr. A. ZADEK, Mayor of Groesbeck, after detailing the circumstance of the shooting of Applewhite, says:

"Lawlessness and mobocracy prevailed. Parties armed with double-barreled shot-guns then came to the city in great numbers. Guns were fired in every portion of the city. I then took my wife and babe to a safe retreat, and returned to the city again. I was then attacked by an infuriated crowd in my own private room. A shooting was then demanded, and I was forced by intimidation to issue a warrant of arrest of the policemen, and in order to preserve and keep the peace I did so."

(Signed.) A. ZADEK.

STATEMENT OF JAMES F. HUSTON. Mr. HUSTON, who is the Treasurer of Limestone County, after the preliminary details, states:

"Soon afterwards, some two or three or four companies or squads of excited, and armed men followed Capt. Richardson's company to Springfield—some from all parts of the county, I should say some two or three hundred in all—all demanding the arrest, at all hazards, of all who were accused of having anything to do in the killing of Applewhite; and all appeared to unite in this, that they would have no more police; and it was frequently expressed, that 'the negro must be wiped out.' Several propositions were made to 'charge the court house and take the prisoners.' I am told, and heard as much, that a 'fight with the negroes was desired by many, and expected by nearly all. During the time that the men were collecting, war came to my house, where the county officers board. The crowd treated every man who was known to keep Republican sentiments with derision and contempt. I saw three white men charge on some two or three negroes present, and cock their guns, but were called back by some parties who appeared to be in command. I cannot name all the men who called on M. Bonner on Sunday morning. The following are the names of all I recollect at the time: Capt. W. Richardson, W. E. Brown, H. M. Roberts, Capt. J. W. Stevens, J. L. Farrer, Dr. M. Kemp, J. E. Johnson and some others. All that I saw, heard and knew, convinces me that the men that were under arms on Sunday, or most of them, were acting under regular leaders, and all seemed to act in concert, like organized men; and it is generally believed that they were all organized in companies, etc."

Thus the evidence goes on, making twenty-three solid pages in all. All the statements corroborate each other, and while the Democratic papers are attacking the Governor for doing precisely what was his duty under the law, it is well that the people should know the true facts, which called forth his action.

The entire board of election officers, with the Sheriff and Registrars, unite in stating, that no less than three or four hundred men, drunk and wild with excitement, were under arms, forcing the officers of the law to shut themselves up in their houses, and Republicans to flee for safety.

Judge OLIVER, who is known by all men to be of the highest standing, declares his conclusions to Governor DAVIS in the following emphatic communication:

SPRINGFIELD, TEX., Oct. 6, 1871. To His Excellency E. J. DAVIS, Governor of the State of Texas: Began Sir: I have been here, and have thoroughly, and to my entire satisfaction, investigated the conduct of the rioters of Limestone county, and to give you a detailed account of the outrages would keep me writing for a week. Suffice it to say that I know of nothing in the history of the government that so loudly calls and demands the most severe and summary punishment as the participants in this heinous work, hatred, murder, and the complete ruin of Republicans in the compound.

I can't do the subject justice, and I will say that nothing less than the trial and punishment of at least fifty to one hundred men by a determined court martial, backed by from two to three hundred brave and loyal men, will do any good; and unless this is done the whole matter will be a farce. The rioters can prove anything they want to, and it is no use to prosecute them in the courts; and even if I were to arrest and try them, I would be compelled to try with jurors equally guilty as the accused, and it would simply be a foolish undertaking.

Now, Governor, I am not excited at all. I mean precisely what I say. I enclose you some statements of gentlemen, and I will say to you that some of the parties making the statements tell me that they are afraid to tell the whole truth about this matter until they feel that this State is not to be handed over to the enemies of the government.

I am going to stay with these scoundrels, and I commence on to-morrow to arrest some twenty or thirty of the ringleaders; and I will do it, or somebody will get badly hurt. Many of the villains are defiant, but I intend to test their grit before 12 M. to-morrow. Some of the villains are not getting very sorry, since I have created in their minds the certainty of the remedy to be applied to them. They say the good people want peace, and all that; but they always fail to say anything that would protect anybody but themselves. They see it is going to cost something, and they are sorry indeed.

Republicans must be protected, and an example made of this county. There are a few good men, but they are afraid to offer resistance to the mob, which extends from one end of the county to the other.

Martial law, and a court composed of men of steel, and two hundred to three hundred troops—United States troops at least, if they can be had—is the only thing to conquer effectually these outlaws.

 On account of the temporary absence of
 the editor on Saturday, it happened, that
 two separate articles, one on the Ku-Klux,
 and the other on the recent election, were
 run into one through the inadvertence of
 the printer. The near hearing which
 these two subjects have to each other, was
 probably the cause of the mistake.
 Our statement the other day, that the
 Isaac Franklin Institute case would be
 concluded by Saturday does not corre-
 spond with the facts in the case, as it
 is still being tried. One of the attorneys in-
 forms us that it will be turned over to the
 jury somewhere about the middle of the
 week. We are as unable to give the particu-
 lars, or to understand the real state of the
 case, as if we had been one of the jury.
 LAST SUNDAY night emphatically be-
 called "a dull rainy Sunday." A wet,
 northerly blow about 2 o'clock on Satur-
 day afternoon, while during the night rain
 fell in torrents and Sunday was a damp,
 chilly, rainy, disagreeable day, as well
 could be imagined. The streets and church-
 es were deserted and empty instead of

 crowds. The stillness of the northerly
 made small fires and liquid refreshments
 very desirable, which are about the only

 Court still continues not to do so.
 Now the county will make by it, as it
 would do away with the expense of chain-
 ing the prisoners, who are supposed to be
 innocent until the jury has decided other-
 wise.
 There is another nuisance in the imme-
 diate neighborhood of the court-house steps
 that appeals to the several senses, that
 really should be abated.
 DISTRESSING ACCIDENT CAUSED BY CAR-
 LESSNESS WITH FIREARMS.—The black
 smith shop of Henry Coleman, was the
 scene of a terrible calamity last Saturday
 afternoon, which goes to show how dan-
 gerous it is to trifle with firearms.
 ALBERT NOLTE, the deceased, a young
 German, was the son of respectable, well-
 to-do parents, living at present in New
 Braunfels, and his brother is employed in
 the telegraph office in this city.
 GIL SYDRA MORALES is the name of the
 young Mexican at whose hands Nolte came
 to his untimely end. Both were employes
 of Mr. Coleman, and bear excellent reputa-
 tions. They had returned from their din-
 ners to the shop and were about to resume
 their work.
 Henry Stumberg, another employe in
 the same establishment, was examining a
 shot gun, with which he intended going out
 gunning. MORALES took the gun and en-
 quiring if it was loaded, was told that it

was thought not, whereupon he playfully
 pointed it at one of the boys. It seems
 that they had pointed it to its not being
 loaded, and Stumberg blew into the bar-
 rel while Morales placed his finger on the
 trigger; as it after wards turned out one bar-
 rel was loaded, but this was overlooked in
 the carelessness of the moment.
 MORALES for the purpose of cleaning the
 gun, picked the tubes, placed powder in
 them, and asking for a cap, placed it on the
 nipple.
 NOLTE was at work on a wheel, with his
 head bent over his work. MORALES pointed
 the gun at NOLTE in a careless manner,
 WHO LOOKED UP AND LAUGHED.
 MORALES pulled the trigger and the gun
 went off, NOLTE clapped his hand on his
 breast and staggered, while MORALES drop-
 ped the gun and seized the unfortunate
 young man in his arms, who never spoke
 again. On account of the absence of
 Judge Kloke, at Austin, Justice Dwyer
 held an inquest on the body and rendered
 a verdict in accordance with the foregoing
 facts.
 There was no ill feeling between the par-
 ties, but it is certainly one of the clearest
 cases of culpable negligence we have
 heard of.
 TWO MEN FOUND DEAD ON THE FREDER-
 ICKSBURG ROAD FOUR MILES FROM TOWN.
 We are called upon to record one of the
 most singular occurrences that has ever
 taken place in this community.
 On Saturday afternoon, a party of four,
 two being in an empty haywagon and the
 other two on horseback, left this city by
 the Fredericksburg road. The names of
 two of this party whose bodies have since
 been found in the prairie near the Olmes,
 are Celestine Jacker, aged 52 years, and
 Florent Hostker, aged 18, both born in
 Alsace.
 The old man, Jacker, who is a hay cutter
 and lives on the Fredericksburg road six-
 teen miles from town, was very much in-
 toxicated. He was found by Mr. Fred. Masch
 in a dying condition, yesterday morning
 about 11 o'clock.
 He died in Mr. M's arms few minutes
 after he had been discovered. An Ameri-
 can who had his oxen penned at Mr. M's
 house gave the information. There were
 no marks of violence on the body and it is
 uncertain until the inquest has been held
 whether the old man died from the
 POISON CONTAINED IN THE SAN ANTONIO
 WHISKEY,
 or from exposure to the penetrating cold
 rain, on last Saturday night, to which he
 was exposed.
 The young man, Hostker, was found
 stark and stiff on Sunday morning, about
 one mile from the spot, where the old man
 was afterwards found.
 The cause of Hostker's death is more
 evident, as he had been subjected to ap-
 plectic fits, and the discoloration around
 his neck indicated that he had been at-
 tacked by one of them and had perished in
 the rain.
 It seems that they had become separated
 from or deserted by their companions, and
 had thus miserably perished in the prairie.
 What a subject for a temperance lecturer!
 An inquest was being held on Monday
 afternoon, at which we were present for a
 short time, but the lateness of the hour
 compelled us to leave before it was half
 through, in order to get this incomplete
 statement in to-day's paper.
