## TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

**FROM WASHINGTON.**  
WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—The Secretary of the Treasury directs that hereafter all disbursing officers or agents of the United States, except postoffice agents, drawing checks or money orders deposited to their credit with the treasurers of the United States or any assistant treasurers and United States depositaries, in favor of themselves or bearers or in favor of any person other than a public creditor, must state on the face or back of the check the object of purpose to which avails are to be applied. Pension agents drawing such checks must furnish a list of persons to whom payments are to be made, and the amount due to each.

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.**—The Western Union Telegraph Company is receiving all kinds of messages for Chicago and points west thereof as before the fire.

**FROM NEW YORK.**  
NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Washington Fire Insurance Company of this city has suspended.  
Petition of review from the proceedings in bankruptcy court in the matter of the Chattanooga Railway Company, was argued to-day before Judge Woodruff, who reserved his decision until to-morrow.

**FRANCE.**  
PARIS, Oct. 20.—The ratification of the treaties with Germany gives great satisfaction.

**CANADA.**  
TORONTO, Oct. 20.—Engineer in charge of division II of Canada Pacific Railroad survey, reports that two whites belonging to his staff and five Indians were burned to death by fire in the woods.

**FROM GLOUCESTER.**  
GLOUCESTER, Oct. 20.—A purse of \$1000 was given Capt. Knowlton, who rescued the schooner Horton from the Canadian port.

**MICHIGAN.**  
DETROIT, Oct. 20.—Reports of wrecks of lake craft continue. Much wreckage has been lost, but comparatively little life.

**DETROIT, Oct. 20.**—The missing portion of the steamer Colburn were saved. Twenty persons are still missing.  
The commander, Gilbert Dumont, and Indian agent Smith and wife are lost, with all men aboard.

**News by Mail.**  
From the description of the progress of the conflagration at Chicago, as witnessed by persons standing on the roof of the Argonaut House, it appears that the heat was so intense that it could not be endured by human beings at a distance of several blocks; brick walls weakened and wavered like india-rubber, and massive granite slabs cracked into thousands of pieces. Another account represents the surface of the river as boiling and giving off steam. No sooner would the flames touch one end of a building than they would burst forth at the other. The city, in a word, was enveloped in a sort of roverbatory furnace, like that employed to melt metallic ores. It is quite unphilosophical, in view of these facts, to attribute the failure of the supposed fire-proof methods of construction to any minor defects. Unbroken walls of stone or brick, with roof of the same material, would crumble away like sand under such a trial.

At the headquarters of Gen. Sheridan at Chicago the War Department losses have been comparatively small. The Indian Bureau reports no loss. The large quantities of supplies gathered annually at Chicago had all been sent forward for distribution. All offices disbursing public moneys are in great trouble from the destruction of vouchers for their payments, and action in Congress for their relief will be necessary. There are no records of the Land Office in Chicago, all pertaining to the State of Illinois being at Springfield. The losses in the Post-office Department are not believed to be very extensive.

The wife of a Missouri legislator recently sent him a poetical epistle, which winds up with the following pertinent inquiry: Husband, dear husband, don't write to me more.

All the winter she's slept in the bed room alone—

A telegram from London tells of an enthusiastic relief-meeting in that city, in which were in attendance over four hundred American and English gentlemen. Misses Schenck was chairman. Ten thousand pounds were subscribed for Chicago by those present, and a committee was appointed to solicit aid.

The progress of the Chicago fire southward was checked by the blowing up of buildings under the direction of General, Phil Sheridan. A considerable number of the pleasant residences on the South Side were thus saved. On the North Side the fire made a clean sweep.

The Rockport Trustees of the 14th, says that "the health of Rockport was never better. Indeed it is much better than might have been expected, considering the constant increase of inhabitants, and the many unacclimated persons as present in our city."

A telegram from Columbus, Ohio, says up the result of the State election: Senate 15 Republicans and 15 Democrats; House 59 Republicans and 45 Democrats; with one Independent Republican. Majority on joint ballot, 13. Gen. Noyes majority will be about 95,000.

"The same paper, also learns that "the tide was very high, during the late storm, at Aransas Pass. The water was entirely over the lower end of St. Joseph Island, excepting the sand hills, and the wharf at that place was washed away."

Daniel Saunders, a Detroit wood-cutter, was saved in two a few days ago. A wood pile fell and forced him against the saw, which was making 600 revolutions per minute.

We are pained to learn, from Headquarters, that Capt. Porter, A. Q. M., died at Fort Quitman on the 15th inst. He was a most excellent officer, well known, and very popular in this city, and an honor to the service.

Senator Flanagan.

Our distinguished United States Senator, Mr. FLANAGAN, whose arrival at Austin we mentioned the other day, in response to a grandee, spoke from the balcony of the Raymond House on Thursday last.

In reference to the taxes he stated "I am aware that they are heavy and burdensome, yet the great and good work justifies the outlay and consoles us for the sacrifices." No government can be conducted without expense, and just at this period Texas is entering on a new career, and to a people who have previously never paid any taxes at all, the amount now assessed seems burdensome.

We regret that we cannot give the Senator's remarks in full.

W. C. TOMLINSON, who lately published the Enterprise, a Democratic newspaper, at Groesbeck, has been, by the order of Judge Oliver, District Judge, held to bail in the sum of \$10,000 upon a charge of inciting the riot which recently occurred in Limestone county.

We are as jealous of the liberty of the press as any of our Democratic exchanges which are now trying to make capital for Tomlinson, but when a paper becomes licentious and incendiary we can afford it no sympathy, and trust that in this instance fair and even-handed justice will be meted out.

The New York Sun was gotten up by Dana, for the purpose of assailing Grant on account of his refusal to give the said Dana some appointment for which he was an eager suitor, and as a part of the programme the Sun maligns Gov. Davis' administration, but where "Brick" Pomerey has failed the classic Dana can hardly be successful.

The New York Herald says that Gov. Seymour attributes Tammany stealing to the demoralizing influences of the late war. The Westfield explosion, and the revival of tight-fitting pantaloons, are also due, no doubt, in his opinion, to the same baleful cause.

We have not noticed any returns of the election in Connecticut in our dispatches, but the State has gone Republican by an increased majority, without a doubt, otherwise the Democratic papers would be full of exultation.

The Dallas Herald has a flag flying with "States Rights." That's what is the matter with Hannah in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Iowa.

The proclamation of martial law in Limestone county is based upon testimony of W. R. Bonner, who was kicked out of a municipal office here last spring by the Houston board of aldermen, who found him guilty of nine different acts of theft.

The above falsehood has been going the rounds of the Democratic press about long enough without contradiction. We know all about Mr. Bonner's entanglements with the Houston board of aldermen, and know to a certainty that he was never charged by them, or anybody else, in Houston, with theft or any other crime.

One of the largest hotels in Philadelphia is owned and managed by a woman, and in one store, among several large ones owned by women, a business of over \$100,000 a year is done.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—A detachment of recruits has just been ordered from St. Louis to Department of Texas.

The woods in Campbell county, Kentucky, are burning fearfully. The town of Alexandria, thirteen miles from Newport is threatened with destruction.

ROME.—The Cardinals advise the Pope to quit Rome. The Pope determined to depart when the Italian Parliament adjourned.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Cotton heavy and declined nearly one cent in consequence of a decline at Liverpool; quotations nominal. Middling uplands 12 1/2. Gold 112 1/2.

Tammany meeting on Saturday night was interrupted by rioters; said to be in interest of ex-Sheriff O'Brien.—Police dispersed the mob.

PORT AU PRINCE, Oct. 23.—Fifteen Spanish men of war demanded the delivery of filibustering steamer Hornet. Haytian government refused, whereupon the Spanish Consul hauled down the Consular flag, and went aboard a man of war which sailed to Havana for instructions.

GALVESTON, Oct. 23.—Market demoralized; good ordinary 14 1/2, nominal. Gold 112.

Mitrailleuses on a new system, invented by General Gorloff, have been distributed for experimental practice to several infantry regiments in Poland. The pieces are drawn by three or four horses, the accompanying ammunition wagon requiring one horse less.
