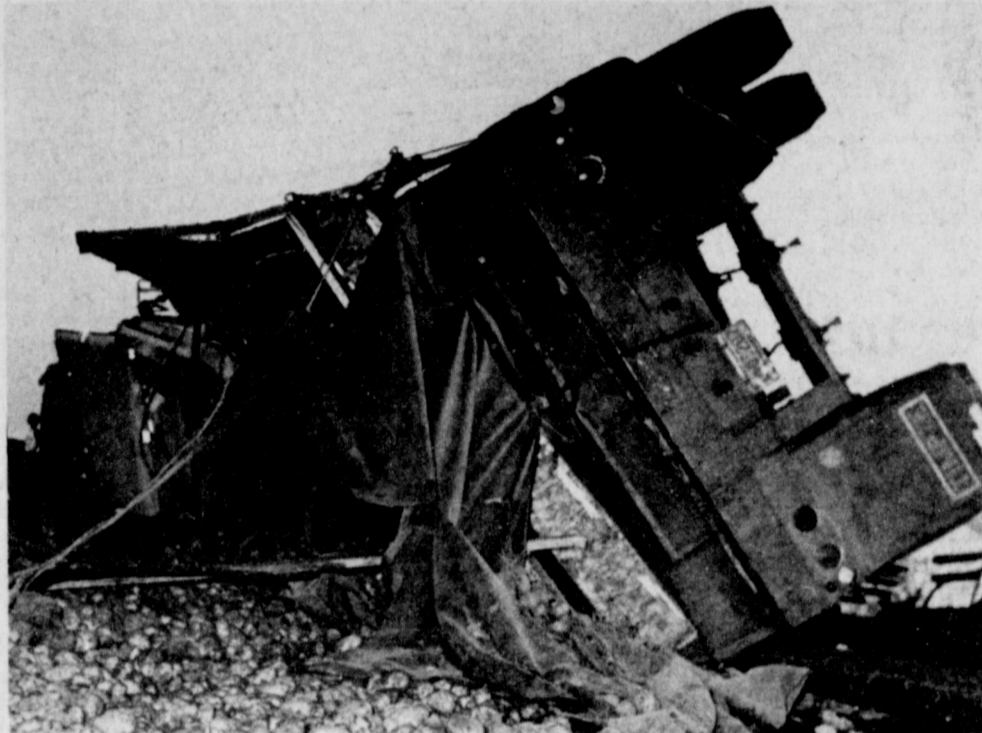

Mules-Lobo Clash May Tame Levelland

Friday night, the Muleshoe Mules will face a new task, this one of beating the Levelland Lobos. Going into the game the Mules are 3-0 for the year and Levelland is 2-1. However, Levelland is a AAA team, and a former regular district opponent for Muleshoe.

How does it look from here? Well, the Mules are 'up' for the game, but at the same time, they will be facing a tough opponent. Levelland is full aware of Muleshoe's strength this year and they should be attempting to key in on Dean Northcutt and Marcus Beversdorf.

Athletic Director Don Cumpston is relying on the attitude of the players for Muleshoe's unbeaten team to help carry the load this Friday. He cited the complete turnaround of the Mules and their attitudes of being optimistic and working hard to keep the number one position they are maintaining thus far in the season.

Coach Cumpston praised the Mules' efforts in the game against Tullia last Friday night. Even though Muleshoe got on the scoreboard first, and early in the game George Villarreal's field goal in the first, they trailed 3-7 behind the Tullia Hornets through most of the rest of the game.

Coming on strong in the fourth and to wind up on Jeep Shanks' 27-yard rambles to pay dirt in the fourth, the Mules played an outstanding defensive game. The Mules' 10 points were the first points scored on the Tullia team this year.

The coach explained the game, "We were trying to run off tackle and outside, because they were so much bigger than us. We wanted to stay away from their big people. We only had 33

running plays and 10 pass plays and got 108 yards rushing and 99 passing."

Offensive linemen came in for praise from the coach. He said leaders included center Doug Cowan, guards Gaylon Strahan, Robert Flores and Lee Elder.

Opinionnaire To Be Sent To Parents

Neal B. Dillman, superintendent, announces that the Muleshoe Schools are involved in a study phase of school evaluation as required by the Texas Education Agency. A part of the study is to obtain opinions from parents, students, and teachers regarding strengths and weaknesses of the school.

On September 26, 1977, a Parent Opinion Inventory will be mailed to 100 randomly selected parents asking for feedback relative to student needs, the curriculum, the physical plants, community relations, and other pertinent information.

Mr. Dillman asks the cooperation of all parents in filling out and returning these opinionnaires by October 4, 1977.

This inventory will provide parents an opportunity to make specific recommendations for improvement, and will also provide valuable data for school personnel in decision making.

On his recommendation, council members approved a triple asphalt procedure in lieu of the hot mix procedure, as McMorries explained the longevity of the triple asphalt procedure for paving.

Also, the city council approved asking Jake Diel to have their attorneys prepare an acceptance ordinance for awarding the paving bids. After that time, additional public hearings will be scheduled as the road to the paving project continues on schedule.

The paving engineer also explained what streets would be designated front streets and which streets will be side streets.

They explained that in 1963, Mrs. Oliver and their daughter, Marcie started a pen pal relationship. Through the years, the women continued to correspond. Mrs. Oliver eventually married, and she and her husband, Peter, are the parents of two children, a son, Steven, age seven and a daughter Gilliam, age six.

In the interim, Marcie married and moved to Connecticut.

Mrs. Oliver said that wanting to take a trip, she decided to take a holiday in the United States, where she had never visited. She resigned from her job as a legal secretary and left her husband taking care of their young children to come to the U.S.

Purchasing a bus ticket as advertised by the Greyhound Bus Co., she visited across the United States on her three week tour. She left Muleshoe for Albuquerque, Grand Canyon, Lake Havasu, Hartford, Conn., where she planned to spend five days with Marcie Warren before returning to New York and her England home.

She said she did not really care for New York and spoke of the people being in a hurry, too much so to take time to be friendly. "I don't like cities anyway," she commented with a smile. She said she did enjoy visiting Washington, D.C. and the FBI headquarters as she worked her way west.

Farwell Man Killed In Saturday Wreck

Weary law enforcement officers, ambulance personnel, hospital personnel, and emergency firemen looked at the three day period from Saturday afternoon through Monday night and hoped things would quieten down just a bit.

Tragic events started just before 1 p.m. Saturday when a grinding near head on crash five miles west and two miles south of Muleshoe on a dirt road claimed the life of a Farwell man.

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Eubanks grandson, James Allen Eubanks, 15, also of Farwell. Hospitalized in Muleshoe was a driver of the vehicle, James William Eubanks, 41.

Treated and released at the hospital was Maldonado Eulalio Villalobos. He was charged by investigating officer, THP Louis Cardinal with involuntary manslaughter and placed in the Bailey County jail.

Funeral services for Horace Eubank were conducted at 3 p.m. Monday in the First Baptist Church in Farwell. Officiating were the Rev. Dudley Bristow, pastor, the Rev. Cletus Caswell of Union and the Rev. Alton West, a Baptist minister from Brownfield. Burial was in Bailey County Memorial Park in Muleshoe by Singleton-Elis Funeral Home.

Eubanks was born December 23, 1910 in Know County and had lived in Farwell for the past nine years, moving there from Meadow. He was a farmer and operated the Texico Truck Stop. He married Johnnie Smith January 22, 2934 in Vernon.

Survivors include his widow, Johnie; a daughter, Mrs. Jean Castleberry Farwell; son, J.W. Farwell; a sister, Mrs. Inez McLaughlin, Carlsbad, N.M.; two brothers, Dennis of Hobbs, N.M. and Louis of Denver City and seven grandchildren.

Around 9:30 p.m. Sunday night, officers and ambulance personnel were called to the Valley Motel to pick up a shooting victim. Julian G. Tijerina of Morton was reportedly shot in the right shoulder and through his face by a high-powered rifle as he drove down Highway 84 adjacent to the motel.

His three passengers sought aid from the motel office. At 10:38 p.m. Sunday, Tijerina was transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he was listed Tuesday as being in "very critical" condition from gunshot wound.

Reportedly, Tijerina was the driver of a late model vehicle driving east on Highway 84 when the gun was fired through the right front window, bypassing a passenger in the front seat and hitting Tijerina.

Charged in the shooting incident was Gualdalupe S. Martinez of Muleshoe, who was released from the Bailey County jail on a \$3,000 bond.

Investigation of the shooting incident is still underway at present.

A third incident, at 7:15 p.m. Monday, sent a third violence victim to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

In that accident, at the west

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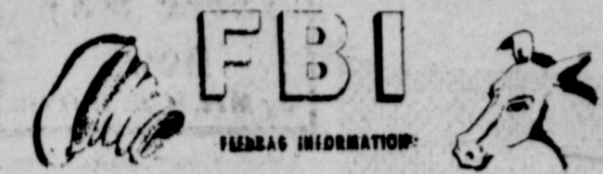

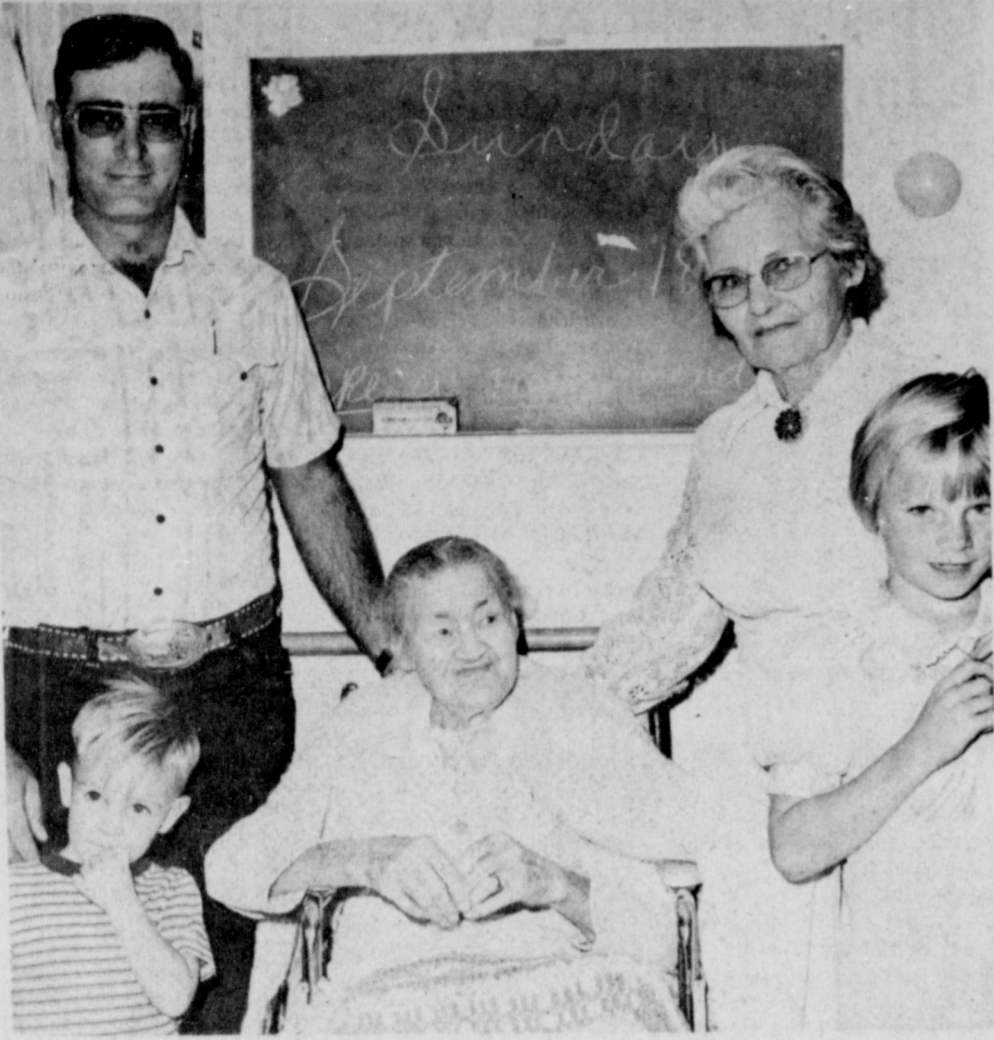

Consumer Food News

COLLEGE STATION -- Beef is plentiful, eggs are economical, soft fruits fade out as citrus fruits begin to appear and some vegetables--among them potatoes--are good choices this week, says Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In beef, look for economical buys on chuck roasts and chuck steaks, shoulder roasts and ground beef. Good buys are the longer, slower cooking selections. Pork production is seasonally down, but scattered specials include Boston butt roasts, port shoulder steaks and smoked picnics.

Eggs offer an economical protein choice. Whole fryers are one of the better choices in poultry this week, Mrs. Clyatt says.

Soft shell squash, carrots, Bell peppers, cucumbers and cooking green are other good vegetable choices, along with potatoes.

Supplies of soft fresh summer fruits--peaches, plums and nectarines--are lower, but as autumn progresses, fresh oranges, grapefruit and other citrus fruits will be more available. Stocks of frozen orange juice concentrate are below last year's levels, but are offered as a "special" in some stores.

New crop apples, oranges, pears and grapes, cantaloupe and honeydew melons are available at varying prices.

As for milk and dairy foods--any selection is a wise choice--but according to family needs, but for real thrift, nonfat dry milk is the best buy, she advises.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

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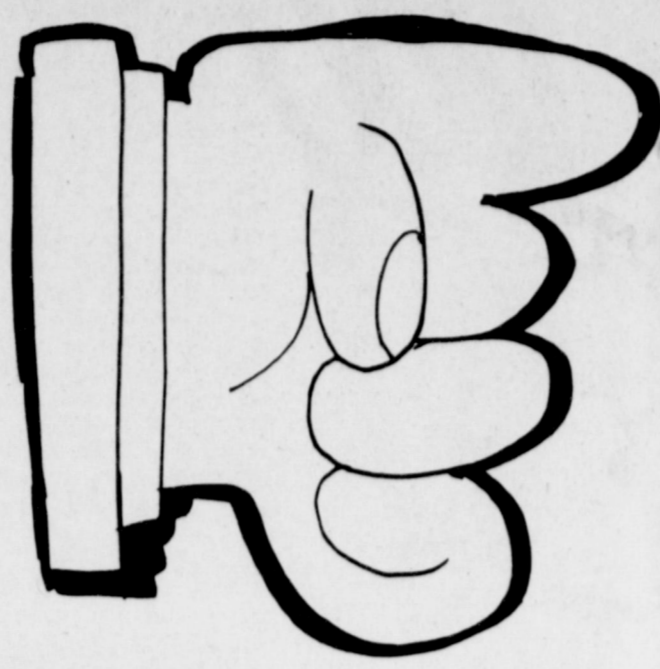

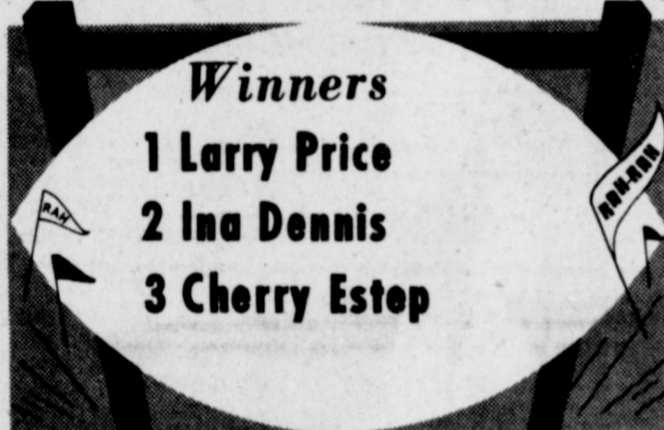

Accent! Sewage For Suburbanites

This is Accent on Health, brought to you by your Texas Department of Health.

The last thing on the mind of many homeowners moving to the suburbs is sewage—but it shouldn't be, says the Texas Department of Health.

About 20 percent of the Texas population uses septic tanks, and about 95 percent of the private systems use the absorption system with lateral lines leading from the septic tank.

To their dismay, many residents have discovered that their soil won't soak up all the effluent being generated from their homes. This leads to the surfacing of septic tank effluent, which results in odorous standing water and in breeding places for flies and mosquitoes. It also permits direct contact with disease-carrying water by humans and pets.

New Standards for construction of private sewage facilities have been developed by the Department. The new standards have been discussed in public hearings, and will be submitted to the September meeting of the Texas Board of Health. If the board approves them, they will become official 90 days later.

The private sewage systems are usually single owner types. In addition to residential systems, however, these can also include a motel, laundry, service station, or other commercial establishment.

With very few exceptions, the typical private sewage system is composed of a septic tank followed by a soil absorption system for the effluent. Normally, this is what the home owner has.

The residents of subdivisions, lake developments and individuals living in smaller towns and cities -- as well as other rural residents -- all use septic tank systems.

But some of the areas where private sewage facilities are built are just not suitable for septic tanks. Under ideal conditions, a septic tank system should be located where soils have good permeability, such as sandy loam and sandy clay. Many private facilities however, are installed in rocky areas with no permeability, or in tight clay soils which won't allow passage of water.

Where you have many residences and businesses moving into subdivisions which have ordinances governing the regulation of private sewage facilities, problems have sometimes arisen. The problems have involved developers marketing small lots and contractors providing facilities which don't meet recommended standards.

Sometimes, home owners find themselves with an individual disposal system that doesn't work. And in some cases, residents have had to construct and operate a central, or public, collection system and treatment plant at considerable costs, or tie in with nearby municipal systems.

The new standards offer alternatives to conventional septic tank design, including the elimination of wastewater by evaporation and plant transpiration. This method will work very well in the drier areas of the state. Where sufficient land area is available, an inoperative absorptive system can be changed to an evaporative system which has a much better chance of functioning properly.

The construction standards are intended to upgrade the minimum acceptable standards for private sewage facilities in the state and to try to eliminate some of the problems. The standards will supply additional information to home owners, home builders and local and state public health officials.

Through the cooperation of the Texas Water Quality Board, counties have the option of adopting regulations for the installation of septic tank systems in the jurisdictions. Some 35 counties, many of them in problem areas, have adopted these orders.

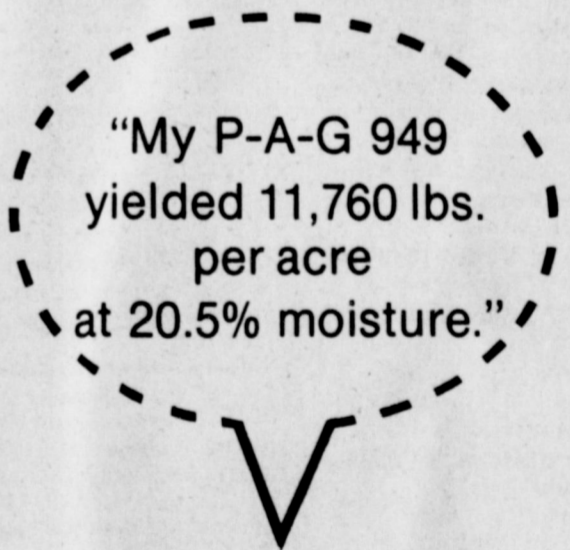
Water oriented agencies, such as water districts, have adopted similar orders through the Texas Water Quality Board to control the pollution of streams and lakes under their jurisdictions. River authorities, such as the Lower Colorado River Authority, Trinity River Authority, and Upper Guadalupe River Authority, have adopted these orders for areas around certain lakes.

The catchall for bringing legal pressure to bear against someone who has a defective private sewage system is the Texas Sanitation Law which has existed for years to control and abate public health nuisances. Improperly functioning septic tanks can lead to transmission of disease. Two of the more common diseases which may be transmitted by exposure to human wastes are infections hepatitis and typhoid fever.

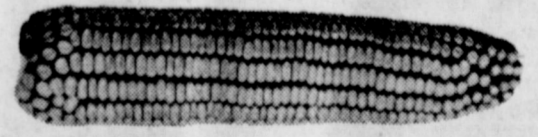
The Department of Health is hopeful that the new standards will alleviate problems that have existed too long and put a blemish on the Utopia of suburban living.

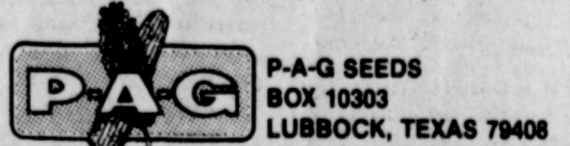



TRANSPLANT IRIS

Transplant bearded iris during the next few weeks so that they will boast colorful next spring, advises a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Plant only healthy rhizomes (underground stems) in a well-drained bed in full sunlight. Work the soil to a depth of 12 to 18 inches and add a complete fertilizer. Space transplants 12 to 18 inches apart. Trim back foliage to one-third its original height.
