In the county of Kerr, on the eighth Monday after the first Mondays in Oct. February and June, session one week.

In the county of Kendall, on the ninth Monday after the first Mondays in Oct. February and June, session until the business is disposed of.

For judicial purposes the county of Edwards is attached to the county of Kerr; and the county of Kimball to the county of Gillespie.

Brigham Young and his Judges

The Darien Canal.

Commodore Seifried, it appears, claims that a practicable route for a ship canal across the Isthmus of Darien has been discovered. The forthcoming report of the recent expedition, it is said, positively states this fact and lays down the route as follows: From the Gulf of Darien, on the Atlantic coast, up the Atrato river, 250 miles, to the mouth of the Napipi, and thence in a straight line, to the Pacific ocean at Cahiba bay.

The great engineering difficulties, however, are on the Pacific side. A tunnel 170 feet high and 70 feet wide must be cut through hills for five miles, and the canal, if ever it should be made, must pass through a solid rock at a depth of 125 feet and 3 miles in length.
