A HIGH-HANDS OUTRAGE.—An unprovoked brutal attack was made by six armed ruffians on a number of peaceful German transients about seven miles from this city, that reminds one of the good old democratic times before the war. On Saturday evening Mr. Froebel, a well known resident of Boerne, was brought into town to Dr. Hoff in a distressing condition, and he gives the following account of the manner in which he received his injuries:

It seems, that in company with several other transients they were driving their ox-wagons on the Sulphur Spring road from Indianola, and when they were in the vicinity of the Roselle, they were suddenly attacked by six horsemen, armed with pistols and bowie-knives. The transients being unarmed scattered in every direction and took to the chaparral, with the exception of Mr. Froebel, who was felled senseless to the ground by a blow from a six-shooter on his head by one of the ruffians. Before he was struck, Mr. Froebel saw one of his companions pursued into the brush by one of the crowd with a long butcher knife.

No robbery was attempted, and the rascals were not even drunk, but on charging the party one of them called out: "let us clean up the damned Dutch." From the appearance and manner of Mr. Froebel's wounds it is evident, that the villains must have ridden their horses over his prostrate body while lying insensible on the prairie. The single leader was a well-known desperado, and was fully recognized by Mr. Froebel, but we withhold giving any further particulars, as it would interfere with the action of the proper authorities already taken in the premises.

We have not room for extended comment at present, but we can not refrain from congratulating the democratic Germans on the partial success of their efforts.
