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Late Governor Oscar J. Dunn, of Louisiana.

Yesterday's dispatch brought us the sad intelligence of the unexpected death of this distinguished gentleman.

Governor Dunn was stricken down in the flower of his manhood, in the midst of his public life, surrounded by a blooming family, loved and respected by all who knew him.

A full blooded negro, the outline of his face were decidedly Roman, his form tall and stately, his carriage so dignified, and gentlemanly, the first glimpse so striking, that seeing him for the first time, one would involuntarily set him down as a remarkable man, and notwithstanding his illness, which was all but fatal, he continued to the very end of his life, his characteristic of a hero—smaller his exceptional fine looking.

A ripe scholar, Governor Dunn was a very modest man, and studiously avoided any display of his talents, when he was called upon to deliver his inaugural address, he did so with a simplicity and force of argument so convincing, as to attract general attention.

As a conversationalist Mr. Dunn excelled, a vein of quiet humor running through his remarks, very attractive and pleasing, while on no occasion did he lay aside his gravity, nor forget, when speaking to the humbler of his fellow-citizens, to treat him as a gentleman and an equal.

Always too delicate to wound the feelings of others, he was exceedingly careful never to omit the minutest details of politeness, and though proud of his well-earned popularity, he never became vainglorious or vulgar.

As a public speaker, there are few, not only in this State, but in the whole country, who could compare with him, and among his many, whose most distinguished representative he was, he was immediately recognized by all who heard him.

What, however, constituted most toward his great popularity among all classes and colors, was his unimpeachable honesty and incorruptibility.

He gave down to his last rest with a name pure and unstained by a disrepute, the purity, unspotted among surrounding corruptness—emphatically a true man in his State.

In politics, Governor Dunn was a Great Republican, of the most intense type, and our great leader less in him, not only one of his most ardent supporters.

Governor Dunn's politics were not however, of a demagogic or clap-trap kind, slow and methodical in all his movements, he was long in making up his mind, but his stand once taken, he held fast like a grim death. There was in him very little of the politician, but a great deal of the man of honor.

His sympathies were essentially Southern, though faithful to the Union he cherished no animosity towards a fallen foe, was kind and forgiving to his enemies, and his best efforts were always directed towards what would benefit the whole people, which accounts for his being in the opposition here ever met with, among the class of Democrats. By radical Democrats, as well as radical Republicans, he was pronounced a worthy man, well qualified for his position.

A patriot man, he faithfully supported his country in the field in the last great struggle, and it was only when he saw the ruin of fair Louisiana clearly before his eyes, when the tyranny of the K. K. Klan Governor became subservient, that he resented to himself the words of the Declaration of Independence. "When, in the course of human events, etc." and said: "No tyrant."
