A Nice Little Game Spoiled by Our Senator.

Senate joint resolution No. 47, introduced by Senator Mills, read first time Nov. 25, 1871, and laid over under the rules read second time Nov. 26, 1871, and before the table on reading the Senate, Hertberg. Joint resolution requesting Gen. Augur to make the City of Austin a temporary Dep't for the distribution of Quartermaster and a federal tribunal—the Supreme Court of the United States.

The thirteen colonies were painfully independent of each other, they were popularly engaged in avocations essentially different. War had with them only been a temporary necessity, those traces which they promptly wiped out, by successfully disbanding their army, and constituting themselves as a non-military organization, one purely civil and essentially judicial. After? By a federal pact, in which the thirteen States submit to the jurisdiction of a federal Legislative-Congress, and a federal tribunal—the Supreme Court of the United States.

The Mexican colonies were painlessly independent of each other, they were popularly engaged in avocations essentially similar, ideas, religion &c., and even much opposed to each other in different important matters. If judged of by separating them, it would appear that the Mexican colonies had adopted the political and historical forms of ancient society, if they had shut themselves up in the absolute independence of an isolated and unequal sovereignty, if they had pretended to become peers, in the manner of the European States, very quickly they should have become military States like the European States. Inevitably was it that soon would have occurred between them.

Every one would have organized military institutions, they would have had regular and permanent armies, fortresses, arsenals, and would have been compelled to imitate each other in the augmentation of their means of attack and defense, and have developed military interests and soon military parties.

This fatal road, they would rapidly have lost the pre-eminence of forms of the Republic, so as to retrograde into the old monarchical and military form, and at this time, instead of thirty-six, or thirty-eight States, great or small, but all equal, all judicial, free, unequal and industrial, the service, which would have a disastrous transmigration of states from the eastern to the western, and greatly to the benefit of the General Government.

No. 2. That it would be requested to forward copies of this joint resolution to the Hon. Secretary of War, and to General Augur, commanding the Department of Texas, as requested to recommend to the Hon. Secretary of War, that the City of Austin, be made a temporary Dep't for the distribution of the Quartermaster and Commissary stores of the Forces of the Department; that we deem this proper, for the best interests of the service, which would have a disastrous transmigration of states from the eastern to the western, and greatly to the benefit of the General Government.

We have full reason to be proud of our forefathers. He has always been strong among the people, and in the performance of his legislative duties, and an honor to his country. While he represents us in the State Senate, we know that our interests are in good hands.

While we hardly believe Senator Mills to be corrupt in advocating the transfer of the Government Department to Austin, "for the best interests of the Government," we can not but acknowledge, that were it not for the determined action of Dr. Hertberg, that regeneration might have placed, and, in consequence, the Dep't, so important for our town, been removed to Austin.

Any way, we have full reason to swell the entry of the troops here to say Austin, with peculiar anxiety.

Senator Hertberg only argued his motion to lay the Joint Resolution on the table, by objecting that the commanding General was certainly the one, who ought to know best. When the Dep't should be removed, and that it was naturally extra-officers for the Legislature to step out of its present station of existence, to veterans, who had served in the war, the Dep't, should be removed, and that it was in the interest of the Government, but to the more special care of the Houston and Central Railroads, and also the Austin merchants. This resolution forms a worthy ground for the proposed "special legislation" of our last Legislature. As regards that also, Senator Hartington has, by word and action, opposed it in every case, as the Senate show. Unfortunately his vote and influence were not always able to prevent it.

We are truly glad to show our citizens that this little game to the prejudice of our people, has been spoiled by the firm hand of our distinguished senator.

Mr. CONSIDERANT'S PANPLAT.— We have received from Hon. V. C. Considerant, lately of French politics, a copy of his paper, and a copy of his "Preliminary to the War." We have also received from him a copy of his "Predictions on the War," written in 1869, and presented to the French Foreign Ministry.

The paper transmitted is no power of intrinsic value. We find Mr. Considerant to be one of the few Frenchmen who gave way to no illusions of that critical period. Weighting the pro and con, carefully and prudently, among others—Genl Schurz, is "conservative," who pretends to be some political, so ignorant that he does not know that Schurz, being a foreigner, is ineligible.

The Know-Nothing—Conservative—Rebel Democratic element was in a mighty hue, to call on a foreigner, a Dutchman, a German, a Frenchman, to make a speech, giving the name of his party, and to the banks of the Thermidor. He knows nothing; neither is he a politician.

Don J. D. Logan again dishes up to his readers, the old-and-gone—old—days of the Southern Confederacy, the era of which we so clearly pointed out some time ago. He takes no pains of a correction, nor he doesn't care about such matters, which are, however, of the highest importance to all our citizens.
