TEXAS ITEMS.

TYLER, Texas, Dec. 7.

Late on yesterday evening a mob of negroes met on the streets and brutally murdered Capt. R. E. House and F. A. Godley, both lawyers of this place. Great excitement prevails, but everything is quiet and under full control of the civil authorities.

All the murderers are at large, but the sheriff and posse are making a vigorous search for the felons. I will write particulars.

HORACE CHILTON.

Mr. Edward Crittfield, late of South-west Missouri, has purchased a tract of land about eight miles south west of town, and intends to set out a nursery on it. Mr. C. has had much experience in this business, and is very sanguine of success in this enterprise.—Kaufman Star.

DEATH FROM CHARCOAL.—A family of negroes, named Crosby in Galveston, retired to rest the other night leaving coal in a furnace in the room which was left closed and tight, with little or no communication with the external air. In the morning the entire family was found dead. The jury of inquest rendered a verdict of death from inhalation of the fumes of charcoal. Our readers will note that this accident resulted from charcoal, not anathema to bituminous coal.—Houston Telegraph.

We have noticed a good many immigrants passing through our city this week, many of whom are settling in the western part of this country. We noticed a large number from Virginia on our streets who had come up on the Central Railroad, and learned that one of them was among some sharpers who had swindled and was robbed of some fifty dollars on open day. Our city authorities ought to root out this gang and by all means afford every protection to immigrants.—Corpus Christi Observer.
